


men. Young people of all stripes took advantage of our chapter's invitation to learn more about general aviation.

Paul Wurster— Van's RV-14


Not as much progress as I would like this month. I've been very busy at work and had training and two check rides to fly which really cut into my free time. Home and auto maintenance just isn't as cool as building planes.

I installed the fuel pump and filter after attaching the correct wire terminals. The big firewall and fuselage side penetrations were installed. Hopefully next month, I will be finish bending and flaring all the fuel lines, but I need to read up and figure out how that is actually done first.



The next chapter is supposed to be the joining of the fuselage with the tailbone, but I want to work out of my garage for as long as I can so I'm deviating and jumping ahead. I'm going to install the mechanical items in the fuse to the max extent before the big join. Therefore, the next step is starting with the fuel selector and fuel system. The selector was installed and all the elbows were pointed in the correct directions. Then



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


YOUNG EAGLES EVENT AT STINSON



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Portable Soldering Iron

It seems like everything we own has gotten "smart." Your phone is smart, your TV is smart, you name it – nowadays it is smart. So why not have a smart soldering iron too? Indeed, you can!

The same technology that allows inductive cookware now provides portable, smart soldering irons. Photo 1 shows a new, smart soldering iron. This particular iron runs on a USB outlet, five volts!

Photo 1: Smart Soldering Iron



This iron plugs into a USB outlet and it heats up in just a few seconds. Very convenient! Photo 2 shows a tiny information screen that provides the status of the iron. You can instantly see if the iron is hot enough.

The only issue I have found with this iron is that it needs a healthy USB outlet. Not all outlets can provide sufficient power. Alternatively, the power can come in the form of the USB cord plugged into a cigarette lighter outlet. Again, the power must be sufficient, so it is imperative to read the directions. Once you have this little gem figured out you can solder just about anywhere. Photo 3 is a rig I made to go portable.

On this rig the cords are long enough to place the battery on the ground and solder several feet away such as in a cockpit. I bought a cigarette lighter adapter that had a healthy, 40 watt output – not all adapters are created equal.

Finally, if you just don't like having cords in the way, Photo 4 shows a cordless soldering iron that works quite well. It is rechargeable from a USB outlet.

So far, I have soldered several things with this cordless iron. It lasts a good while on a single charge. It does not seem to hold a charge for weeks at a time, but it charges up very quickly from a USB outlet, so it is convenient for field work.

After my discovery flight, the excitement has not ceased one bit, in fact, I have really become much more excited for every single flight lesson. My flight instructor, Ryan, has been very helpful to me. By giving me lessons as we fly, he has allowed me to learn on my own. I feel like being able to truly fly by myself has been so nice, and by this, I mean that I have been able to understand every part of flying as I learn, instead of trying to understand it while I am in a room reading. I am excited to continue my journey and to understand a subject which I truly feel passion for. When I first flew, it was like a fire was ignited in me, a fire which was fueled with a passion and an interest in flying, the fire has only grown through the years. On another note make sure when you're going through your pre solo that you make sure the POH you're using is from the right year, so you don't have to redo the whole thing three hours before your lesson.

Now what to do next? Well I still need about 5 hours solo plus another 3 hours cross country solo hours to go, and hopefully by the time you're reading this I'll have my night cross country time already done. What is slowing me down is Texas Skies "no solo out of Boerne rule" which burned half an hour of my time just to fly to Hondo, or wherever I'm starting my solo from. While this does end up burning my money, I'm not too worried about it, and should still finish all my required hours by the end of June.

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


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


