#### **Jacob Halmos - Journey to Pilot**

From July to October, I spent 5 days a week at the airport working towards the ultimate goal of getting my private pilot license. My entire summer was dedicated towards studying toward my checkride.

My first solo is a memory that I will never forget. It was a beautiful July evening. Me and my instructor went up in the pattern, the same way we had been doing for weeks prior. After three laps in the pattern, he asked me to taxi back to the ramp. After we shut down, he stepped out, and told me to do the same thing I just did. As I taxied out, my heart was pounding with excitement. I took off and the performance of the airplane was incredible! I remember looking at the Vertical Speed indicator and seeing it go past 1000 feet per minute, in a Cessna! I recall my landings not being the greatest, but as the sun set while I was in the air, everything turned golden. That is a scene I will never forget.

After many months of flying and waiting, the day had finally come for my checkride. I had to take a flight over to Houston to take the test, and it was on the coldest day of the year so far. I remember freezing the entire hour and a half flight there. Once we arrived, the test started. I did great on the knowledge portion, which only took about an hour and fifteen minutes. Once we got in the air, the stress started getting to me. That day was probably my worst day of flying ever. We flew back to the airport, did my landings, and as we taxied back to the ramp, I shut the engine off, and the examiner had one question to ask me: "How does it feel to be the world's newest private pilot?" Those words will forever stick with me throughout the rest of my aviation journey.

My advice to anyone wanting to start this journey is simple: Work hard, and have fun. I feel that over the course of my training, I forgot to have fun. I was just in the mindset of getting my license, and not having fun every time I went up in the air. So take a step back, and ask to go on a flight somewhere new for lunch, or just sightsee. Don't forget how special it is every time you go up in the air, and how magical aviation is. To anyone nervous about their checkride coming up, just remember that your instructor signed you off on this. They think you're prepared, and now you need to know you're prepared as well.





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
