My experiences in aviation are minimal but I've been around it as long as I can remember. My Dad was a builder/pilot and my earliest memories are of sitting at the dinning room table eating dinner between the ribs of the Stits Sky Coupe wing he was building. As a child I didn't think there was anything special about those days but now, as I reflect back, I am in awe of what he had accomplished and even more so with my Mom for allowing our single car garage and den to become a building site. As I recall, it took him three years to complete N5620 which sported a 125 hp VW engine. My Dad was always involved with the EAA and served officer positions in both the Mineral Wells and Coleman, TX Chapters. (See picture)

I however, didn't really get seriously involved with aviation until my late 20's. I got my private certificate in 1984 and earned my A & P certificates from Tarrant County Junior College in 1996. My first project plane was an L2B Taylorcraft. It had been in storage for over fifteen years and was in pretty bad shape. The wings were made of wood. Rot and glue failure on the rib gussets required complete replacement and reconstruction, N53771 is back flying today with the Commemorative Air Force in San Marcos. My second project, an another Taylorcraft, was a BC12-D. This plane's structure was in good shape but had been dismantled and needed recovering. I completed N43093 and flew her for 15 years. (See Picture) The new owner of N43093 lives in Bay City and enjoys flying her on the frozen lakes. N6255U was my third project, a geared up 1962 M20C Mooney. New belly skins and a rebuild of the prop and engine got it flying again. I only logged about 30 hours in N6255U before Garnet McClure of Longview's Chapter 972 took her off my hands. N6255U got Outstanding in Type at Oshkosh 2010. This brings me to my latest project, an M5-210C Maule, N51563. This aircraft had landed long on a short

field, running through a fence ripping the tail feathers off with minor damage elsewhere. After repairs were made and recovering the fuselage I put about 60 hours on it. John Wisdom and I flew it to Oshkosh in 2010, it was a great trip, thanks John. I recently sold N51563 to a gentleman in North Carolina.

Over the years I had also started an RV-4 and an RV-6 project, but sold both before getting to far along on them. I am now looking at the RV series again for my next project. My wife has always said that I like working on planes more than flying them. To some degree she may be right because I have spent countless hours in the shop and hanger but have only managed to log just under 400 hours of flight time.

I'm looking forward to see what 2012 has in store for me and excited to be a part of Chapter 1475.

Safety FAAST Blast — Biweekly FAA Safety Briefing News Update

Cessna Launches New Safety Initiative

Cessna Aircraft Company launched a new safety initiative this month to educate owners about new inspection procedures designed to help safeguard against corrosion and fatigue. The initiative affects 145,000 airplanes of the 100- and 200-series built between 1946 and 1986. The program stresses visual inspections for both corrosion and cracks caused by metal fatigue.

The revised inspection program will be

published in the airplane service manual in December 2011 for the 200-series, and in April 2012 for the 100-series. According to a Cessna engineer, the program is primarily a "visual process aimed at supporting the continued airworthiness of aging airframes." The criteria for inspections will vary by model and aircraft age or hours of operation.
