Riding Aluminum Overcast

I was lucky to strike one item off my 'bucket list' on May 21st by catching the first B-17G flight of the day. As an aside, one of the EAA corporate preconditions for Aluminum Overcast to visit was a 100 foot wide runway but they agreed to settle for the 75 feet at KBDN. The relevance of this will soon be seen ...

The first flight was on a 'high wind hold' for about 40 minutes before departing, when the winds showed no sign of moderating from the 240 at 17 gusting 24 knots. I know, as I was monitoring our AWOS on the take-off roll (and landing)

Departure was uneventful but we soon ran into low level turbulence ... quite different from my experience flying GA light planes, with the heavy wing loading of the B-17, but plenty of negative and positive vertical G's. I had a bruised skull for a couple of days as a result of my feet leaving the deck. However, the real weather stayed around Newberry Caldera, and with rain showers north of Redmond. Passengers had canvas bucket seats and old (or military?) style lap belts, but right after take-off were allowed into all stations except ball and rear gun turrets.

The trip 'around the patch' was fun, with only scattered clouds and great views of our Central Oregon from a different perspective.

The landing was a 'squeeker' despite the crosswinds being exactly the same as for take-off. In fact I was unaware we were rolling down RWY16!
