E-15 ETHANOL

The EPA in June officially approved the sale of E15 after receiving a waiver request from

producers interested in expanding the use of corn-based ethanol. Despite objections by auto manufacturers, the EPA approved the use of E15 gasoline in flex-fuel vehicles and 2001 model year and newer cars, light-duty trucks and medium-duty passenger vehicles and SUVs.

Many groups have expressed concern over this development. Unsuspecting consumers using E15 could end up with engine problems that might not be covered by their vehicles' warranties. Five manufacturers (BMW, Chrysler, Nissan, Toyota and Volkswagen) are on record saying their warranties will not cover fuel-related claims caused by the use of E15. Eight additional automakers (GM, Ford, Honda, Hyundai, Kia, Mazda, Mercedes-Benz and Volvo) have stated that the use of E15 does not comply with the fuel requirements specified in their owner's manuals and may void warranty coverage.

The only vehicles currently approved by automakers to use E15 are flex-fuel models, 2001 model-year and newer Porsches, 2012 model-year and newer GM vehicles and 2013 model-year Ford vehicles. These approvals extend only to cars, light-duty trucks and medium-duty passenger vehicles (SUVs). The use of E15 is expressly prohibited in heavy-duty vehicles, boats, motorcycles, power equipment, lawn mowers and off-road vehicles.... and airplanes.

Additional concern is the single-dispense hose with multi-grade fuel choice. The previous customer may choose E15, then you come along and want E10 but you get a bunch of E15 that was contained in the hose system.

Ethanol-added gasoline (E10) goes into solution in the ethanol, no problem. At least until it reaches a certain concentration, at around a half a percent water, although it varies with temperature. Lower temperature = less water in solution before phase separation. When the amount of water the alcohol can absorb reaches its max, either because more water is entering the tank, or the temperature drops, the water–which is denser than the gas–drops out . And it takes all the alcohol with it. This cloudy, bilious looking glop is incombustible.

It's worse. The gasoline above the water/alcohol glop has much lower octane than it used to, because the petroleum company has blended the lowest octane gasoline it could, and boosted the octane rating back to the 87 you paid for up with 113-octane ethanol. Your engine won't run on the separated phase, which is lingering on the bottom of the tank, right where the pickup is. It'll start (with difficulty) and run on the gas above it, but the octane will be lowered, perhaps far too low for your engine.

So what can be done?

- 1. Seek out stations that still sell 100% gasoline (see pure-gas.org above) or see an interactive map of ethanol-free stations http://www.buyrealgas.com/Michigan.html
- 2. Ask the gas station if they stir the tanks, and test for water present to avoid phase separation.
- 3. Follow manufacturer's recommendations for fuel storage:

April Meeting - Kalamazoo AirZoo

Our program for the April 13 meeting of Chapter 145 will be a guided tour of the Air Zoo Museum at the Kalamazoo/Battle Creek Intl. Airport (AZO). If you haven't experienced this excellent venue in the last few years, you really must go there with us and get your "airplane fix". The place has been largely redone and although somewhat different in tone and content, it is as good as EAA's museum at Oshkosh. The Air-Zoo has something of interest for the whole family. In addition to the very well done aircraft and related equipment displays, it has aircraft theme rides and play room for the kids, a very extensive room depicting the WASP program during WWII for the women, and a WWII Guadalcanal artifact display and explanation area for history buffs. There's a 4-D theater and a very realistic space shuttle



and aerobatic simulators with 3-D motion capability. Our guided tour will provide opportunities to experience the features mentioned above and the possibility of having a reasonably priced lunch overlooking the main museum display hangar.

Fly-ins and Drive-ins are welcome. Family attendance is encouraged. Admission in \$10.00 for adults, children are free. Some of the features (like the shuttle ride and simulators) require an extra charge of \$4.00, but a pass for all paid displays can be purchased for \$6.50.



SKYVECTOR.COM

SkyVector is a popular and easy way to view aeronautical charts online. Always current, and always free, FAA Sectional Charts are used for VFR flight planning. One can use the site as a planning tool – just click the 'Flight Plan' and enter airports separated by a space; it draws a vector, gives distance, and time enroute. It also has WAC charts, enroute charts, and close-in big city charts. Hover over an airport with weather reporting, and a pop-up shows you the conditions. The site also shows TFR's visually. It has fuel prices too... but that feature looks a bit limited in scale. It's fun for doing "what if" missions (Bahamas, North Pole, Hawaii, etc)
