Free Admission for Ages 18 and Under at EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2021

Young people ages 18 and under will be admitted free to EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2021, as a way to introduce more youth to the possibilities in the world of flight. The 68th EAA fly-in convention will be July 26-August 1

at Wittman Regional Airport.

This effort is designed to encourage more aviation-minded families and their children to attend the event that brings more than 10,000 aircraft from around the world to Oshkosh each year.

"EAA's mission is growing participation in aviation and in 2019, after EAA reduced admission costs for students, we saw an increased number of families coming to AirVenture," said Jack J. Pelton, EAA's CEO/chairman of the board. "As we continue to plan for a full AirVenture fly-in in 2021, inspiring young people and giving them a first look at what's possible in aviation is part of our mission, but it's only achievable if they can get in the gate. This effort will build on the more than 60 years where AirVenture has earned a reputation as a wonderful family event. We invite youth from around the world to experience AirVenture at no cost."

The free youth admission is available throughout AirVenture week. Longstanding youth activities and programs at AirVenture include such popular offerings as the hands-on KidVenture display and program area; technology, innovation, and education options throughout the grounds; and extraordinary events such as daily air shows and hundreds of forums, workshops, and seminars.

Coordinating the countless moving parts of EAA AirVenture Oshkosh is a challenge in the best of times, but coming back from 2020's COVID-caused cancellation raises expectations regarding health and safety measures in planning this year's event on July 26-August 1.

During the coming months, we'll keep you informed with the latest information as the situation evolves in a dedicated area of our website with a highly visible logo. An important phrase to remember is "At this time...." As the return to events begins throughout the country, plans will change in conjunction with the current state of the pandemic.

"We will be hosting AirVenture 2021, but there will be areas that will look different and areas where we'll incorporate technology to limit touchpoints as we work with local and state health officials to establish and maintain the best possible standards for public events," said Jack J. Pelton, EAA's CEO and Chairman. "Some areas may look different at Oshkosh this year, but the feeling will be the same as we gather to celebrate the world of flight."

Some of the initial decisions made for this year's event, some of which will evolve and change as the event nears, include:

- Masks will be strongly recommended if you are unable to social distance (roughly 6 feet or 2 meters).
- Proof of **COVID vaccine** will not be required to attend.
- **International visitation** is dependent on current international travel regulations and mandates in the U.S. and individual countries of residence.
- Increased **physical distancing** will be encouraged in all areas.
- EAA is adding significant numbers of sanitizing facilities and working with industry-leading companies for **continual disinfection** throughout the grounds.
- Theater in the Woods, forums pavilions, and other outdoor venues will operate with reduced seating capacity, with social distancing opportunities on the open grounds at that location.
- There will be fewer exhibitors in each **indoor exhibit building**, creating more walkways and separation between exhibitors. Additional venues on the grounds are being re-purposed to accommodate indoor exhibitors that are moved this year.
- Wherever possible, ventilation will be increased in tents and indoor facilities.
- Several **annual events** where physical distancing is not possible will not be held this year, including the Monday night concert; the Young Eagles, EAA Lifetime Member, and International Visitors dinners; the Runway 5K run/walk; and large corporate events and receptions.
- **High-demand forums** and presentations will be scheduled more than once to accommodate demand while allowing for distancing.

In addition, look for more details on new programs for low-contact procedures for admissions, camping registration, points of entry, and other high-volume areas.

"EAA is incorporating innovative ideas for our presentations and even the air shows to keep you safe in 2021 while keeping the fun factor high," Pelton said. "We appreciate your understanding that these plans will evolve in the coming months. We expect changes as we gear up for Opening Day, so our goal is to bring you any new information regularly as soon as we confirm it. We also understand that the ultimate decision to join us is always yours, based on your personal situation and comfort level."

Look at some FAA regulations.

The standards for medical certification are contained the Federal Aviation Regulations (14 CFR Part 67). Pilots who have a history of certain medical conditions described in these standards are mandatorily disqualified from flying. These medical conditions include a personality disorder manifested by overt acts, a psychosis, alcoholism, drug dependence, epilepsy, an unexplained disturbance of consciousness, myocardial infarction, angina pectoris, and diabetes requiring medication for its control. Other medical conditions may be temporarily disqualifying, such as acute infections, anemia, and peptic ulcer. Pilots who do not meet medical standards may still be qualified under special issuance provisions or the exemption process. This may require that either additional medical information be provided, or practical flight tests be conducted.

- 1. Illness 1. Even a minor illness suffered in day-to-day living can seriously degrade performance of many piloting tasks vital to safe fight. Illness can produce fever and distracting symptoms that can impair judgment, memory, alertness, and the ability to make calculations. Although symptoms from an illness may be under adequate control with a medication, the medication itself may decrease pilot performance. 2. The safest rule is not to fly while suffering from any illness. If this rule is considered too stringent for a particular illness, the pilot should contact an aviation medical examiner for advice.
- 2. Medication 1. Pilot performance can be seriously degraded by both prescribed and over-the-counter medications, as well as by the medical conditions for which they are taken. Many medications, such as tranquilizers, sedatives, strong pain relievers, and coughsuppressant preparations, have primary effects that may impair judgment, memory, alertness, coordination, vision, and the ability to make calculations. Others, such as antihistamines, blood pressure drugs, muscle relaxants, and agents to control diarrhea and motion sickness, have side effects that may impair the same critical functions. Any medication that depresses the nervous system, such as a sedative, tranquilizer, or antihistamine, can make a pilot much susceptible to hypoxia (see below). 2. The Federal Aviation Regulations prohibit pilots from performing crewmember duties while using any medication that affects the faculties in any way contrary to safety. The safest rule is not to fly as a crewmember while taking any medication, unless approved to do so by the FAA.

Bessie Coleman: First African American and Native American Female Pilot



Hailing from both African American and Native

American descent, <u>Bessie Coleman</u> (1892-1926) was the first female from both ethnic heritages to earn her pilot license. But because there were no aeronautical facilities that would teach minority women to fly in America, Coleman had to earn her license in France, which she did in 1921.

When she returned to the States, she became a celebrity and built her career as an airshow pilot. Although she had big dreams of starting an African American flying school, she <u>died during a test flight</u> in 1926.

I'm reaching out to EAA Chapter Presidents in the hope that you might help us spread the word on our Vans RV-12 raffle with the proceeds benefitting our scholarships drive.

We are a small Aviation museum in South Central Texas, and a 501(c)3 non profit organization, and utilize antique aircraft to teach kids any of the aviation trades, from becoming a Pilot, Engineer, or A&P Mechanic. The museum arose from the realization that kids in our area had little or no exposure to Aviation, and a grass roots effort arose to create the museum, which morphed into the non-profit organization. At no expense to them, the kids learn in a J-3 Cub, and after soloing that, transition into a Grumman Traveler for their PPL. So far, we've been pleased with our graduates, at present we have 5 kids in various Aviation Colleges (not too bad for a town of 2600 population) who will hopefully continue on into various aviation fields. In addition to their flight training, most kids here have flown the Stearman, TravelAir, etc. If they are so motivated, we teach them welding, woodwork, and the other skill sets that go into restoration and maintenance.

The RV12 we are raffling was built by a friend and supporter of the museum, Milton Weikel, who was a lifetime member of the EAA and hadn't missed the annual EAA Fly In in Oshkosh, and before, when it first began in Rockford, IL, ever... not one. Milton built the airplane to completion, flew it about 5 hours, and then began building a "Legal Eagle" when he was stricken with a rare form of cancer and passed. He had a passion for aviation that was just boundless, and was always eager to help the kids. He was a powerful motivating force here, and missed. We painted the aircraft and are at present finishing the certification flights. We will send the aircraft to a Vans specialist to have all the Service Letters complied with immediately prior to the drawing. The airplane is essentially a brand new aircraft, and beautifully constructed (Milton was an engineer by profession and education, and the craftsmanship is just beautiful) We are going to use the proceeds of the raffle benefit our ongoing "Kids in Aviation" scholarships and allow us to begin a new crop of young pilots and mechanics, and will bare the name "The Weikel Scholarship in ...", and will be offered in Engineering, Aviation and A&P Mechanics. In addition to the airplane, several more prizes are offered and have been sponsored by some great aviation companies like David Clark, Sporty's, Aircraft Tool and Supply, and Garmin. I'm continuing to add prizes as the raffle continues.

AOPA High School Flight Training Scholarships

Thanks to the generosity of the Ray Foundation, 80 exceptional high school students, ages 15 to 18, each will receive a \$10,000 flight training scholarship to pursue a private, sport, or recreational pilot certificate. This scholarship program is a component of the AOPA You Can Fly program, a collection of initiatives working to building a larger, more vibrant pilot community.

Eugene Jacques Bullard: First African American Military Combat Pilot



Born in Columbus, Georgia in 1895, Eugene Jacques Bullard had lived many interesting lives before and after making history as the first Black military pilot.

As a teen, he found his way to London and later settled in France as both an entertainer and a boxer. When <u>World War I</u> broke out, he fought for France and became a decorated infantryman before training as a pilot, receiving his license in 1917.

Bullard went on to participate in more than 20 combat missions before becoming a prominent nightclub owner in France and rubbing elbows with the likes of <u>Louis Armstrong</u> and <u>Josephine Baker</u>.

However, after fighting and getting wounded in <u>World War II</u>, he returned to the States and settled in Harlem, New York, where he worked odd jobs — his final stint being an elevator operator at Rockefeller Center. He died from stomach cancer in 1961 and was buried in Flushing Cemetery in the French War Veterans' section in Queens, New York.

James Banning: First African American Pilot to Fly Across America



Born in 1900, James Banning held onto his childhood dreams of flying,

despite the fact no school in America was willing to train a Black man. Thankfully for Banning, he found a white pilot who taught him the ropes and in 1926 became one of the first African American pilots in history.

In 1932, with only four people coming out to watch his epic endeavor from a small airport in Los Angeles, Banning set off with his mechanic Thomas C. Allen on a coast-to-coast, history-making flight. Known as the "Flying Hoboes," the two made the harrowing 3,300-mile journey and landed in Long Island, New York, clocking in at 41 hours and 27 minutes.

Banning was unable to enjoy the fruits of his labor, however; he died just four months later in an air show plane crash in San Diego.

Cornelius Coffey: First Aviation School Founder

Cornelius Coffey (1902-1994) was a triple threat in his day: He was not only distinguished as the first African American aviator who had both a pilot and mechanic's license, but he also was the first to have founded a non-university affiliated flight school.

With his wife and fellow aviator Willa Brown, Coffey established the Coffey School of Aeronautics in Illinois, where they trained many Black pilots, including a significant number of Tuskegee Airmen. The school would later be moved to Harlem, New York.

Willa Brown: First African American Woman to Earn a Pilot License in the U.S.



Like her husband Cornelius Coffey, Willa Brown (1906-1992) accomplished many firsts, and some of her achievements extended beyond aviation. While she's best known for being the first Black woman to receive her pilot license in the United States, which she did in 1938, Brown also became the first Black woman to serve as a Civil Air Patrol officer, the first to receive a commercial pilot's license and the first to run for Congress.

Having co-founded the Coffey School of Aeronautics, Brown would later organize flight schools for youth and remained active in Chicago politics and its public education system before she retired in 1971.

The Tuskegee Airmen: First Black Military Aviators in the U.S. Armed Forces



Led by C. Alfred Anderson, who was known as the "Father of Black Aviation," the <u>Tuskegee Airmen</u> (active 1940-1948) had a lot to prove to their country and the rest of the world as the first Black military pilots in the U.S. Armed Forces. Subjected to discrimination both on and off the battlefield, the Tuskegee Airmen's service during World War II was at a time when the military was still segregated.

Their heroic missions — escorting heavy bomber aircraft and conducting successful attack missions in 1945 — earned them distinguished honors and helped bring about the desegregation of the military.

Robert Lawrence: First African American Astronaut



Born in Chicago in 1935, Robert Lawrence graduated from Bradley University at age 20 with a chemistry degree. He would go on to serve as an Air Force officer and skilled pilot, logging in 2,500 hours and flying in 2,000 jets.

In 1965, he earned his Ph.D. in physical chemistry from Ohio State University, and two years later, was chosen by the Air Force to take part in the Manned Orbiting Laboratory (MOL) program, a clandestine space mission that aimed at spying on Cold War adversaries.

As a member of MOL, Lawrence became the first Black astronaut selected to a national space program and the only member with a doctorate. Unfortunately, despite all of his promise, Lawrence would never reach space. He was killed as a backseat passenger while testing an F-104 Starfighter supersonic jet, which crashed on December 8, 1967.

Still, Lawrence is remembered for helping develop the Space Shuttle and would have most likely been part of the group who subsequently flew on some of its early missions.

Guy Bluford: First African American Astronaut in Space



What Lawrence fell short of achieving, Guy Bluford picked up the mantle. Born in Philadelphia in 1942, Bluford served in the U.S. Air Force as an officer and pilot before working at NASA.

With multiple degrees in aerospace engineering, Bluford was chosen to participate in the NASA astronaut training program in 1978 and became the first Black person in space as a crew member of the Space Shuttle Challenger in 1983. The historical significance wouldn't hit him until later, but once he let reality set in, he embraced it fully.

"I wanted to set the standard, do the best job possible so that other people would be comfortable with African Americans flying in space and African Americans would be proud of being participants in the space program and... encourage others to do the same." Bluford would go on to serve in three other space shuttle missions before retiring from the program in 1993.

Mae Jemison: First African American Woman in Space

Around the time Bluford was nearing the end of his NASA career, <u>Mae Jemison</u> was just beginning hers. Born in Alabama in 1956, Jemison grew up in Chicago and was involved heavily in dance yet also held a fascination with science.

She graduated from Stanford University with a chemical engineering degree in 1977 and received her medical degree from Cornell Medical College four years later. After holding a brief medical practice, Jemison took time off to serve in the <u>Peace Corps</u>, which is when she discovered she was accepted into the NASA program.

On September 12, 1992, Jemison became the first Black woman in space as a member of the Space Shuttle *Endeavour*. A person with many skills and interests, Jemison retired from the program a year later and went on to establish her own tech research company and write a memoir. She is currently a professor at Cornell University.
