Susan Dusenbury of Walnut Cove, North Carolina, a longtime vintage aircraft enthusiast and Vintage Aircraft Association member and chapter leader, was named VAA’s president in February 2017.

Dusenbury began flying at the age of 15 on a private airport (Overton Field) located near her shared hometowns of Andrews and Pawley’s Island, South Carolina, and earned her private pilot certificate during her senior year in high school. She is a graduate of Francis Marion University with a degree in accounting and business administration. While in college, Dusenbury also earned her commercial, multi-engine, instrument, and flight instructor certificates. She also holds an associate degree in aviation maintenance technology.



Dusenbury is a longtime EAA and VAA member and volunteer and is president of the Carolinas - Virginia Antique Airplane Foundation (EAA Vintage Chapter 3). She served on the national EAA board of directors as a volunteer director for 20 years, and recently retired from ABX Air (formally Airborne Freight Corporation) after flying 25 years of night freight. She has owned and/or restored several vintage airplanes, including an Aeronca 7AC Champ, a Luscombe 8A, an Inland Sport, a KR-21, and a Culver Cadet. She now owns and flies a 1953 Cessna 180 and a 1937 Taylor J-2 Cub from her farm in North Carolina and is currently restoring a 1935 Stinson SR-6 Reliant.

Fred, a skilled aircraft pilot, airshow pilot, A&P mechanic, model flyer and airplane designer is truly a surgeon with a welder. Over the years Fred has welded more than a dozen steel fuselages.

The workshop emphasis was “hands on” with the prime intent to give the youth in the Saturday morning airplane build program the basic knowledge of welding. At the outset of the session Fred reviewed the various techniques used on joining both ferris and aluminum as used in aircraft. Following the short introduction the fun began with the hands-on. Each participant had ample opportunity to produce a weld bead and join both steel and aluminum pieces using either one of the two TIG welder available.

Later in the year we will impose on Fred to do another welding seminar for those members who could not attend. After Oshkosh we will be scheduling either the English Wheel or Milling machine seminar for the membership.

EAA 690 Aviation Summer Camp June 10 – 14, 2019 Our 8th year!

Alpha Camp for ages 12 and 13 campers will learn about and do the following: Model aviation, build wooden wing ribs and mount to a spar for a wing section, cover wing section with fabric and learn how to shrink the fabric (really cool), learn about and fly drones, build a metal toolbox, learn air traffic rules and practice listening and talking to air traffic controllers on practice radios provided by GARS (Gwinnett Amateur Radio Society).

Bravo Camp for ages 14 and 15 campers will learn about and do the following: Design/make model airfoils and test them in a wind tunnel, advanced model aviation, learn names of tools and how to use them, listen to and ask questions of speakers in career session (parents are invited, Tuesday at 10:30), fly a detailed flight plan on a simulator, build a metal aileron section (a control surface on planes), learn basic electronics, learn about and fly drones, learn TIG welding, learn how a helicopter works and is different from a fixed wing plane.

Charlie Camp for ages 16, 17 and 18 campers will have flight lessons as weather permits and take ground school classes. We thank Bruce Buell at Advanced Aviation on the Lawrenceville Airport for helping Chapter 690 with this camp. This camp is for those serious about becoming a licensed pilot.
