CHAPTER 153

DAN'S STORY!

It all started chasing a girl in the summer of 2002.

The summer before my (first) senior year in college I met a girl, in a bar no less. I'll never forget that night. It quite literally changed my life. I soon realized that I needed to find an excuse to stick around for a fifth year, as this girl, being a year younger, was absolutely worth sticking around for.

I had a few acquaintances who were in the aviation program at the University of Illinois, but I had never really considered it as an option for me. As a child, I was fascinated with flight, especially planes that went fast. And, as boys did back then, I would write school reports, create art projects about them and build model airplanes. But as what seems to be a common entrance experience into aviation for others, I never had a parent or anyone else significant in my life who was a pilot who took me on that first flight or gave me a reason to believe that aviation could be part of my life.

But for whatever reason that summer, I thought to go ask one of those aviation kids I knew if there was a way for me to fly a plane as a last ditch excuse to stall becoming an 'adult' for one more year, and to see about this girl. As my mom would say at the time, I couldn't rub two nickels together, and the bank of mom and dad had cut me off. So, I asked around on how to start without any money and sure enough, dot an I, cross a T, go into a little debt – and I was off and flying.

I had no idea what to expect that first flight in a prop plane, I had flown commercially as a kid a few times, but rarely. I probably don't need to spend too much time romanticizing aviation to my fellow enthusiasts but humor me just a little. To me, it is one of the ultimate expressions of creative human potential. Not much beats it. That day, that feeling was burned into my being.

I soloed on 4/24/03 in a Piper Archer, 4144K, at Willard Airport. Another moment I would imagine is a familiar memory to most of you, one that I won't ever forget. I successfully completed my training soon after and received my private pilot license.

Soon after, I graduated college in debt, which used to be a relatively less common thing I think, about to enter an economy that was on the back side of the dot com bust while I was 'figuring it out'. So, I ceremoniously put my license in a safe, put all of my aviation books in a milk crate, and made a promise to my future self that I intended to keep.

...~20 years later....

I found my milk crate at the back of the top shelf in my garage during the shutdown of the early pandemic. This was after building a deck railing, painting every inch of wall and ceiling in my house, cleaning out our basement and building a shed. One might say I was looking for something, anything, constructive to do to keep myself occupied and useful.

I sat on a bucket in the garage for hours that day flipping through my logbooks, my old training books, my notes, and reminisced on how much I loved flying. I didn't need any more of a sign. I was now thankfully happily married to that wonderful girl, two kids, and had a bit more coin in my pocket. It was time to reacquaint myself with an 'old friend' I hadn't seen in years and fulfill a promise.

I started doing research and started to realize how far the experimental world of aviation had come. I'm not even sure I knew it existed back when I was training to be a pilot. I learned there was this organization called the EAA, seemed like something I should learn more about, so I called around and met two different groups. And, as you all know, I'm now a proud member of EAA153 with you all.

Ironically/As fate would have it, however you tend to view the world, I received my tail kit, on my 40th birthday. I spent that entire day in my basement, inventorying everything, setting up tools I didn't know how to use yet, and wondering what I had just done.

As you all know from my builder updates, I have chosen to build a Van's RV-12iS. I am about two months away from my three-year build goal. Not sure if I'll make it but regardless, I'm on my way. Building my own airplane is an experience I find incredibly hard to put into words.

I'm not sure it is possible to accurately describe the range of emotions one goes through attempting something like this, at least that has been my experience. Each time I finish a part I have a little silent celebration with myself, starting in the basement, one winter in the family room, now in the garage. I remind myself frequently how incredibly blessed I am- to have the time, the means, the ability (so far), the backing of an understanding wife/family, and the support of this EAA chapter- to attempt something so demanding, so wild to most people that walk by when the garage is open and the tunes are rockin' wondering what in the world I am doing, and yet so potentially rewarding.

From my experience, the aviation community I've met so far comes as advertised. The people in it couldn't be more genuine, sharing what feels like this incredible out-in-the-open secret – the wonder of flight. I cannot tell you all enough how wonderful you all are, and how incredibly fortunate I feel to be included in this



part of the human experience. The support and monthly reinvigoration I get from seeing you all monthly at our EAA meetings helps urge me towards the finish line, it takes a village and all.



I've come to believe one of the better ways of living is to pursue difficult, meaningful things. To me, the world of Experimental Aviation is such a wonderful and positive expression of creation, of potential, of boundless human spirit, of freedom.
