# **President's Corner - by Chapter President Josiah Harmon**

Hello all,

For those that were not able to make it to the April meeting, we held a special election for the office of President. I am both humbled and excited to be your new chapter president. Since I am a relatively new member I figured I would share a bit about my journey in aviation.

Growing up five minutes away from the Boeing plant in Everett, WA, my eyes were fixed on the skies from a young age. Something about seeing a 747 take its first flight put the love of aviation deep in my bones. My Dad was equally fascinated with airplanes and took my brother and I to air shows from a young age. In fact, my first touch with general aviation was a Young Eagles flight at a local air show. I still remember that beautiful v-tail Bonanza with a bright orange 70's interior, and the sound of that big bore Continental roaring to life.

However, I also loved producing and playing music. After college I worked in technical roles with non profits, producing live events. I ended up moving to Nashville in 2016 for a change of pace. In fairly short order I found myself installing AVL equipment in live performance venues all around the country for Nashville-based AV companies.

Then 2020 happened. Those tumultuous early months of COVID gave me time to stop and think about what I wanted in life. I realized the AVL industry was not for me in the long term. So I thought "hey, maybe I should check out that aviation thing again!" One discovery flight and I was hooked. The next two years were spent trying to figure out how to work a full time job that required travel, while working through my ratings. After some good counsel I realized I couldn't do both. So I scrimped and saved as much as I could, then quit my job in September 2023.

After moving home to Seattle, planes and instructors became so expensive it did not make sense to continue there. I searched all over the U.S. and found Rocky Mountain Flight School (shameless plug). So I packed up once again and moved to the front range in February 2024. Last year I obtained my Commercial, CFI, CFII, and Commercial Multi-Engine ratings. Now I'm instructing at Rocky Mountain and Odyssey Pilot Hours towards my dream of becoming an airline pilot.

Although I do love the big jets, my heart will always be in general aviation. My goal is to bring the same enthusiasm I felt at 10 years old in that Bonanza to everything I do in aviation, including Chapter 43. Airplanes are just so cool!

Youth, education, community, and communication are what I am focused on. I have started conversations with the Director of the local 99's chapter to collaborate on an event or two together, and am actively attempting to recruit more pilots with planes for Young Eagles events. Several of us

in the chapter are collaborating on better communication strategies, including reviving our social media pages and implementing some kind of group messaging platform for members.

Chapter 43 has a lot of great things going and I am truly excited for our future together. But remember - it takes each and every person to create a vibrant community. 

### **CLIFF'S NOTES MAY 2025**

April was a flying month. Bobbi rushed out to Long Beach to help with my son who ended up in the hospital (he's fine now), and I flew to Carlsbad in the 14 to meet up with my sister to help finish an addition to their house, and see my son. I left Erie at about 7 with a brief stop at Clark Memorial (KCMR). Fuel at \$5.29 and field elevation of 6691. CMR is SW of Grand Canyon. Great place to stop as it's more than half way and easy descent without having steep climbs on the way out. After leaving CMR it was about an hour to the Parker VOR to pick up an IFR clearance for a descent into the south California airport. (McClellan-Palomar - Editor.) It was severe clear but I enjoy the practice. Nothing like keeping your speed up when there are 4 behind you. Rare as it may seem, I had a tail wind all the way out. That almost assured head winds on the way home.

Got to see my wounded son and spent time with family in Vista, and it was time for the return trip with Bobbi back on board. Filed IFR all the way home and we were off with excellent routing, being able to go through the cold MOA's (Military Operations Area - Editor.) along the route. A smooth ride at 13K sipping 6.8 GPH and 158 kts. The wind gods were neutral giving no help eastward but fortunately no headwinds. I always expect the call regarding climbing to 16K around Dove Creek VOR where I normally switch to flight following and continue on a little longer but lower route home.

We landed nonstop in about 5 hours with about 15 gallons in the tank. A great ride all around, one I enjoy taking. Lil performed as advertised with no squawks on our return. YAY.

I took over as ship manager of a Discus glider, which I'm not checked out to fly. It's been rewarding to learn the ins and outs of a gel coat wing and the simple mechanics of how these things are put together. Like an AD that had not been done since 1992, requiring drilling two blind holes in the vertical stab to access the bolts to replace the elevator control rod.

A lot of the connecting control rods are accessed by cutting a hole in the aircraft which makes annual inspections or conditional really simple as there is little to take apart 'cause you'd be cutting holes everywhere. Not what I'm used to but that's to keep the ships super slippery.

We finally got one of the two-man ships back from 9 months of maintenance. I was intimidated flying the DG with little time in it but off we went with an instructor on board for the spring check out. The first tow up to 7500 feet included stalls, steep turns and an approach to glider 26, a runway I've almost never landed on, with different visual clues. This resulted in being way too high (can never have too much altitude) a full forward slip with the spoilers deployed and a long coast on the runway as we were taking off to the East. The landing was dead on with tail and mid wheel touching together and full stick back. The next ride up we left the tow plane again at 7500 feet. John Stewart flew us through a fat thermal East of BDU resulting in an easy climb to 9300 Feet. Rob, my instructor, helped me smooth out my soaring technique. We could have stayed up all day. But others were waiting for the glider, and I had one more take off to go.

We approached the runway and there was a glider staging so after dropping the gear and deploying the spoilers, Rob said to loiter for the glider to clear the runway. That was easy as we were stuck in another thermal and my loitering resulted in another easy climb to 8300 feet. As I began my descent again with a gradual turn to the North, we had a Bald Eagle blaze by enjoying the thermal we were departing. Rob suggested a little less aggressive (ha ha) approach to 26, which again yielded another great landing. The next ride up to complete our spring check out resulted in a swift climb to 6000 feet where Rob released from the tow simulating a rope break. Not much decision as we performed a smooth turn back to RWY 26. The landing was still correct, but with the excitement of the rope break I grabbed the brake which did not help getting the glider to the other end of the field. Oh well, I needed the exercise as we pushed the DG back to its stall. It was a great soaring day instilling tons of confidence. Can't wait to go up again.

Speaking of ship manager, there was a conversion from a drum brake on the Discus to a disk which greatly improved stopping. A fellow aviator, Reed, helped facilitate the conversion and it was finally tested yesterday. With high pressure finally pushing into the mountains, Bobbi and I flew to Salida to enjoy a weekend with our friends. Just a little bumpy on the back side of the low but a quick 45-minute ride. It's flying season so get out and fly.

Hey, our annual picnic is coming up in June with help from many members of the chapter. It's a happening event at John Stewart's hanger so plan to walk, golf cart, drive or fly for this great event. Don't forget the chapter is supplying the meats and drinks. Please plan to bring deserts, salads, and other sides. This should be a fantastic event to bring the family to. See you next month!



First Chapter in Colorado – June 1958

**B-25 Project** – Young Aviators

Lots of chapter members were involved; Andy asked Scott Serani to explain.

Young Aviators was started in 2009 with Young Eagles who wanted more. Scott introduced Trice McEwen, whose husband started the B-25 as a playhouse for their sons, then donated it to the Young Aviators. With experienced experimental aircraft builders and the kids, the project grew from a static display to a full-fledged 4-person simulator serving as Kid Venture's marquee activity for 7 years, with 75 people who were involved in transportation, setup, "ground school" and operations. 2 years ago the Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum offered it a home where it is utilized year round!

5. Current Activities – We're doing a lot!

Young Eagles – Cliff Hasenbalg said that Chapter 43 has flown more than 6000 Young Eagle flights since the program started. There's always a need for pilots and ground crew, especially someone to

present aviation basics to kids while they wait for their flight. Volunteers need to complete Youth Protection training and a background check. Events are held from March through October on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday of the month, pilots arrive 15 minutes early for a briefing.

VMC – Andre' Smith is the coordinator; a show of hands indicated a good percentage of the meeting attendees attend VMC. Jim Wood is bringing in scenarios.

IMC – Larry Earnshaw coordinates this club, specialized for IFR flying. The scenarios are engaging, and always end with "What would you do?" discussions. There are also quizzes on procedures and FAR.

Builders' Club – Andy McRae coordinator. Andy thanked faithful attendee Stan Specht. Not just Homebuilding, but discussion of mechanics and inspections.

Scholarship – Scott Serani said we had 35 applicants in 2024, 9-10 were interviewed and 6 were awarded scholarships. His son Eric was the first Chapter 43 scholarship awardee! 25 scholars have gotten their private pilot certificate and several went on to the Air Force Academy! Andy noted that lots of folks make all this happen!
