

The EAA Celebrates 75 Years on January 26th!



Paul H. Poberezny

1922-2013

EAA was founded in 1953 by Paul H. Poberezny who served as the organization's president from 1953 to 1989 and then as chairman of the board until 2009. It has grown from a handful of aviation enthusiasts to an international organization representing virtually the entire spectrum of recreational aviation.

Paul Poberezny came from humble beginnings, yet he created one of the world's largest aviation organizations and emerged as one of the 20th century's greatest aviation leaders, creating a worldwide aviation organization and the world's largest annual fly-in event, EAA AirVenture in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

He died at age 91 on August 22, 2013, in Oshkosh after a career that spanned more than 70 years of flight at the controls of more than 500 different types of aircraft.

Tom Poberezny (1946-2022) was first elected president of EAA in 1989, succeeding his father, EAA founder Paul Poberezny.

He assumed additional duties as EAA's Chairman of the Board in February

2009, then retired as chairman of EAA and EAA AirVenture in August 2011.

An accomplished aviator in his own right, Tom was a member of the U.S. National Unlimited Aerobatic Team that captured the World Championship in 1972. The following year, he won the U.S. National Unlimited Aerobatic Championship.

He subsequently flew for 25 years as one wing of the legendary Eagles Aerobatic Team (originally the Red Devils), the most successful civilian precision flying team in history.

During his career with EAA, Tom led a number of the organization's milestone events. In the late 1970s, he spearheaded EAA's first major capital campaign, which supported construction of the

current EAA Aviation Center headquarters and museum complex at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

In 1992, he led the creation of EAA's Young Eagles, which has become the most successful aviation youth program in history.

Realizing the importance of mentoring to the future of aviation, EAA aimed to give one million kids between the ages of 8 and 17 an airplane flight by the centennial of powered flight on December 17, 2003.

The one millionth Young Eagle was flown in October 2003, celebrating the efforts of 85,000 EAA volunteers to reach the goal. The Young Eagles Program has now flown more than 2.2 million young people.

At his service the next day, Bob's impact to not just the Barnstormers, but to

the entire community was evident. The line of people to pay respects wound out the door and around the building.

People from all walks of life were there, young and old. Bob had a passion for all he did, but none more than his love of aviation and encouraging the youth in the community.

His legacy will long be re-

membered in getting the STEM program started in Spring Grove High.

The slogan "Be All You Can Be" was adapted by this former Air Force veteran, and it showed in everything that he did, even in his retirement.

Goodbye, Bob Howe.

Soar on your angel wings.

EAA "Day of Flight"



While EAA members receive notices on EAA events, the general public does not. Many of these events are open to the public. We will attempt to post some of these events here in The Observer.

On December 14th, the EAA held it annual "Day of Flight" event. Day of Flight is an opportunity for EAA

members and aviation enthusiasts to help fuel the future of aviation. By helping EAA to raise funds and awareness for EAA's education, safety, and outreach programs.

This year, \$10,074 was raised to help support The Spirit of Aviation.

Donations to the EAA supports things like:

\$25 provides Materials for a Classroom STEM Activity, \$55 sponsors a Student/Scout on an Overnight in the Museum, \$100 helps Facilitate a Young Eagles Flight, \$1,000 supports an EAA Speaker Series Presenter, and \$5,000 sponsors a Cockpit 360 Tour in One of EAA's Historical Aircraft.

EAA NEEDS YOUR HELP

IMC/VMC Club

There are those that may wonder what “IMC/VMC” means.

Well, **Instrument meteorological conditions (IMC)** are meteorological conditions expressed in terms of visibility, distance from cloud, and ceiling, which are less than the minimums specified for **visual meteorological conditions (VMC)**.

The IMC/VMC Club met on December 10th (the same day as Bob Howe’s memorial service) and answered the questions that were presented last month.



Last Month’s Questions

As usual, there were two questions, one IMC and one VMC.

The IMC question was “What reporting requirements must be met when a pilot declares an emergency and deviates from regulations?”

The answer: **When requested by the Administrator**, a written report

The VMC Question was “In most production, light general aviation aircraft, which instruments rely on a vacuum pump for operation?”

The answer: Two instruments rely on a vacuum pump- Attitude Indicator, Heading Indicator (DG)

For next month, the IMC question is: “What is the difference between a MOCA and MRA on a VOR federal airway?”

Letter To the Editor

Last month, as in this newsletter on the opposite page, I noted that Instagram and Twitter are coming soon. That prompted a few emails to me with the same question:

What would the benefit be to get onto social media? We've got web pages, and we communicate via email. Our pictures are in the newsletter, so we've survived for so long without it, what would it gain?

The Barnstormers consist of members of all ages. Yes, some of us are on the upper end of that age range, and our use (and need) for social media is nowhere as great as the younger members. Technology is rapidly replacing what many of us grew up with— radio, newspapers, magazines, and TV. A wired telephone? What's that? Think about it— that

telephone, radio, TV, stereo, magazine and newspaper subscriptions, and even your desktop/laptop PC are now on one device— your smartphone. Believe it or not, that smartphone is a full-fledged computer in your hand.

A little history: A fraction of the capabilities of what we have in our hands took several thousand air-conditioned square feet in 1943.

The first mainframe computer (the Harvard Mark I) weighed **five tons**, and cost about \$200,000 to build (about \$3,070,500 in 2020 dollars), and the amount of memory was around 45KB. Your smartphone has at least 32GB of memory (1,000 times more memory than that mainframe), is about 4"x 6" x 1/2", weighs maybe a pound, runs on batteries, and costs around 0.0004 percent (4 ten-thousandth) of that 1943

mainframe (\$1,228.20). Some smartwatches reduce that footprint even more.

We need to embrace technology and grow with it. The audio player has replaced the radio, YouTube (and streaming) replaces cable and satellite TV for many. News is off the web. Pictures are on Instagram, and on-the-spot comments are on Twitter.

The "evils" in the new technologies are the same as in the old ones, including slanted reporting, fake news, etc., We need to monitor how we use the various media to avoid those evils.

Remember, this organization will last beyond us, and those that follow us will have a much easier task if we adapt to "the new stuff".
