



By 1944, at the age of 21, Goebel had completed 61 missions with 11 Victories in his Mustang. "Goebel's memoir, a classic of combat aviation gives the reader a true sense of what is was like to fly and fight as a World War II fighter pilot." [back cover]

The book contains 14 pages of black and white photos of Goebel and his fellow pilots, a 6 page glossary, Goebel's mission list, and his Victory list, and transcripts of several mission reports.

Following the war, Geobel, using the GI Bill, earned a degree in physics, and then rejoined the Air Force for the next 30 years. He worked on the Gemini launch vehicle for NASA and on the Skylab project.

Kim Kovach is restoring 2 vintage airplanes for Kermit Weeks Fantasy of Flight Museum. It turns out that both of Kermit's airplanes have hand sewn envelopes! He changed his mind at the last minute and wanted Dacron, and we are machine sewing the envelopes with Dacron thread..... but then we are doing a decorative non-structural "over sew" with cotton thread. Stitches are hand sewn at the rate of 5 stitches per inch. Yes sir! 5 stitches per inch hand sewn on all trailing edges and all root ribs on all fabric for both airplanes. Several HUNDRED hours of hand sewing! Were talking biplanes with 24 and 30 ft wing spans! Plus four lingeron seams per fuselage! WOW! The stitching shows through the tapes so it's gotta be there! Imperfect stitch spacing is important.



Congratulations to Tom Jeffery who soloed his grandfather's Cessna 172 on November 10th at Mettetal. Roy Hayden bought the Mettetal based 172 recently to keep his hand in flying after retiring from years as a commercial pilot. Tom's instructor is John St. Peter, who you may remember guided his son on the new airport compass rose project.

David and Jack Groat finally got their engine installed and are looking forward to moving the RV-10 project to Willow Run Airport for final assembly. Their presentation at last month's meeting was very impressive, especially the level of comfort they afford themselves in their workshop. It looks like many of our houses




LETTER FROM KATHY BITONTI

AN ELECTRONIC ATTITUDE INDICATOR

I have been intrigued by the technologies that have recently become available to the masses. The coming of cell phones, and particularly smartphones have exposed the use of some very interesting behaviors that are based on location and orientation of the mobile device. A smartphone typically tends to include a GPS, accelerometers, LED lights, a touchscreen and various communications protocols.

Meanwhile mechanical aircraft instruments remain expensive, and need regular maintenance. Numerous electronic gismos and offerings by Garmin, Dynon, Grand Rapid Technologies, etc including engine monitoring, GPS, synthetic vision, AHRS, etc are becoming mainstream, and available to factory and homebuilt airplanes. These electronic devices tend to be expensive. A mobile handheld aircraft GPS is generally about ten times more expensive than its automotive peers.

I have sorely missed having an attitude indicator in my homebuilt Quickie Q200. So I decided to build an electronic one using parts available to hobbyist all over the world. The one I have built uses a tiny full function computer available on a small footprint board, to which I have added an IMU board (which provides gyros, accelerometers and magnetometers), and then added a 2.3 inch color screen. A friend and I have wired and programmed this setup and added traditional graphics. Then designed a small container to house the electronics and screen, which we have then 3D printed. See pictures nearby. There is a little more work to be done in packaging and compacting the setup, and making a clip to attach this to my instrument panel. Although it is setup to be powered from the 12volt cigarette lighter socket, I am also considering adding a cellphone battery to make it self-contained.

I have been testing this instrument in my car and hope to take this up in my plane in next week or 2. Based on observations from testing it, we have made some changes to the program. I have also added a G-meter, a reset button, and a heading gage. Now I need to add a power on off switch.

During the last chapter meeting people had asked if I was doing this as a hobby or wanted sell these commercially. The main reason that I built this was to understand and deploy and benefit from emerging technologies, as well as create a cheaper alternative to traditional instruments. I plan to make up a few of these units and do a



survey to determine if anyone would be interested in using, testing, or owning it. If this instrument proves robust and usable in my plane, then if anyone would have interest in having one, I would be happy to arrange that.
