Saturday: Weather in the Midwest did not encourage much air travel. Zero float planes today. In past years J-3 Cubs were already swinging at anchor along with other miscellaneous early birds. Work schedules got redirected to the boathouse. Lunch from



the Styrofoam box – mmmmm. A few interesting conversations filled in the slack time and the task of recoiling 500 ft of dock line completed my shift.

Sunday: Some GA water planes arrived early along with a couple vendor planes. It is starting to look like an air show. Took a mid-day break to find Jim Cody at the Redbarn flymart. Didn't have time to stop but the Chapter 75 banner is flying at the campgrounds nearby. Back at the seaplane base we finished our shifts by shuffling a few airplanes to new locations. Sloppy Joes for supper. Things get serious tomorrow.



The seaplane base recorded 100 degrees mid-afternoon and a few pilots may have learn a bit about density altitude. The seaplane base now has a transient colony of Beavers all capable of hauling huge amounts of cargo. More heat. Took another load of marketable stuff to Jim Cody at the Red Barn/fly mart. Said a quick hello to some Chapter 75 friends then a fast return to slightly cooler temps near the lake. All in all it was a pretty flat day with the exception of a nice formation fly-bye from some Beechcraft produces. Very cool to watch, but had no effect on raw temperature. Might have a cold liquid dinner this evening.

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
