



Question #1 of the month: You are at a towered field and have accepted a LAHSO clearance and must now do a go-around, can you?


Some airports in the US use land-and-hold-short (LAHSO) operations, meaning you're cleared to land, but only if you're able to do so without going beyond the specific point (usually an intersecting runway) on the roll-out. What if you're forced to go around just before touch-down, you may inevitably head straight for, and cross, that intersecting runway. Would there be a risk of colliding with aircraft operating on the intersecting runway?

Question #2 of the month: What is the (IYIYO) intersection on an excerpt enclosed below of the ILS or LOC RWY 1 in KALB, and how can you use it?





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Furthering Friendships

A Follow-up to "Farewell to a Friend"

In November 2015, on a production date recorded as the 20th, General Aviation News published an article, "Farewell to a Friend." The article was later linked to several other aviation publications electronically. So, the Luscombe appearing in the article, N2054B affectionately known as Huckleberry, and the current owner, Ryan Mudry, and the two prior owners, Jack Hoke and Ken Poley achieved some national notoriety. The article was later published in EAA Chapter 1041's newsletter. (Editor's Note January 2016 *Observer*)

Amazingly, Huckleberry has furthered an additional friendship. In December of 2018, a pilot named Jerry Lipscomb from Foley, AL, contacted Ryan regarding his association with the aircraft. Jerry had found Ryan, as owner, through the FAA and the plane's tail number. Jerry claimed in his initial contact that he had owned the aircraft from 1963 to 1967, later investigation from the CD of FAA records of the plane confirmed Jerry's claim.

Ryan flew Huckleberry to Foley (5R4) to meet Jerry and before the prop stopped turning Jerry came running out to greet them. Jerry related how when he owned the plane it was polished aluminum, with a red factory stripe and a Silvaire logo. During his ownership he had added the wind generator, radio and landing lights. An additional story related the events of a flight over 55 years ago. While flying near Wichita Kansas, Jerry had proposed while aloft to his girl-friend. Their union produced six children and 19 grandchildren.

Jerry took many photographs of Huckleberry and Ryan, additionally some photos were made of Jerry and the plane. The customary initiation flight was made and at 500 feet the controls were turned over to the prior owner. Ryan said that he was amazed at how well Jerry kept the ball in the center of the inclinometer 52 years after his last flight in the Luscombe. They flew over Jerry's house on the Eastern edge of Mobile Bay, where a slightly overgrown turf strip and a yellow Ag-Cat were visible.

Jerry had sold the Luscombe in 1967 to further his venture into aerial application work and had bought an Ag-Cat at that time. Jerry asked Ryan to endorse his logbook with record of their recent flight. While happy to oblige, Ryan was quick to notice over 14,000 hours recorded there. Jerry explained that while he had gotten his license in twin engine aircraft, he never used it, the great majority of those hours were in single engine aircraft mostly crop dusting.

The photos taken on the re-acquaintance flight turned out to not be suitable for enlarging. So, Jerry has decided to drive to Milton Florida, where Huckleberry is based, to get some additional photographs.

The chances of a 70-year-old aircraft having been owned by multiple personalities is probably not uncommon. However, the affection with which Huckleberry has been received, held and later sacrificed is nearly sacrosanct.




