The Dog Who Could Fly: The Incredible True Story of a WWII Airman and the Four-legged Hero Who Flew At His Side, by Damien Lewis.


An instant hit in the UK, this is the true account of a German shepherd who was adopted by the Royal Air Force during World War II, joined in flight missions, and survived everything from crash-landings to parachute bailouts—ultimately saving the life of his owner and dearest friend.

In the winter of 1939 in the cold snow of no-man's-land, two loners met and began an extraordinary journey that would turn them into lifelong friends. One was an orphaned puppy, abandoned by his owners as they fled Nazi forces. The other was a different kind of lost soul—a Czech airman bound for the Royal Air Force and the country that he would come to call home.

Airman Robert Bozdech stumbled across the tiny German shepherd—whom he named Ant—after being shot down on a daring mission over enemy lines. Unable to desert his charge, Robert hid Ant inside his jacket as he escaped. In the months that followed the pair would save each other's lives countless times as they flew together with Bomber Command. And though Ant was eventually grounded due to injury, he refused to abandon his duty, waiting patiently beside the runway for his master's return from every sortie, and refusing food and sleep until they were reunited. By the end of the war Robert and Ant had become British war heroes, and Ant was justly awarded the Dickin Medal, the "Animal VC."

2015 EAA 113 Aviation Studies Scholarship

EAA Chapter 113 will again award as many as two \$1,000 scholarships for the 2015 Aviation Studies Scholarship Program. We are looking for qualified local students pursuing a career in Aviation. Candidates should be currently admitted to a college, university or trade school majoring in aviation related studies. Scholarships may also be awarded to students studying in an approved flight school to assist with flight lessons if they are twenty-five years of age or younger as of March 22, 2015 and have completed their first solo flight.

EAA 113 is also proud to announce it will once again offer one scholarship for up to \$500 to assist a Young Eagle in attending a summer session of Air Academy at Oshkosh. THE WATER DUMMY

One of the objectives to accomplish during the Phase I Flight Test Period is to gather performance data at the airplane's gross weight. Until the recent change by the FAA, or if your operating limitations don't allow taking a second person along, the only way to accomplish that, was to use sand bags or some other heavy objects that could prove messy. Always on the lookout to work smart and not hard, I discovered the Water Dummy. Used by testing labs, this plastic water tank is shaped to match a seated human being with molded in reliefs to accommodate a seatbelt and shoulder harness.


I borrowed one recently to use in my Sonex. Fortunately, I'd chosen the center control stick option for my plane and it fit right in. Airplanes with dual sticks may need to remove the right stick and make clearance accommodations. The first ground fit and flight tests with the water dummy were made with it empty. Then I started adding water, calculating the weight increase of 8.34 lbs. per gallon, this water dummy weighs 155 lbs full. Just as you wouldn't be able to lift a person in and out of the plane unassisted, the water dummy must be strapped in the plane before filling it with water. The large opening on top makes for easy filling with



minimal mess. After ten gallons had been added, I needed to "burp the dummy", that is, to remove the air bubble in the lower portion formed as a result of the seat angle by lifting the plane's tail. Similarly, when finished, I'll empty the dummy by siphoning or the use the wet or dry shop vac.

My flight testing is going well and it's nice having company along when you're exploring new flight regimes, even if it is only a dummy.
