

This month, we feature Kris Kringle, Honorary EAA 1345 chapter member

How did you get started in recreational flying?

I have been flying for centuries. I don't know if you call what I do recreational flying, as it is my job, but I love it, so I feel like it is recreational. Every year on December 24 through December 25, I do a world tour. There isn't a country I don't visit. You can track my flight at NORAD if you are interested: https://www.noradsanta.org/





What do you love about flying?

It is hard to name just one thing I love about flying. The views, the beautiful holiday decorations, the take-offs and landings from so many interesting roofs, the crisp night air, the glittering stars and snow, the magic of it all....! It makes me so happy, ho ho ho!

Tell us about your own airplane(s)? Any that you built yourself? If yes, how was that experience?

My flying machine is a sleigh with eight reindeer. It is a one of a kind! The sleigh is full of technology for my round the world flight every year, even though from the outside it looks very old-fashioned and quaint. I've upgraded through the years, and now have put in the following features:

- Blind spot monitoring system
- The most advanced autonomous, self-flying technology out there
- Thermal imaging cameras
- GPS navigator so the elves could map out my millions of stops well before Christmas Eve, just to make sure I doesn't miss anyone
- Built-in "Naughty-or-Nice" sensor



- A transdimensional present compartment in the form of a traditional gift sack
- A stardust antimatter propulsion unit for power
- Infotainment system with navigation and satellite radio
- Reindeer, the engines behind the sleigh (Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner, and Blitzen; when it is particularly foggy, Rudolph is added)





My reindeer undergo extensive training, and even though my sleigh has all the latest technology to make their jobs easier, they are the heart and soul of my flying machine. The herd is still responsible for a lot of the heavy lifting. Sleighs are large sleds or carriages used for transportation in colder climates — they have two runners on the bottom instead of wheels, making it easier to barrel across snow and ice. An extra source of heat from the hot cocoa maker in the dashboard sends out hot air, acting like a thermal unit in a hot air balloon, giving the reindeer an extra lift for optimal flying conditions.

What is one funny or favorite story you can share from your flying experience?

One funny story is when, after a perfect landing, I caught my pants on a TV antenna and ripped them while delivering presents to this lawyer's children. I later met the son, Peter, and the dad in a court room! The father was the lawyer hired to prove I wasn't real, so he was surprised when I told him to fix that TV antenna. And by the way, I won that case and you could see people everywhere with "I Believe, Do You?" buttons!



What is the most interesting place you have ever landed?

I really enjoyed taking the Air Link helicopter and landing in the Old Mill District one year. That was really interesting and fun. That was about three years ago. I have landed in that area (on roof tops) a lot since, but that was my first time visiting there in a helicopter!

Any advice you would give to aspiring recreational pilots or homebuilders?

My advice would be to work with a team and get help from friends. I couldn't have built my sleigh or keep it running so well every year without my elves and reindeer. Get your own elves around you to help you along the way and the end result will be even more rewarding for you. Then fly, fly, fly! I try to fly every day so I am ready for that long once-a-year global flight.





What do you find the most rewarding about being a member of the High Desert Flyers and EAA?



I don't attend many meetings, but I do love the annual holiday get together you do with the Oregon Pilots Association and other interested aviators and their families and friends. I'm sad you can't do it this year due to that darn coronavirus. But this will pass and I know you will be back stronger next year. Maybe I should attend in 2021? Is it still at the Black Bear Diner?

In honor of Mike Bond – Gone West 1940 - 2020

Michael Vernon Bond

Age 80

Resident of Bend, Oregon

On Oct. 31st, 2020, Michael 'Mike' V. Bond, loving husband and father, passed away at age 80 at his home in Bend, Oregon. He was a former long-time resident of Saratoga, California.

Michael was born on Jan. 2, 1940 in Liverpool, England. In 1965, he married Ann Kathleen Turner in Orpington, England. They emigrated to the United States in 1966.



In 1971, they moved from Connecticut to Saratoga, where they raised their two children, Michelle and Russell, and lived until 1997. While in Saratoga, Michael was employed in the semiconductor industry, and after working at National Semiconductor for a number of years, he joined Supertex Inc. in 1982 as Vice President, DMOS Operations.

Upon his early retirement in 1997, Michael and Ann moved to Bend, Oregon, where they lived for the last 23 years.

Michael had a passion for airplanes, and had always wanted to fly, so in 1995 he and Ann began taking flying lessons together at the San Jose International Airport. He and Ann earned their private pilot's licenses together, and in 1997 bought their own plane, a Cessna 177 Cardinal. For years, they enjoyed their flights together all over the Pacific Northwest, and would also fly down to the Bay Area to visit family.

Michael was a long-time member of the Central Oregon Pilots Association and EAA Chapter 1345 High Desert Flyers. He was also an avid Amateur Radio operator his entire adult life, and held the highest level license available; his call sign in California was KB6W and in Oregon, KB7W. He had a strong interest in technology and learning, and was always sharing his knowledge and love with his children.

Michael is loved and missed by his wife Ann, his two children Michelle (Derek) Bosch and Russell (Carey) Bond, his brothers Colin and Nigel Bond, and his two granddaughters Kaylee Bond and Anne Bosch.







Fly-out to Florence, Oregon on November 21, 2020

Fly-out this month with Central Oregon Pilots Association submitted by Kim Muinch and Gary Miller

8 planes took to the cool skies for the coast on Saturday, November 21 following a chilly 9 am flight briefing outside the BBA hangar. John Foster, our 9th plane had to taxi-back from the runup area after discovering a vacuum pump issue.

The clear fall day yielded calm flight conditions with a brisk tailwind as we made our way over the burned area between Bend and Eugene. The Willamette Valley fog remained the entire day, but the entire coast range and beaches were clear and warmer than our departure point.

Forrest Seale was the first to arrive, having departed his home base of Cline Falls in his "New" Cardinal. The other aircraft were seemingly "Socially distanced", and arrived over a 30 minute period.


The airport is well-cared-for, and has an easily accessed rest room and we—furnished pilot lounge.

Ken and Sheri Fayal ventured off to the old town area on foot, and the others enjoyed a lawn chair socially-distanced brown bag lunch discussion. The owner of the Sea Lion Caves, who flies a Piper Tri Pacer out of the Florence Airport visited with us, and gave us the history of the caves, which he said first became a tourist point of interest in 1932. We came away with his business card, and worked-out a tentative summer fly-in camping weekend, to include a tour of the caves.

A number of us made the 2+ mile round trip walk down to old town, which lies on the banks of the Siuslaw River.

Kim and Fred Berardo took off in close succession for the return trip home, and Kim caught an in-flight photo of Fred's 1979 Grumman AA-5B tiger.

A we approached the Bend Airport from the gap between Mt. Bachelor and Broken top, there was a large swarm of perhaps 8 or so ADS-B targets in the traffic pattern showing on our flight displays. The first of us to land had quite a time fitting-in, but it turns out it was a pretty good group of pilots that day, and things progressed well with good communications and traffic pattern etiquette.





Airport distance calculator

Initial true course: 268
















Building Progress on the Glastar Project

COVID 19 Updates



COVID and the Holidays



The CDC has issued very helpful guidelines for the upcoming holidays:

Some main points:

Steps to take if exposed to COVID-19 during a holiday gathering

- If you are exposed to COVID-19 at a holiday gathering, while traveling, or at any time, quarantine yourself to protect others by doing the following:
- Stay home for 14 days after your last contact with a person who has COVID-19.
- Stay away from others, especially people who are at <u>increased risk for severe illness</u> from COVID-19.
- Watch for fever (100.4°F or higher), cough, shortness of breath, or other symptoms of COVID-19.
- Consider getting <u>tested</u> for COVID-19. Even if you test negative for COVID-19 or feel
 healthy, you should still stay home (quarantine) for 14 days after your last contact
 with a person who has COVID-19. This is because symptoms may appear 2 to 14 days
 after exposure to the virus, and some infected people never have symptoms but are
 still contagious.
- Do not travel until 14 days after your last possible exposure.

If you can't completely stay away from others during the 14 days:

- Stay at <u>least 6 feet</u> (about 2 arm lengths) away from other people.
- Wear a mask that covers both the mouth and nose when you are around other people or animals, including pets (even at home).
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- Monitor yourself and household members for symptoms of COVID-19.
- Get information about COVID-19 testing if you feel sick.

If you develop <u>symptoms consistent with COVID-19</u> within 14 days of the event or celebration, such as fever, cough, or shortness of breath, or if you <u>test positive for COVID-19</u>, immediately notify the host and others who attended. They may need to inform other attendees about their possible exposure to the virus. Contact your healthcare provider and follow the CDC-recommended steps for <u>what to do if you become sick</u>, and follow the <u>public health recommendations for community-related exposure</u>.

If you have been diagnosed with COVID-19, a <u>public health worker may contact you</u> to check on your health and ask you who you have been in contact with and where you've spent time in order to identify and provide support to people (contacts) who may have been infected. Your information will be confidential. Learn more about <u>what to expect with contact tracing</u>.
