

Phil Lockwood

Chapter 175 is indeed fortunate to have the founder of Lockwood Aviation with us this month to give us the history of the company. Mr. Lockwood will fly an Aircam to the meeting and it will be on display at Volo Aviation after the meeting.

Leza-Lockwood was started by ultralight pioneer Phil Lockwood after the National Geographic Society asked him to design a camera plane to film in the Ndoki Rain Forest in the northern Congo Basin. Lockwood wanted a plane that would allow an engine failure in the jungle so he leaned towards a twin engine. The twin engine design required a huge vertical stabilizer which required a big-torsion resistant fuselage tail. The resulting concept was the Aircam.

Phil Lockwood sought funding from Antonio Leza to form the Leza-Lockwood Company with the intention of making the Aircam kit available to the public. During the development only two engineers, Michael Schwartz and Pedro Gonzalez, worked for Leza-Lockwood.

Old Business

Meeting Minutes:

Meeting minutes were emailed in Smoke Signals and posted to the chapter website. With no amendments to the minutes, a motion was made, seconded without objection to accept the published meeting minutes.

Treasurers Report

No treasurers report was available the meeting today

New Business

Denny D'Angelo reviewed the results of the chapter survey.

- 1. We prefer program topics on aircraft restoration/building and flying
- 2. We prefer not to travel for a meeting or program
- 3. Programs should not exceed 45 minutes
- 4. We want more family events
- 5. We prefer fewer YE events—1/yr.
- 6. We prefer programs that have a speaker or involve us
- 7. We like programs that motivate, entertain, teach, or help us gain insight
- 8. Our interests are in homebuilding/LSA, vintage aircraft, or learning how to fly/fly better
- 9. The majority of us would not be willing to give a presentation
- 10. Our favorite program is the one someone else gives ;)

The November program will really be interesting as Mr. Phil Lockwood, owner of the Aircam Company will be presenting our program. He is flying up an Aircam which will be on display at Volo Aviation following the meeting.

Don Miller noted that he will be closing Reliable Aviation and has a lot of equipment, tools and parts that he is willing to sell to EAA 175 members at 50% off.

Gordon Knapp gave a Sun'n Fun update.

With no additional business, a motion was made, seconded and adopted without objection to close the business meeting at 0915.

Chapter Program

Our speaker was Major General Ken Wilsbach. Ken has flown almost every aircraft in the Air Force inventory and spoke to the membership of lessons learned in transitioning aircraft. The following summary is important to the process of aircraft transitioning.

- 1. Review the Pilot Operators Handbook..
- 2. Know your V-Speeds.
- 3. Review X-C Planning for the transitioning aircraft as performance and capability will differ between aircraft.
- 4. Brief yourself. What are you going to do for both normal and abnormal situations?
- 5. Use a simulator if possible before transitioning. If none available, just sit in the cockpit and familiarize yourself with the layout. Work on the "blind cockpit check" to be able to identify every control, switch, knob on the panel and in the airplane.
- 6. Be deliberate and go slow.
- 7. Don't be "prideful". Think every move through. You need to be conservative at first.
- 8. Don't let automation drive you. Hand fly the aircraft frequently. Turn off the autopilot now and then and to learn the feel of the airplane. Develop good muscle memory and that important second skin.
- 9. Debrief every flight. Every flight, even in the same airplane is different and you should learn something with every flight.
- 10. Utilize other people. Talk to those who are familiar with the aircraft you are transitioning to and learn from their experience the configuration tendencies and characteristic of the aircraft so they will not be a surprise to you.

Major General Wilsbach concluded his presentation at 0945.
