Mark your calendars for Saturday, June 11th! This will again be our Annual Chapter 846 Young Eagles Day. Chapter pilots have flown 3,239 Young Eagles since 1994! Let's add to that number this year.

The program will be held at **Wayne County Airport** (KBJJ), Saturday, June 11, 9 am-2 pm. We will set up Friday afternoon, June 10, after taking supplies from the Chapter hangar to Wayne County at 3 p.m. Final set-up Saturday morning will begin at 7 a.m. at the Main Terminal hangar at Wayne County. The pilot briefing will be held at 8:30 am Saturday morning.

This event will be run slightly differently than in past years. On-line registration will be accepted and encouraged. National EAA volunteers have developed some on-line registration websites for registration and electronic signatures that we will be using. The registration website is https://tinyurl.com/Yeday3614. Take a look and let Gary Baker know what you think.

iPads will be used to collect electronic signatures from parents and pilots. The only paper that pilots will need to sign are logbooks. If you have an iPad that you would allow us to use at registration, please let Gary know.

Planning/Training Meeting-May 19, 7 pm

Because of all of the changes in this year's event, there will be a planning/training meeting Thursday evening, May 19, 7 pm, at the Chapter Hangar. A review of the registration website will be covered and new procedures in getting kids and parents registered and into aircraft will be established. Pilots are asked to attend May 19 to set up a flight route and emergency procedures. Folks can practice with the registration website at https://tinyurl.com/YEDay3841.

All pilots who will be flying Young Eagles this year again have to have completed the EAA Youth Protection Program (YPP) within the past three years. Send Gary Baker a text or an email to confirm your status in the YPP if you have any questions. Any pilots who would like to fly kids are asked to confirm with Gary at the May Chapter gathering.

Ground school will be run by Brian Burke. Advertising is also being done by Mary. Volunteers will also be needed for ground schools and kid escorts to and from the aircraft.

FAA LAUNCHES NEW TOOL TO TRACK MEDICAL APPLICATIONS

On April 20, the FAA announced that pilots will now be able to track the status of their medical certificates online throughout the application and review process in their MedXPress profile.

This change will alleviate some of the frustration of waiting for a decision on medical status by showing pilots where their medical certification is in the FAA review process, while also reducing the administrative burden on the FAA. Previously, pilots had to call the Office of Aerospace Medicine to check their application status.



My Trip to Sun-N-Fun!

I left Saturday morning April 2nd, from Elyria airport (1G1) around 9 AM and 2:20 minutes later landed at the Duchy Airpark (5NC5) in North Carolina where I parked at the home of my dear friend and 846 member Jay Waddell. Jay and Julie built a beautiful spacious hangar-home in a peaceful community of fun-loving pilots and a few homebuilders. The Duchy Airpark is located

north of the Chapel Hill and just SE of Burlington and sports a 3,500-foot asphalt non-lighted runway. The surrounding area is hilly and makes this airpark hard to spot when flying in.

We spent the rest of Saturday dynamically balancing the propeller on Jay's RV-9A. That evening we swapped lies and stories with some of his pilot neighbors drinking beer and eating some delicious chili that Julie prepared.

On Sunday Jay and I hopped in my RV-14A and took off for the last day of "Uncle John's fly-in" at Triple Tree airport https:// tta.aero/ in SC. Triple Tree airport has always been on my bucket list and is a must see! It sports a 7,000

foot grass runway situated in a beautiful setting of rolling hills with two large lakes. The place is HUGE and the runway is like landing on a carpet! It was an hour flight from the Duchy to get there with a fuel stop at Saluda Co. (6J4) for some "cheap fuel" then a :20-minute hop to Triple Tree (SC00). We flew the VFR procedure inbound and wondered where all the traffic was. When we landed around noon, there was only a few other aircraft on the grounds, most of them packing up from camping over the weekend. Come to find out most of the crowd left this morning since all the activities were scheduled on Friday and Saturday! Dave drove up in his golf cart to welcome us and drove us around the place from one end to the other, we felt like diplomats! That was awesome since you wouldn't want to walk it; it is that big. We spent some time at their museum and local buildings. Triple Tree is noted for the largest RC show in America. Each year they host the "Joe Nall Week" RC fly-in https://tta.aero/aviation-events/joe-nall/. We left SC00 and headed back to 5NC5 flying directly over KCLT with ATC flight following at 10,500 feet and a 188 kt GS.

at Triple Tree, Landing on Carpet!

I left the Waddell hotel at 8 AM Monday and headed south to Florida's Port Richey area to see some relatives. Incidentally the "weather Gods" were with me the whole trip down. CAVU all the way except for some low-level turbulence and dreaded headwinds (they seem to follow me wherever I go, even eastbound!). I landed at Hidden Lake airpark (FA40) with prior permission for the night because the airport is private. My wife's Uncle picked me up and we spent the evening catching up.

Tuesday morning, I left FA40 and arrived at Sun-N-Fun around noon due to morning IFR conditions around KLAL. I did my usual Sun-N-Fun stint- walking the homebuilt, warbird and "Comanche Town" flightlines soaking up the hot weather and talking to some Comanche friends. The weather was 85 degrees and felt great coming from Cleveland. I also spent some time in the main exhibit hangars looking and dreaming of all the new cool gadgets I'll never get! I walked the aircraft displays during the airshow working my way back to the RV. My plan was to get out of Dodge right after the airshow ended. There was weather moving in from northwest Florida and I wanted to overnight and have dinner with Jay in St. Augustine FL that night (Jay works part time overseeing a hospital being built in the St. Au-






gustine area). I was number 12 in the takeoff line at Lakeland and made it to St. Augustine (KSGJ) after a fuel stop at Palatka Municipal (28J) again for cheap fuel just in time for dinner. Jay met me at the airport and between rain showers we got the plane tied down and covered for the night.

The next morning April 6th, Jay dropped me off at the airport around 7 AM because I wanted to leave early to beat the ugly fast moving cold front moving west to east paralleling my course back home. I filed IFR the whole trip home and most of the time was above the overcast at 7,000 feet till I got to Columbia SC when it became VFR. I dodged a few buildups around Hilton

Head and landed at Smith Reynolds Intl. (KINT) near Winston Salem SC for fuel. After fueling I made a quick pit stop at the FBO, grabbed some nutritious vending food and got back in the plane to beat the heavy storms scheduled to arrive in CLE around 2 PM. The closest I got to convective weather was around Charleston WV. Heavy storms were off my left-wing moving NE. I asked ATC for some deviations around a few cells and with the tail wind I had, not a bad trip. I filed IFR 8,000 feet this leg.

I landed back at Elyria around 12:45 PM and by the time I unloaded and put the plane away the rain started just as I got into the car to leave the airport. Talk about timing! The whole trip added 15.9 hours on the RV TACH. All in all it was a pleasant although short trip, something you could only do in a GA airplane!

PETE KLAPP - BUILDER DEDICATED CHAPTER MEMBER

08/26/1947 - 09/03/2021



There are no guarantees in life. Our warranties expire at birth. We mourn the loss of loved ones and friends on an all too regular basis- especially as we move through life. It never gets easier. So, when we lose a friend, Father, and Grandfather way too early in his life, it makes it especially difficult. Pete Klapp was a great friend, loving Father and doting Grandfather who left us way too soon.

Pete was born in Plainfield, NJ, attended St. Joseph's High School in Metuchen, NJ, and then Walsh College in Canton, OH, where he earned his BA in History. He then enlisted in the US Air Force and served during the Vietnam War. Upon finishing his active-duty commitment, he returned to the US and earned a BS in Civil Engineering from the University of Akron and obtained his professional engineer's license. He worked as a civil engineer at Republic Steel, Enduro Steel, and Goodyear Aerospace. In 1988, he began his own business, Well-Built Homes, proudly serving customers as a meticulous craftsman for over thirty years. Along the way, he satisfied his yearning to learn to fly and earned his Private Pilot License.

Pete decided to build an experimental aircraft, a KR-2S. It took well over twenty years to complete and it was a beautiful aircraft. However, during Pete's building time, a close friend and fellow EAA member died very suddenly. Pete's friend had also been building his own experimental aircraft over the period of 24 years. Unfortunately, his friend never got to fly it as he passed away before the aircraft was totally completed. Pete put his own project on hold, promising his friend's family that he would finish the aircraft and get the FAA inspection. That's who Pete was-a true friend who would do anything for anyone. Good to his word and with help from his fellow EAA members, he oversaw the completion of the aircraft and received the FAA Airworthiness Certificate. The airplane flew beautifully, a testament to the builder's efforts and to Pete's expertise and willingness to see the project to completion.

Pete did eventually complete his beautiful KR-2S and receive the FAA sign-off for his aircraft. Unfortunately, it was during the flight-testing phase that he passed away. He was doing what he loved-flying an airplane that he built with his own two hands-a joy that not many people get to experience.

Pete leaves behind two loving children David (Beth) Klapp and Anna (Chad) Malek, and his five grandchildren, Jeremy and Melanie Klapp, Max, Mia, and Luca Malek, former wife Tory (Terry) McGonegal. He is also survived by his siblings, Sharon (John) Ellicson, Philip (Denise) Klapp and Louise (Larry) Pettit and sister-in-law Linda Romano Klapp, as well as numerous in-laws, nieces, nephews, and friends.

Pete's children Anna and David have fond memories of attending EAA events with their father throughout their lives. In 2017, Pete proudly brought them, his grandchildren, and some extended family to AirVenture Oshkosh to share his aviation passion. Many fellow EAA members will remember Pete as he was a very active member in Chapter 846 and before that in Chapter 82. We consider ourselves fortunate to have known Pete and called him our friend.

Bob graduated from Columbia (OH) High School and earned his BS in mechanical engineering from Ohio Northern University.

Bob married Lauren Peskar on August 6, 1982. Their union lasted 25 years and produced three sons: Michael, born in 1985, Kevin, born in 1989, and Robert, born in 1993. In 2009, Bob married Ginny Jewett, and they remained married until his death. Bob is survived by his wife Ginny, mother Thelma, sons Michael (Sarah) of West Lafayette, IN, Kevin (Kelley) of Seville, OH, and Robert (Colleen) of Columbus, OH, grandsons Louis and Edwin of West Lafayette, IN, and granddaughter Colette of Seville, OH.

Bob spent many years as the Chapter Treasurer. Chapter members could always find him behind the grill for summer cookouts. He offered his hangar and his grill for the first chapter cookout, which was a hit with members. Cookouts have become a staple of the summer chapter gatherings. Bob could always be counted on as a volunteer for any chapter events and he would do anything to help others. He was very accommodating with his time, talent, tools, and advice while assisting many chapter members with their aviation or personal projects.

Bob will always be greatly missed by all those who knew him. He will be fondly remembered as an exemplary EAA Chapter 846 member, loving husband, father, and grandfather. We miss his smile, his great laugh, and his willing attitude to help whenever asked.

The Board decided the April 14, 2022 regular monthly meeting will start the summer cookouts. David Gerdeman will provide the cookout.


With no other business to be brought before the board, the meeting was adjourned at 20:43.
