Monthly VMC Meeting

This month's VMC session will involve ferrying your new aircraft home from the other side of the country. This was to be your first major cross country flight and the current owner had offered to fly with you. When you arrived for pick-up he is sick and has to be isolated for a week. You will not have another opportunity to pick up the plane for months so you must decide if you will fly it home alone or look for other options. The issue is that you will have to cross the Rocky Mountains and you have never flown in the mountains.

You have 273 hours as PIC. Some in a Cessna 152 and 200 in a Piper Tomahawk just like the one you bought. The owner is a retired airline pilot and flying home with him would give you a jump start on you instrument training. You have a pilot friend who could come out

and fly with you but has no experience in the mountains. You have also found a CFII who could go with you but not until mid-week when the weather gets bad. The forecast is clear for the first 3 days of your planned trip from Independence OR and stormy for the rest of the week near your home of Burlington. The plane has 1000TT and is IFR capable.

Your options are:

- 1. Go it alone, which gives you 6 days to get back to Burlington (KBTV) (Tues-Sun)
- 2. Take your instrument rated friend. You'll have 4 days to reach Burlington (KBTV) (Tues-Fri)
- 3. Meet Bob the CFII in Portland and fly back with him. You'll have 4 days to get back to Burlington (KBTV) (Thurs-Sun)
- 4. Fly back commercially and hire a ferry pilot to bring the airplane to Burlington (KBTV).

Our group chose option 1 and 3. The mountains and the weather were the basis for the decisions. The more experienced pilots felt option 1 did not present too much risk. The lower time pilots felt they would want some mountain experience before going it alone.

The expert says option 1. He said it is a blessing to get the chance to fly the 3100 miles by yourself. You could bond with your aircraft and make weather decisions that you are comfortable with. There is a lot of scenery to see if you are not under a hood for IFR training or talking with your friend.

The expert panel added that you should discuss the flight with a CFI and maybe get an hour of mountain flying instruction first. If you go by yourself the performance of the airplane will be much better because you don't have a 200lb instructor onboard. They suggested to always end your day at a large airport in case you are stuck there for a few days and have a family member follow you on Flight Aware.


EAA154 Members Meeting Highlights
