
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Cross Country Weather Planning

If you pilots are anything like me, you're always looking for an excuse to fly. A good excuse came up a couple of weeks ago to be in Medford, OR, for a cousin's wedding, so the planning began.

The top thing that comes to mind when planning a long flight is "weather." The consistent thing about weather is that it is never consistent! In the context of a long cross country, you can count on seeing some sort of change along the course of the flight due to



the time spent moving across a larger area. Careful planning is a Chance must and the data that is available these days can give you all of the information you need to determine whether the flight is

possible or not, what altitude(s) to fly, and what detours you should take if needed.

My top tool in preparing for a longer flight is the Aviation Weather Center's website, www.aviationweather.gov. In particular, I primarily use the following portions of the website:

1. Prog Charts under the FORECASTS link—The Surface Prog Charts, sample pic above, allow you to get a rough feel of where the weather (rain, t-storms, snow, ice) is being forecasted across the continental U.S. out as far as 6 days. Obviously it becomes more useful and accurate as your departure time allows you to use the 12, 18, 24 and

48-hour charts. To the untrained eye, the prog charts can paint a gloomy picture. Lots of light green (chance of rain) covered by the red hashed lines (T-storms) looks worrisome, but the "Chance" in the legend on page 1 above means a 25 to 54% chance, whereas "Likely", or the darker colors, mean 55% or greater chance. Practice getting a feel for what the surface prog charts show and compare them to the actual

radar weather for the time the prog chart covered.

- 2. Following the prog charts, the Low level significant weather charts (also under the FORECASTS link) provide good information on the areas that may have lower ceilings and areas of turbulence out to 24 hours in advance. These charts go from the surface up to FL240
- 3. Next, I like to visit the Winds and Temps Aloft under the FORECAST link. Click on the area you'll be flying and it will give winds and temps aloft for the forecast timeframes you're interested in. This helps

you pick the appropriate altitudes for your desired route.

4. When within 24 hours I like to start looking at the Terminal Aerodrome Forecasts (TAFs) for the airports along the route of flight. To determine which airports have TAFs along your route of flight, go to the FORECAST link's TAFs and zoom in on the interactive map, or click on the Regional TAF Plots map.

The FAA has provided Advisory Circulars on the topics of aviation weather: (1) AC 00-45H (Jan 8, 2018) Aviation Weather Services, and (2) AC 00-



06B (Aug 23, 2016) Aviation Weather. These publications can be downloaded as a PDF for free from the FAA's website or you can buy them bound from various suppliers. These are great for learning how to use the information found on the AWC website.

Foreflight: What I've found that works very well in capturing a good preflight weather briefing within a few hours of departure is Foreflight. This iPad app gathers all of the pertinent weather data and NOTAMs and a very well organized set of pages to review. I'm not a super-user of the product, but I've recently found it to be very handy.

800-WXBRIEF: It's always good to call up a weather briefer to get their input over your route of flight after you've reviewed the weather products yourself. It's a good back-up to your self-briefing. (cont'd on page 4)


When in flight, besides looking out the window, there's nothing much better than having ADS-B In and a GPS moving map display to show the available weather data. As outlined in one of last Fall's newsletters, it provides many weather products in text and graphical formats. Being able to see the developing and moving thunderstorms ahead and making decisions well in advance

can make your flight much more efficient, not to mention safe.

I also recommend flight following. The controllers are able to see weather (and traffic) on your route and they'll be glad to let you know of any concerning weather.


