Chapter Leaders Academy: Mr. Chris Davis had an opportunith to attend the EAA Chapter Leaders Academy this past month and relates the following about the event.

I recently had the chance to attend the Experimental Aircraft Association(EAA) Chapter Leadership Academy in Oshkosh Wisconsin. This is a two-day event that brings members from different chapters around the country together to learn new ideas to help their clubs be a bigger success. Most attendees were either club officers or members looking to become more involved.

I flew commercial into Milwaukee, then rented a car and drove the 80 miles north up to Wittman Regional airport in Oshkosh. The event was held at the EAA museum, where about 210 EAA employees work. For a hotel we stayed at the EAA lodge across the street near the Pioneer airport which is adjacent to Wittman. This was my first time driving to Oshkosh - my previous four visits were in a Piper Arrow as pilot in command. The normally green fields of Wisconsin had turned brown due to late fall. Wittman seemed quiet with the normal bustle of AirVenture missing, and the "World's Busiest Control Tower" was anything but.

With attendees arriving the first afternoon, a meal was served in the lodge and then later we rode in the EAA vans over to Sonix aircraft - a kitplane manufacturer based there on the field. The owner reported increased sales due to the economy and gave us a tour. He likes to hire people interested in aviation and several employees had just headed out through their decorated break-room/kitchen. It was decorated with a combination 50's burger bar/aviation theme.

The next day the sessions started at 8AM and ended at 5PM. Different EAA employees would give a powerpoint and then take questions. The sessions had topics such as "Chapters and Tax Status", "Sure Fire Ways to Improve Your Chapter", "Fundraising", "Hallmarks of Highly Successful Chapters", "Growing Chapter Membership", "Activities and Programs", "Perfecting Your Online Presence", "Pathways to Flight", "Media Best Practices", "Chapter Resources", and "Young Eagles Overview".

Some personal take-aways from me were tips on recruiting volunteers (ask individually, not to a group), things not to say to the media "we are not a bunch of guys strapping refrigerator boxes to a set of wings", separating the boring parts of a chapter (administration) from the monthly meeting, etc. The second evening we got an after-hours tour of the EAA museum and the chance to sit in a P51 cockpit. There was a new display there from the CAF with World War 2 nose-art panels. The next day started again at 8 with more presentations that ran until 12, when we departed.

One of the best things about the trip was talking to other attendees. Everyone was friendly and topics discussed were our aviation backgrounds, memorably flights, current projects, etc. Whether you are currently building, flying, retired from flying - there was someone there just like you, eager to disuss common issues.
