Sport Pilot Application/Certification Form Available

The form that sport pilot examiners and instructors use when issuing sport pilot certificates - 8710-11, "Airman Certification and/or Rating Application - Sport Pilot" - is now available for download on the FAA website

http://forms.faa.gov/forms/faa8710-11.pdf as a PDF file. As of the end of February, 104 sport pilot knowledge tests have been taken with a pass rate of 92 percent, and a total of 52 other sport pilot general knowledge tests have been administered to sport pilot examiners and instructors with no failures, reports Martin Weaver, manager of the FAA's Light-Sport Aviation Branch in Oklahoma City.

"That is a great accomplishment and reflects on the quality of the airman interested in becoming certificated as sport pilots and sport instructors and examiners," Weaver said.
