President's Corner.... By Chapter 43 President Jim Wood

Hi Fliers,

Sure has been some beautiful flying weather – hope you've been able to go out and enjoy it!

If you were able to attend our August Chapter Gathering, you heard about some new and unique activities that we're going to give a whirl. The first event will be held Saturday morning September 28, 2024. We are going to hold an *Artful Fly-Out* to Sterling, CO (KSTK) to visit the Short Wing Piper Club's Southwest Regional Fly-In. Two things will make this fly-out unique...

First, participating pilots will be able to accept an "Artful Flying Challenge" for either or both legs of the flight. These challenges will be designed to spark the desire to become more artful in our flying — to begin crafting our aviation masterpieces. Stay tuned for details on the specific challenges. Participation in any challenge is, obviously, completely optional – you are absolutely welcome to ignore the challenges and simply fly to Sterling any way you want if you decide not to play. We'll still love you...

Second, we are going to attempt to coordinate a "Match Game" with this Fly-Out – matching participating **pilots** with Chapter 43 **passengers** that are either: new to the Chapter, don't yet have their certificate, don't have access to an airplane, or are just interested in experiencing a different airplane or pilot. The sooner pilots signup and let us know what limitations you have on your passenger(s), the sooner we can match passengers to them. The signup link (for pilots and passengers) is posted here <u>Artful Fly-Out</u>. As you would expect, the pilot-in-command has the last and final authority as to which passengers fly in his/her aircraft.

I sincerely hope that you'll give this new Fly-Out format a try. We plan to try a similar Fly-Out on the last Saturday of October – likely out to Oshkosh, Nebraska. Stay tuned for details...

This month marks our Post-Oshkosh Pizza Party at John Stewart's hangar – September 14th at 11:00 a.m. Please bring your Oshkosh photos on a USB drive to Herrill Davenport to be included in the slideshow. We'd love to hear about your Oshkosh adventures — just grab the mike and tell the story! I'll be on a National Geographic expedition exploring Alaska and the inner passage as well as British Columbia at the time, so I won't be able to attend the festivities.

This past month, I had a wonderful one-on-one meeting with Metro Airport Director Erick Dahl. My first impression was that he's a very sharp cookie. I certainly liked the guy and loved that he gave me almost two hours of his time and attention listening to our GA issues. Erick has agreed to speak at our October Chapter Gathering. As always, please let me know what you'd like me and/or our Chapter to start doing, stop doing, or continue doing...



Before I start rambling on, if anyone wants to suggest a name for the NO NAME COLUMN, please make a suggestion!!! I continue to get feedback (most of it is positive .) So thank you. If there's a topic you'd like me to pontificate about, let me know, I'm sure we have some wise souls in the chapter that would love to contribute.

August was not the most fun month for the Goldstein's. I got back from Oshkosh and Air Force Museum and promptly contracted COVID along the way. I'm pretty sure I contracted it at the Museum as when I walked in the door upon our return it's like someone let all the blood out of the bottom of my foot. YUK. But on a flying note. After about 2 weeks I started feeling much better. I was itching to get in the air. WOW was that a mistake. No sooner than the wheels leaving the ground I immediately felt like crap. I knew this was going to be a very short ride, which is what it was. A couple of turns, back to the pattern. Uneventful landing and back to the couch. It really took about 4 weeks to get over the yukky feeling. I dutifully shared the virus with Bobbi who was most appreciative and at one point she sent me to Salida for a couple of days to get me out from under her feet. Happy to say, we're both doing fine, but that little flight, let's just say, don't fly until you're really, really, really, ready!!!

The Airplane is officially on it's fourth set of spark plug wires for noise in the radios. I just replaced the top wires, and the noise has significantly dropped. I'll change the bottoms when I take off the bottom Cowl during the conditional inspection.

It's taken me awhile but I'm pushing my approach speed down using my AOA after all these years. Scott Serani commented on my continued passing of the turn off at Erie and I finally went out and practiced one approach after another getting that speed down to 62 +/- 1 knot. It's made a world of difference, just feels funny. The AOA really helps to maintain the speed.

Took the Glider up on a cloudless pitifully dry day. Thermals and convergence are often associated with cloud formation, but naturally occur due to heat off the surface below. Without the clouds, you have to poke around to find lift. Fortunately, there are places on a hot cloudless day where Thermals do normally occur. I still consider myself just below a novice; I'm really still learning. John Stewart had just towed another pilot back to an area to about 10K feet. I got off tow at 9100 feet, looked down and realized I'd gotten off tow way too early. I just passed a thermal and saw 6 knot climb. I made a critical mistake as 3 knots were due to the tow plane which only left a 3 knot climb. The ground looked really close to me although I had at least 1500 feet below. I knew I was ok but turned back to lower ground cruising back from where I came. A fellow glider, the only other one up in a much better performing glider indicated lift over the hogback and the 29th Street mall. (We call that a parking lot thermal @.) Down to 8500 feet with the airport within gliding distance, I found a 4 to 6 knot thermal and began to work it. I continued westward as I'd risen to 13K over the course of about 20 minutes. I was as far back as Gold Lake, along an area of known lift on those cloudless days. I could go on, but...3 ½ hours later I ventured back to the glider box to make a mediocre landing.

The whole flight could have gone a lot better but the hose came out of my camel back and so I had no water. On a hot day as it was you really do need to hydrate in the glider. For those wondering, the fun is applying your skills to centering the Thermals, and using some new electronic tools to help the process. I couldn't keep up with a hawk but he knew where to go, and following him is always a good idea.

The Pizza picnic is this Saturday, and once again, I'll be out of town, but I hope everyone shares their OSH stories and enjoys the fellowship of our wonderful chapter. Looking forward to seeing you all soon... And don't forget, I'll take most any name for my ramblings. It's getting cooler so get out and FLY!!!

Road Trips in the Works - Chuck Kubin

One of the coolest aspects of doing the coolest thing you can do, flying, is going to cool places and doing cool stuff.

Just call me Captain Roadtrip. If flying in is an option, I'll check into it and provide details. Here's some ideas I'm working on:

*Visit to Wings Over the Rockies — I have an "in" as a docent, so I'll try to get us a more detailed and longer tour than usual, plus a "behind the curtain" look at the restorations area. Hoping for some discussion about acquisitions and the actual work to meet museum vs. airworthy standards. Recent highlights: the second stage of a ULA rocket, the "Baby BOOM" 2/3 mockup of the next-generation supersonic transport, and a 1926 Eaglerock. A long shot, but since Harrison Ford is a huge backer, maybe we could do a Facebook interview with him from the museum theater. And Lowry Beer Garden and an ice cream stand in a rocket is right next door.

*Visit BOOM — One of about 158 aerospace companies associated with KAPA, this is the company developing aircraft capable of traveling over land without blowing out your picture windows as we will hear a thump instead of a sonic BOOM. Planes are built in Alabama, so we'll be talking to developers about concepts and production.

*Visit the towers at KAPA and/or KBJC — Over years I did both, and back then they toured small handfuls of visitors or a still relatively small group divided into shifts.

*Flight for Life — All the details are pending what we can get, but the concept is to see the birds up close and talk to the pilots, planners and responders.

*National Museum of WWII Aviation/Westpac Restoration — Smallish, intimate museum has 28 FLYING aircraft on display and 10 more in restoration, including B-25 "In the Mood," the only flying P-47, Dauntless dive bomber, one of six remaining F7-F Tigercats, P-38... Westpac, right next door, gets you right into the thick of the work. Located on the northern tip of KCOS.

*Pueblo Weisbrod Aircraft Museum — WOW! Where to start! Nationally famous, dedicated to the B-24, but it doesn't have a B-24 (12 B-17s and -24s are rumored to be buried near Pueblo). It does have a small museum, two huge hangars and a big outdoors display with the B-29 "Peaches," a B-47, B-17, A-26, C-45, MiG 15 and -17, F-80, T-33, F-80, F-104, F-86, and even the Sikorsky Seabat 'copter that fished Alan Shepherd and Friendship 7 out of the drink in 1961. Located on KPUB.

*Denver Air Route Traffic Control Center (ZDV), Longmont. See what it takes to coordinate a region's worth of air traffic.

*Oshkosh, Neb.— sweet roll/donut humanitarian rescue mission. Repeating a favorite.

*Space Command satellite operations — My aviation merit badge wingman was recently promoted from satellite driver to satellite driver supervisor at a Space Command detachment at Peterson AFB. He briefly mentioned a control room visit once, so I'll look into it. No, you don't get to see the classified stuff...even if you could tell what it is.

*USAF Academy — Visitor center is free and the famous chapel (NOT built from spare airplane parts, as rumored) is open daily. The trip can continue into CS to get either the best barbecue or German food in Colorado. Or maybe one of three distilleries or several breweries.

*Back to FlyteCo — In the wake of our 5-star rated 2023 banquet, several members are interested in going back as a group for some social time.

So that should keep us busy for awhile. Hit me at <u>dreamwoodck@yahoo.com</u> with your ideas, and if you want to register high interest in any of what's here. I'll turn up the heat on what seems the most popular and from here I'll get with Jim and the VPs to target some dates.



MILE HIGH EAA Chapter 43 Minutes August 10, 2024

Chapter 43 President Jim Wood opened tonight's gathering at 6:00 with the introduction of New Members and Social Time, enjoying our Potluck dinner. Three guests were in attendance. One guest – Dennis Holliday – joined the Chapter with a five-year membership.

TONIGHT'S SPEAKERS – Anna MacAuliffe from the NOAA Small Aircraft program and NOGAP survey team.

Anna discussed the general NOAA program involving airborne environmental surveys in a Mooney aircraft, sampling, at altitude, for numerous climate parameters. Anna described the aeronautical, technical, and logistical challenges of flying the Mooney across a predetermine path around the United States. She described the sampling protocols along with the unique nature of the testing equipment.

Several meeting participants asked question about all aspects of these survey flights. Overall, this was a wonderful presentation that was well received by our membership.

After the presentation, the business meeting segment of the Chapter Gathering was opened at 7:45 by Jim Wood.
