#### Winter is coming...

Winter is coming...and for many, especially those in the northern United States, it means classic cars are covered, motorcycles are tarped, and some airplanes are tucked away in their hangars for a brief hibernation.

At the AOPA Insurance Agency, we occasionally are asked about coverage options when an aircraft is expected to be in a hangar (or maintenance shop) for months at a time. And good news, many carriers offer a different level of coverage for these instances in what is known as "Ground Not In Motion (GNIM)" coverage.

With this option, your aircraft liability coverage remains intact, but there is a big difference in the hull (physical damage) coverage. With this option, your aircraft is covered for physical damage when it's on the ground and not operating under its own power. This means coverage is not in place while flying, taxiing, or even while doing a run-up. For aircraft in certain locations, such as Alaska, the premium savings may make sense, especially if the aircraft isn't going to fly for 6 months. But think about this, even in the winter, it's not uncommon to get that nice, relatively warm weekend, the type of weekend that's perfect for flying. If you've elected GNIM coverage, you might just miss those perfect opportunities to fly. And every year, someone forgets they've reduced their coverage to GNIM and they have a claim while taxiing or landing, etc. – that's a hard phone call because the claim is likely not covered since the aircraft was operating under its own power. This type of coverage is truly for those storing their aircraft on a long-term basis. Really consider if the potential cost savings is worth missing a

flight or even worse, forgetting to restore your insurance to full flight coverage.

#### **Michigan Bill will protect seaplane access** November 14, 2017 By AOPA ePublishing staff

Towns and municipalities in Michigan have been restricting seaplane access to public inland waters in Michigan. A bill before the state Senate would preserve access to public waters by giving the Michigan Aeronautics Commission authority to

protect the state's open water policy, which allows seaplanes to be operated where it is safe to do so



under FAA regulations.

The commission would be able to establish uniformity of operations across the public waters and protect the waters from being restricted to seaplanes by local municipalities, according to AOPA Great Lakes Regional Manager Kyle Lewis who testified Nov. 9 before the Michigan Senate Transportation Committee in support of the bill. Lewis explained that seaplane flight schools, commercial seaplane operators, and one-of-a-kind retreats like Beaver Island and Mackinac Island attract many seaplane pilots and enthusiasts from out of state.

Lewis educated committee members on the training and testing that seaplane pilots undergo, including maritime right-of way, docking techniques, calm and rough water landings, noise abatement, and more. "This training is above and beyond what the average recreational boater or fisherman receives" even though "the average seaplane used for recreation purposes has similar horsepower to that of a wellequipped bass fishing boat," Lewis said in formal testimony.

In addition, pilots use uniform operating procedures "regardless of the state or jurisdiction they are flying into," Lewis said. The bill would give the Michigan Aeronautics Commission the ability to provide that uniformity.

The bill does not include any provisions for "special permitting, licenses, or fees that could become burdensome to seaplane operators," Lewis said, further explaining AOPA's support for the legislation.

In the meantime, Lewis said, "AOPA strongly encourages its membership who operate these type of aircraft to educate their neighbors and communities on floatplane operation routines."

## FAA alerts aircraft operators to fire extinguisher recall

The FAA is urging pilots, mechanics, and operators of general aviation aircraft to determine if a recalled Kidde fire extinguisher is installed in their aircraft, and replace it with an airworthy fire extinguisher.

The agency made the recommendation in a <u>special airworthiness information bulletin</u> (SAIB) issued Nov. 21, noting that many GA pilots and operators may be unaware of the product recall.

The SAIB informs aircraft operators about "certain Kidde fire extinguishers with plastic handles, which may become clogged or require excessive force to discharge and can fail to activate during a fire emergency."

The US Consumer Product Safety Commission issued the recall Nov. 2. It pertains to two styles of Kidde fire extinguishers including plastichandle fire extinguishers and push-button Pindicator fire extinguishers.

There are 134 models of plastic-handle fire extinguishers manufactured between Jan. 1, 1973, and Aug. 15, 2017, affected, the SAIB said, noting that there have been approximately 391 reports of failed or limited fire extinguisher activation, or nozzle detachments. Do you know a budding aviator whose lofty ambitions could be sparkled with a little financial assistance? There are many who fall into that category, and Chapter 1093 is ready to help. Our Scholarship Committee sets aside up to \$2500 every year to peak interests in aviation and further aeronautical knowledge and experience. The process is simple - you send recommendations to the Committee, and we take it from there.

Scholarship funds are allocated to persons, youth and adult, who are seeking an education in aviation, such as flight training and A&P certification. Recipients must be 15 or older and reside in Midland or the surrounding area. If the individual already holds a certificate, the scholarship may go toward advanced training.

Scholarship nominations may be submitted by anyone, including the individual seeking the scholarship, and must be in the committee's hands no later than the first day of April. Nominations should be submitted using the scholarship forms downloaded from the Chapter 1093 website, http://www.1093.eaachapter.org. Just click on Scholarships in the left column of this page.

1. If you are the individual seeking a scholarship, use the **Application** form.

2. If you are recommending someone for a scholarship, use the recommendation form.

Whether you are applying for a scholarship or submitting the name of a nominee, be sure to show how interests in aviation have been and are being demonstrated, how the education will be used (e.g., career enhancement, a hobby), how the scholarship funds will be used, and past and potential contributions to Chapter 1093. Include a statement about specific interests in aviation and motivation. The more complete the application, the more likely the selection.

## Michigan airport surveys users on growth

By AOPA ePublishing staff A general aviation airport just northeast of Detroit's Class B airspace has launched an online survey to help officials weigh the merits of lengthening its 4,000-ft runway to 5,000 ft or more.

Romeo State Airport, about 40 miles from Detroit, has space to accommodate growth on its premises, but the airport would need a longer Runway 18/36 to become a destination for many business jets and

other aircraft, said Kyle Lewis, AOPA Great Lakes regional manager. Runway 18 has a 470-foot



displaced threshold. Runway 36 is usable at its full length, according to the airport's <u>chart supplement</u> <u>listing</u>.

To get a sense of demand for a longer runway at the state-owned airport, Mark Weigand, AOPA's Airport Support Network volunteer at Romeo State Airport, has created a short <u>online survey</u> seeking feedback from fleet operators and others who use the airport. About 50 aircraft are based at the field. Lewis said he hopes the survey will "help airport management and the state of Michigan determine the number of operations and type of operators that use the airport" and find out which operations would benefit from a runway extension, he said after a visit to the field.

"The airport is situated within an hour's drive of Detroit and offers space to grow. Ramp space is plentiful, and there is room for the development of corporate/executive hangars," he said.

## **Courtesy car finder shifts to web**

By <u>AOPA ePublishing staff</u> A mobile app created by AOPA member Glenn Brasch to help fellow pilots find wheels when they land is shifting to the web. Starting in December, Airport Courtesy Cars will be exclusively a webbased (and free) directory.

The availability (or lack thereof) of crew cars can be a significant factor in making general aviation travel plans, and the mobile-device-based service became popular, with more than 13,000 users to date. Brasch, in a recent email to AOPA editors, noted that the mobile apps he created, particularly the Android version, prompted user complaints related to crashes and bugs.

"I took these complaints to heart, and spent months transferring the data to a web based format," Brasch wrote.

Users can bookmark the website

(https://www.airportcourtesycars.com/) for current and future use. The website includes instructions in addition to the courtesy car listings. The service, which is free to users, is supported by donations and advertising.
