

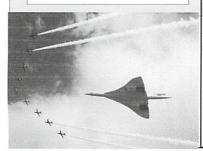

I had been taking lessons at Grayson County Airport (formerly Perrin AFB) and that's where I picked up my trusty C-172 "2884E". Winds rocked the plane as I preflighted. Another look at my checklist of things to take... plane logs, log book, medical, foggles,money. With another prayer and great attention to cross wind taxiing I set off for my flight to Eaker Field, Durant, OK where the designated examiner was based. The plane literally jumped into the air after a few feet and climbed like a home sick angel. With a 30 knot tail wind I flew the 20 miles in what seemed like minutes. I squeaked

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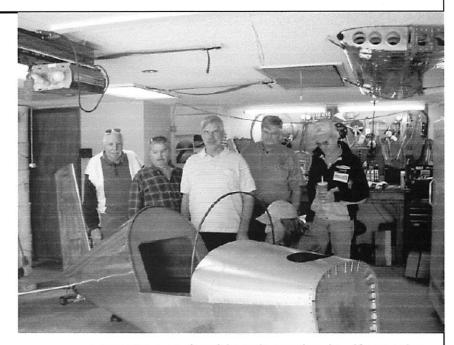

The examiner, John Carrington, was not in a good mood. He had driven in from California the night before towing a trailer with a broken 5th wheel. I had not met him before and he looked old and crotchety. This was not going to be fun. After attending to several administrative details we settled into the orals. He did not miss a question from the standards book....to include SIGMETS, AIR-METS and METARS ...uqh. One redeeming thing was that John was an old retired AF pilot, long time civilian pilot as well as an APIA who had been there, done that and had tons of knowledge and wisdom to impart. So with every question asked and answered, he imparted to this fledgling aviatrix many words of wisdom. I would love to go back, meet with him over a cup of coffee and learn more. Once in the air, we went through literally every maneuver in the practical standards book. With the winds aloft the way they were, my turn around a point was more like an oval around a point and he did make mention that today was not a very good day for maneuvers. With the final landing completed, John grunted and without a word stepped out of the airplane and walked back to the FBO. David was waiting on the ramp and mouthed ...well??? I could only shrug my shoulders not knowing what to expect. I followed John back to the room and stood there waiting. He sat down, shuffled some papers and then looked up at me and said..."I guess there will be once less cook in the kitchen". As I stood there not really understanding what he said, he continued, you'll be too busy flying!" I finally got it... I was a pilot! At that point he stood up and gave me the biggest, warmest grin and a bear hug to boot. Next thing I knew David was hugging me and my father in-law, also a pilot, was on the cell phone congratulating me. The emotions were surging. The feeling was unreal. Then it was time to take up my first passenger...my soul mate and now my fly mate. I proudly put on my hat with AVIATRIX embroidered on the front, called my flight instructor and told him he was fired, and took up my passenger. After a big pattern, and totally exhausted, I dropped David off at Durant and flew back to Grayson. It then hit me as I flew alone....I was finally a pilot. The sky was now also mine. Oh...remember those winds? As I neared Grayson County I prayed for none of those "gusts to 30". I came in on final and crossed the threshold with an indicated airspeed of 60, but there seemed to be hardly any ground speed. As I flared to land, the plane literally gently plopped down and with out any brakes stopped in a few feet. That was too cool...the wind was my friend then.

Bruce King's Tire Kicking - Self Designed On Saturday, February 21, Bruce King treated the Chapter 35 members to a tire kicking of his aircraft under construction from a design created by himself. The simplistic construction techniques are carried over from his previous experience building a Bradley Kit. Not only were all normal procedure checklists prepared for each phase of flight, he also had emergency procedure checklists at the ready. Moreover, Weston had brought his own piloting skills up to date with several flights in Doug Apsey's Mooney, under the tutelage of instructor J.C. Wood. He also received time in Mark Moscrip's Piper Cherokee, this time under the eye of David Talley. The performance of the Cherokee was thought to be very similar to the Zenith, so some time in that airplane was thought to be especially valuable On that Tuesday, the weather was perfect, and all systems were "go." The only last minute holdup occurred when a Twin Beech (Yes, a D-18 Twin!) called in for winds from four miles out. It was

a treat to see that big twin wedge itself onto the Airpark's 3000 foot runway. The flight itself went well, with performance aplenty thanks to the beautiful six cylinder Jabiru engine. Weston flew the airplane with such skill that the visiting Twin Beech remarked "looks like he's been flying it forever." Well done, Weston Walker!

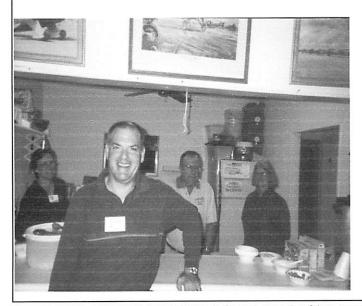

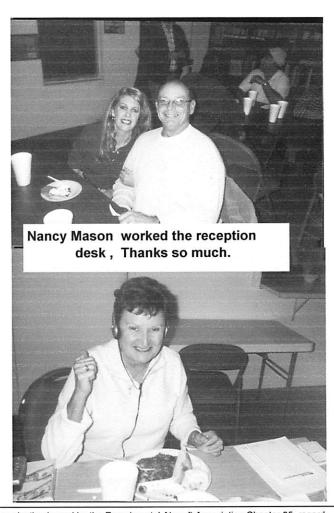

Chapter Gains IRS 501(c) 3 Status

A milestone was reached in 2004 when our chapter was awarded the coveted IRS status as a 501(c)3 corporation, based on our proof of being an educational organization.

Under this code, we are able to offer tax write-offs to persons and corporations who donate to our chapter. To document this, our treasurer issues a letter attesting to our status.

We are currently in a three-year "probationary" period, so we must take care to document our various educational efforts, such as Young Eagles, aircraft construction instruction (as at Warren High School) forums, library, and so on.

At this time, as we contemplate expanding our facilities, we would like to see someone step forward to search out grants from foundations. If you are that person, please contact our president.

Tool Crib Update

Chapter 35 really does have a "Tool Crib". Thanks to the generosity of Weston Walker, Al Almond and others, funds have been allocated to purchase tools for the temporary use of our members. Additionally, members have donated some very useful tools.

Our goal is to make the process of using the tools as simple as possible, but we must maintain accountability. We have a short agreement statement that states some basic "rules" for use of the tools. A list of available tools will be published in the Chapter newsletter. Pick up and return procedures are still being worked out.

Please give us your suggestions regarding tools we should acquire.

The list of currently available tools includes:

- Torque wrench
- Brake lining replacement tool
- Lycoming cylinder hold down wrench set
- Tubing flaring tool
- Spark plug cleaning kit
- Magneto timing "buzz box" and light
- Differential pressure tester
- Instrument hole cut out tool
- Instrument hole template for attachment screws placement
- Metal shrinker and stretcher.

As time goes by, this list will expand.

We currently have three Young Eagle events scheduled for 2005. The event dates are as fol-

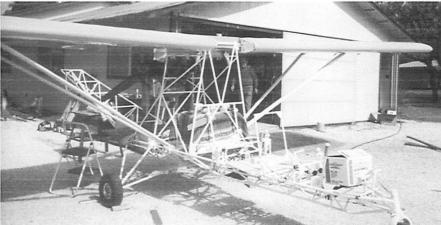
- March 19th at Hondo

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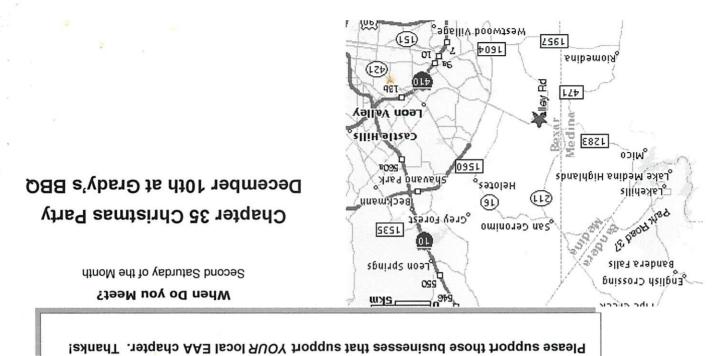
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
