

JULY MEETING CANCELATION AND FLY-OUT ANNOUNCEMENT

Since we will be at our annual lake Pillsbury fly/camp-out on the regular meeting date (July 13th) we won't have any meeting at our clubhouse this month. However, if you plan to fly or drive with us to Lake Pillsbury, we will have a short meeting there during diner.

If you're going to Pillsbury be sure to bring a bathing suit, suntan lotion, and bug spray. Here is what Chris R. has to say about the flyout.

"Takeoff from Petaluma is scheduled for about 10am; probably a short fuel stop in Ukiah and then on to Lake Pillsbury strip. We usually go the last 8 miles or so from the southwest up the canyon at 4,000 feet. Please bring your own snacks for lunch and beverages but Dinner at about 5:30 will be supplied by the club. Andre has bought the steaks, fixings and beverages but if you want something special for yourself please feel free...that includes beverages. We are going to eat a bit early so guys like Bill and Steve can eat and fly back Sat. evening.

In the morning we will just have coffee and sweet rolls so we can depart and fly over to Ukiah for a place we have picked out for a great restaurant breakfast. Thanks again to Mike and Yarik for driving the supplies up to the Lake. Camping there this time of year is spectacular in the valley, and the swim in the lake by the Marina is always good so bring your suits. See you Saturday morning."

If we don't wish to walk to the Ukiah restraint, there are free wieners at Ukiah airport complements of Willits EAA chapter. Their second annual International Wings and Wieners Fly-in will be serving food to all pilots and guests who fly in from 11-AM to 3-PM Sunday. There will also be a "Historic Aircraft Display" at Ukiah.

We land from the lake side uphill after passing the road that crosses the runway and then taxi back to the right side of the runway near the lake.

Special thanks to Mike and Yarik, who will drive up with the supplies for dinner and breakfast. If you want to have your camping gear brought up in Mike's truck (instead of flying it in) contact him well in advance.

The meeting was brought to order by President C. Rampoldt. Meeting minutes were recorded by the honorable Mark Johnson over the usual Pizza also brought by Mark.

NEW BUSINESS:



MEMORIES OF ACES PAST




MEMORIES OF GREAT FLY-INS (Note the Flying Pizza Box!) THE FLY-IN AND BBQ AT BRIANS


