
### **FLYING SEASON**

During the first few lessons, she fell in love with aviation and after two years of flying she acquired her commercial, multi-engine and instrument ratings.

In 1991, she entered the Air Race Classic (ARC), an all female cross country air race. A new passion was born, and in 2006, she won the 2478 mile ARC race.

Carol has recently added her flight instructor's license and multi-engine and instrument instructor ratings to her accomplishments. She is currently introducing students to the joy of flight and is a contract pilot in King Air aircraft and a small jet.

CarolAnn is a former manager with a Fortune 500 company.

She earned her private pilot license in 1978 and her instrument rating in 1980. In 1996, she completed her commercial license and bought a Mooney in 2000.

After her mother suffered and died from ALS, she flew around the world in 2003 to raise awareness and donations for ALS. To date, her speaking engagements and book about the flight, Upon Silver Wings, have raised \$80,000 for ALS research.

Not content to just fly, CarolAnn built her first plane in 2006. Today she owns and flies three different aircraft. She flies over 400 hours a year including flying students with the EAA Young Eagles program, the sick and needy with Angel Flights and instructing cadets with the Civil Air Patrol.

CarolAnn will be speaking at our next chapter meeting, October 10th.

## 'ALUMINUM OVERCAST' B-17 COMING TO SAN ANTONIO

We will be hosting the EAA's "Aluminum Overcast" B-17 Flying Fortress on November 19h through 23rd, 2009 at Stinson Airfield. We will need volunteers on the following days to insure this tour stop is successful:

Friday Saturday & Sunday, Nov. 20th, 21st & 22nd -- two people each day to assist with passenger loading/unloading from 07:30am to 12:00 Noon for Aircraft Flights.

Two people for Merchandise sales from 7:30 AM till 5:00 PM -- we can break this into three shifts, three hours each, which will require a total of 6 people each day.

Three people to assist with the aircraft ground tours from 2:00pm till 5:00pm each day. Two of these positions will be seated at the aft entrance and nose entrance of the AC. (You will assure the people entering the AC have paid the admittance fee and control ingress and egress of the AC). The other position is inside the AC in the cockpit area. This person will assure the safety of the cockpit area and possibly answer questions (info will be provided by B-17 staff).

As you can read, we will need at least ten people per day based on this schedule. If we have longer shifts for the Merchandise sales we could do with 2 fewer.

This will be a great opportunity for the Chapter to raise some much needed funds. We will receive a percentage of money from merchandise sales, aircraft flights and ground tours, so you can see we have a great opportunity to accomplish this so PLEASE sign-up with Dave Baker via e-mail (iflyaerosport@sbcglobal.net) or phone-210-410-9235. 
I will keep the membership informed (via the newsletter) each month on our progress for vol-






