Here is Clark's description of his presentation;

As you know I am sort of a history nut, and for several years I have been researching the history of the Canadian Prairie Airmail, a service that lasted for only 2 years and 28 days. It was intended to shorten the mail delivery time for Calgary by one day, and was a pioneering effort supported by the federal government, at the time in 1930-32. Although the scheme was considered a safe first step in achieving scheduled airmail in Canada, it was a little ahead of flying technology.

I have been working on a presentation for the Canadian Aviation Historical Society on 57 historical shots, and I have titled my presentation "ADVERSITY IN THE WINTER NIGHT SKIES", the story of Canada's Prairie Airmail 1930-32. It will surprise many of our EAA members as to the rules and technologies involved at that time in our aviation pioneering.

Thank you Clark for this very interesting presentation and perspective on the history and development of aviation in Canada. We have most certainly come a long way from those early days not so long ago.

For our next meeting on February 3, 2022, unless our gathering restrictions change over the next few days, we will once again have a virtual meeting. We are still working on details. Stay tuned for a follow up email. If anyone has any suggestions or would like to prepare, present or lead a discussion please let us know.

Plans for Zenith CH650B plans are complete with construction manual, also come with homebuilt help CDs for 650b and also metal work. - Price \$400.00 Cdn.

I have a complete Corvair engine with William Winn conversion manual, I purchased the engine with the Fly Corvair Gold prop hub and safety shaft installed and a builder log, engine has all the right numbers on it. I have not disassembled the engine but it turns over by hand and is free of any strange noises. The engine has been stored with some clean oil in it. Complete with a new engine stand. - Price \$300.00

I also have a pretty much complete tool kit as outlined by Zenith for CH650B construction, including air riveter and modified mandrills purchased from Zenair, 3 sizes of Clecoes and pliers, as well as numerous Cleco clamps, cable cutters and swaging tool for aircraft cable, rib lightening hole flanging tool, and deburring tools other tools, too numerous to mention, some that most shops would already have. - Price Negotiable, depending on which tools are wanted.

I also own a CNC and was going to draw out the rib profiles with lightening holes, convert to G code and cut them all out stacked together with the CNC in one cut. If the purchaser would like I would do that for no extra cost, for either set of plans. The person would have to provide the Aluminum of the proper thickness and grade sheared into strips the appropriate size for each rib and enough for all ribs, both LH and RH wings, and also some moral support, and we could get er done! OR I might be talked into selling the CNC.
