Here's a winter reminder when using your aircraft heater.

Hypoxia

You've probably been using your airplane's heater for a while now. Most GA aircraft use a heat exchanger (sometimes called a shroud) around the exhaust manifold of the engine. This shroud uses hot exhaust air to radiate heat to the cold outside air that can then be passed into the cabin.

When working as intended, this is a safe way to keep you comfortable, but if there is damage to the shroud or exhaust manifold, it's possible for exhaust fumes to leak into the heating vent, and then into your cabin.

Carbon monoxide (CO) from the engine exhaust can impair your judgment and motor skills. and in higher doses leave vou unconscious. CO does this by binding to the hemoglobin in your blood, preventing oxygen from normally bonding to your hemoglobin.

Notes on November 18th IAPG Gold Star Museum, Camp Dodge

Ten Chapter 135 members were present, along with a number of IAPG members and guests.

The speaker from the FAA FAAST team gave a good program on human nature tendencies to deviate from established procedures when it comes to flying. He gave examples of pushing personal minimums and "fudging" on procedures that may become normal and "drift" from what we were trained to do, and "drift" on the POH of the airplane we are operating. These deviations lead to safety issues. Interestingly, he noted that 80% of accidents and incidents investigated found over the counter drugs present. Richard Westbrook conducted the IAPG meeting, including election of board members and presentation of jackets to three people who completed the Fly Iowa Challenge. Richard talked about STEM programs for schools and 22 program modules that are available.

He re-capped Fly Iowa 2023 at Knoxville and thanked the EAA for doing Young Eagle flights, both at Youth Camps and Fly Iowa.

Finally, he announced Fly Iowa 2024 at Clarinda, August 31, 2024, and introduced the FBO person from the Clarinda Airport.

- Set of scales are available to members & non members to rent.




















Cylinders from Stinson 10A Saturday morning at the museum
