Ford Tri-Motor Weekend Recap

s Mark mentioned in his opening letter, the Tri-Motor tour stop last weekend turned out to be a wonderful experience for all involved. We had a great turnout and, with the exception of Saturday afternoon, the weather was almost perfect. Leading up to the event, I was curious about what kind of crowd this airplane would attract. I assumed that some of our more senior citizens who had fond memories of that bygone era of aviation would be the primary candidates but I wasn't sure whether the younger generations would have much interest. I could not have been more wrong. All age groups, from about 4 to 94 were pretty much evenly represented. I spoke to one 94 year-old gentlemen who had flown on a new Tri-Motor back in 1929 and he still had very vivid memories of that first flight. He was thrilled to be able to see it again.

The people were also uniformly enthusiastic. Listening to them while they deplaned, I thought I might hear one or two negative comments, even if it was just about the noise or the bumps. I was wrong again. I didn't hear a single one. Most of them were on the order of "Now that was FUN!". Everyone came off of the airplane smiling. On several flights I could see the passengers giving the flight crew a spontaneous ovation.

Despite Saturday afternoon's schedule getting cut short by the weather, we still managed to get off 45 flights over the four days! Even on Thursday, which we expected would entail just three or four flights for the media and VIP passengers, there was a large walk-up crowd and we dispatched seven flights. So in addition to all the positive exposure the event generated for EAA, our Chapter and the airport, it also means we will get some significant revenue from it. Ernie O'Roark, the Tri-Motor committee finance chair, reported that, thanks to the efforts of Dean Stickell, Doug Kelly, Joe Halleman, Chris Gunther and other committee members, we did make our \$4,000 sponsorship goal. That means that our Chapter will receive \$5 for every revenue seat that was sold. It will be a couple of weeks before those numbers have all been

crunched, but we are probably looking at something around \$1,500 or more that we will receive back from EAA.

As the committee operations chair, I want to once again thank all those who volunteered for the ground crew. The flights on all four days went off very smoothly and, most important, safely. The flight crew was very complimentary about the whole operation. Over the last few months, at the Chapter meetings and in the newsletters, we asked for a big effort from the Chapter members because this was such a large and important undertaking. And you responded! Twenty-two of you volunteered to help out. That's almost 50% of our current roster! That undoubtedly was a big reason the event was such a success.


