This is a captivating book about a dynamic commanding officer, some magnificent P-47 airplanes, and the successful pilots.

I was really fascinated by it, because I had the pleasure of knowing Vern Maxey, a WWII P-47 pilot who was able to convince me why it was such a battleship of a plane, and why it was important to our success in winning that war. But when Vern returned to civilian life in here in S.E. Michigan and transitioned to general aviation, he just couldn't get interested. He quit flying. This book provides an explanation of just what Vern and those other P-47 wartime pilots had experienced. This book is well written, and is more informative and fun to read than fiction on the same subject. (Freeman has written over 60 books on aviation history.) You can check this one out when I'm finished with it!

## FROM MARK FREELAND

Recently I was asked to help out at an STEM event at Lansing Airport to introduce K -12 teachers to some of the possibilities of using aviation related material in the classroom.

I was asked to bring some of my wares and talk about how they may be used in the classroom. One thought that struck me is that kids love to make things, but they love to break things even more. So what better than to give them a kit to make part of an aeroplane, and then a reason and means to break it!

So here is the kit I came up with. It consists of a small sheet of balsa wood that has the following parts pre-cut with a laser, 6 ribs, a leading edge, trailing edge, main spar and a few gussets. A separate spar cap strip is also provided, which can be used or omitted.

The kids get to build the mini wing, which should take around 10 minutes or so, using only a flat surface, some non stick paper (to stop it sticking to the surface, PVA (white glue) or an Alphatic glue (Titebond) and some masking tape to hold things down while the glue dries. Then when the parts are dry (at least half an hour, but longer is better) the kids get to mount the wing in a fixture (kit for this supplied separately to the teacher) and load it up with pennies, washers, sand or any other suitable weights until the part breaks.

A cleaver teacher can then use the "data" gathered by the kids to do some maths (statistics on breaking strength for example), and or some good lessons in physics looking at the design of the structure, and why it breaks at a much higher load when mounted inverted in the fixture, than with the convex surface up, why the addition of the cap strip on the bottom of the spar makes such a big difference, why it is on the bottom of the spar rather than the top, possibly measure and plot a load deflection curve by adding a 6 " scale and a simple pointer attached to the spar, etc..

The kids could even cover their wings with paper, and use them to demonstrate the concept of lift and drag, especially if the school happens to have a small wind tunnel!

The photos attached show the "kit", built wing, wing in the test fixture with scale used to measure the load applied, and a broken wing.

And the best part of all, it's very cheap, about $\$ 1$ a piece in quantity. Of course if the chapter wanted some for a Young Eagles event or something I would donate the first 100 pieces along with a test stand or two.

## SPACEWALKER

First, a few words of introduction: A close friend of mine, Don Bran, who is both an accomplished model pilot and a full size pilot, donated many excellent books to the Paulson Library quite some time back when he left MI to move to warmer climates after he retired. Many of the members will have seen his name on the book plates, but will have no Idea who he is. So I think it very appropriate to publish the attached both to introduce Don to our members, and also to share a very interesting story he relays in the text below.
"A friend in my RC club, Etowah RC Flying Club, in Etowah, NC, was selling an estate for a friend on the east side of NC. I attended the yard sale and purchased a Sig Craftsman kit of the third scale Spacewalker. It had been framed up nicely and I simply completed it with my own modifications, added all the plumbing, electrical, etc. and to cover it differently than all the known Spacewalkers.

At our local "Hobby House" shop in Hendersonville, NC, I was in one day buying what I needed when the shop owner introduced me to Jesse Anglin, designer of the full size Spacewalker who lives in Hendersonville. I was surprised and told him I was completing a third scale Spacewalker. He then told me that the inspiration for the ship was his rides in a mutual friends PT 19 which was done in the military scheme, blue fuselage and yellow wings. Our friend, Chet Phillips, after selling the PT 19, bought and flew a 1946 Fairchild 24 R in Maroon and yellow which Chet named "Ruby". So I decided to finish my Spacewalker in the military scheme, complete with red and white stripped rudder and US Army markings. If Jesse liked Chet's plane, he might like his own design done in the military colors.

I completed the model with all the military markings and told Jesse that our club was having a "Warbird" fly in on a Saturday in August and that I was planning the maiden flight for that day.

Jesse came out to our field in Etowah and spent over four hours with us. He and a friend of his, took numerous photos of us together near the model. He witnessed the maiden flight, which went off without a hitch, and was visibly very pleased. Later, he sent me a CD with three segments. One, of the two Spacewalkers that Hazel Sig and Maxey Hester had built for their own enjoyment. One of the development of the plane in initial construction and one of his A 532 cylinder, horizontal opposed flat engine. In this segment there is actual footage of this engine running on one cylinder while the opposite cylinder head is removed.. Amazing!

Mr. Anglin was one of the most delightful older gentlemen I have ever met! What a day it was!
The photographs were taken before and after the maiden flight. Not wanting to risk all the time, energy and money in this project, I had one of our ace pilots, Rob Mason, do the initial flight. He requested "Full Rates" and that's what I gave him. His comment after the flight., "It fly's like a Cub". Can it get any better than that?"
