ATG launches programs to develop maintenance workforce

Aircraft Technologies Group (ATG) has launched two new programs to combat the impending shortage of skilled aviation maintenance technicians.

"Younger people are not being attracted to the aero maintenance trades in sufficient numbers to replace the older technicians that are retiring, nor to compensate for the expected industry growth," said Jay Logie, founder and CEO of ATG. "These two programs are aimed at attracting young people and to provide hiring companies access to thousands of qualified individuals. It's time for a new approach."

Aviation NETWorX and the Aero Skills Tournament, under development for five years, are now live online with a full market Beta test, he noted.

Aviation NETWorX is an integrated, data connection system and virtual office providing aircraft maintenance, manufacturing companies and trade schools access to thousands of skilled people at the click of a mouse.

The NETWorX platform is a self-serve, multi-port system based upon the philosophy ATG has used to vet skilled tradespeople successfully for the past 17 years, according to company officials.

Aero Skills Tournament (AST), administered through NETWorX, is a platform to raise awareness and create excitement to attract and draw people into the aviation trades from trade school and industry communities.

The outreach campaign uses competition events designed to plant the seed with the younger generation about careers in the aviation maintenance field, company officials explained. More than 40 Part 147 schools have expressed interest in the program. Exhibition events are planned for this year, with regional and national competitions in 2017.



WAI scholarships for 2017 expected to top \$600,000

Applications are now being taken for Women in Aviation's scholarships for 2017. As of early July, the association is offering 98 scholarships valued at \$499,000. Scholarships are available for nearly every interest in aviation and aerospace and include academic scholarships, flight training scholarships, aviation maintenance centered scholarships, advanced flight ratings and type ratings, and a wide variety of other options, according to WAI officials.

The majority of these scholarships will be awarded at the 28th annual International Women in Aviation Conference at Disney's Coronado Springs Resort March 2-4, 2017, in Lake Buena Vista, Florida.

Additional scholarships are expected to be added in the coming months, and the total value of awarded scholarships typically reaches more than \$600,000 annually, officials noted. For the first time, scholarship applications may be submitted electronically through WAI.org/scholarships. Applications may also be mailed through the traditional postal process as well. "Scholarship awards are a major benefit of membership in Women in Aviation International. Since the inception of our scholarship program 20 years ago, WAI has awarded more than \$10 million to its members to help them reach their goals and advance into the aviation and aerospace careers they have always dreamed about," said WAI President Dr. Peggy Chabrian. "Thanks to our generous sponsors, there is truly something for every profession, age group, and interest." The only underlying qualification to apply for a WAI scholarship is that the applicant must be a member of Women in Aviation International by Nov. 1, 2016. Applicants may apply for no more than two scholarships per year. Individual scholarships may have additional qualifications to apply. The deadline for scholarship applications is Nov. 14, 2016.
