



90th Year Anniversary, 2018 continued from the September Edition of *The Observer*

Early in the 21st Century, Bachert arranged for federal and state grant money to repave the airport's deteriorating runway, a fundamental necessity for community airports (Federal Small Community Air Service Development Program). This influx of government capital, by regulatory mandate essentially sealed Gettysburg Airport's destiny, guaranteeing the airport's existence for at least, the following twenty years. By 2006 Bachert's creditors were threatening foreclosure. This created a dilemma for the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) when no private or municipal buyers surfaced to purchase the airport's assets. With pressure from FAA, the Susquehanna Area Regional Airport Authority (SARAA) already operating Harrisburg International, Capital City and Chambersburg Airports, reluctantly agreed to purchase Doersom Airport, renaming it Gettysburg Regional Airport (GRA) and officially registered with FAA's cartographers as W05.



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Remembrances of Doersom (Gettysburg) Airport in the 1960's


In the fall of 1963, I was a Gettysburg High School senior and had been taking flight instruction for over a year in a WWII vintage airplane at what was then known as "Gettysburg Airport", a grass strip located on the Mummasburg Road. After acquiring a Private Pilot's license in November, I wanted to get experience in a more modern and sophisticated airplane to use for recreational flying. My search took me to Doersom Airport on Route 30 west of town.

At the time, Don Sullivan, an experienced pilot and mechanic, as well as an FAA certified maintenance inspector, was leasing the airport operation from the Doersom family. Don owned a Cessna 150, a two -place, single-engine, high-wing airplane, which he was willing to rent. He had engaged John Hull, a local businessman and certified flight instructor, to provide training in his plane for interested students. Although I hadn't met him, John was the father of one of my high school classmates. We soon arranged to fly together for a checkout in the Cessna and afterwards he signed me off to rent and fly Don's plane. Ironically, several years later when I bought my first car, John was the Ford Garage salesman and once again we went for a ride before signing the paperwork.

My flight logbook shows that during the period from Dec. '63 to Aug '64, I logged 18 hours of flight time in Don's Cessna and took 14 of my friends and family for rides, including three for their first flight. One memorable flight was taking my 14-year-old brother along to explore the new Washington Dulles Airport on a bitter cold day during Christmas vacation. The airport had just recently opened and traffic was light. The tower cleared us to land in front of a military 707 that was practicing approaches. However, it got too close because of our slow speed and had to go around. Having a 707 overfly us as we touched down was quite exciting for a couple of small-town teenagers! At Doersom it was always exciting to fly at night because there were no runway lights. Don would park his truck at the end of the runway to illuminate the landing area.

In September '64 I started college in the Midwest and while I often returned to visit, I didn't fly again from Doersom for about 30 years. When I next rented a plane there, it was from Don Doersom, who was once again running his family airport. However, my youthful experiences were part of the foundation of my career in aerospace, plus they are the source of many good memories, as well as "hangar flying" stories that would not exist without having an airport in the Gettysburg community.

Dear Gettysburg Barnstormers,



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
