Please **congratulate** our newest aircraft owner, **Ross Dewar, on the purchase of a Preceptor Pup**. Ross is very interested in ultralight flying so he decided to take the plunge with the purchase of the N3. I am certain Ross will have a great time flying the Pup and learning what it is like to fly a low horsepower machine...take it from a Champ owner. Here is a little data on the N3 Pup in case you are not familiar. The Preceptor N3 Pup is designed to meet FAR 103 Ultralight Vehicles standards, and is built to look like a single place J3 Cub. The Pup is powered by various lightweight four stroke engines between 37 and 60 hp with the Mosler 2-cylnder 4-stroke of 37 hp being most popular. The aircraft was designed for cross-country as well as fun flying, so I expect Ross will make trips around the state in his new purchase. We ask Ross to give us a short rundown on his aircraft at the next meeting.

The speaker for this month (26 Mar 16) is Mr. Don Rowell from Sensenich Propellers who will make a presentation on the history of Sensenich, their current products, and the future of propeller design for General Aviation, Homebuilt, and Light Sport aircraft. # **Business Meeting**

The chapter meeting was called to order at 0915 by Jeff Kaloostian. We had 1 visitor attending our chapter today. Thanks and recognition was given to Steve Reisser and Denny D'Angelo for cooking a good breakfast this morning and Chester Allen for keeping our kitchen supplies well stocked. Thanks to Leon and Ginger Adelstone for donating utensils for our kitchen.

#### **Old Business**

#### Meeting Minutes:

Meeting minutes were emailed in Smoke Signals and posted to the chapter website. With no amendments to the minutes, a motion was made, seconded without objection to accept the published meeting minutes.

# Treasurers Report

Jeff Kaloostian presented a verbal treasurers report on our chapter. A motion was made, seconded without objection to accept the Treasurer's report.

#### **New Business**

Denny provided a schedule of future programs through August. Please note that we will not have a May meeting as we are scheduling the EAA 175 Annual Dinner on May 20<sup>th</sup>. The place and will has yet to be announced.

Rich Denton had a sign up list for our Sun'n Fun Kitchen Volunteers. If you want free camping, then you must volunteer for at least 4 days. Our chapter's first Sun'n Fun kitchen activity will be on March 26<sup>th</sup> for a cleanup of the kitchen. First sandwich service will begin on April 1<sup>st</sup>, Full service will begin on April 5<sup>th</sup>. The Sun'n Fun will run from April 5<sup>th</sup> through April 10<sup>th</sup>. Rich will return with our credentials at our next meeting on March 26<sup>th</sup>.

With no other new business to be conducted, a motion and second was made to end the business portion of our meeting. The motion was accepted with objection and the business meeting was closed at 0935.

#### **Chapter Program**

Our program today was presented by Mr. Jose Figueroa, FAA Safety Program Manager. The primary objective of this program was to focus on reducing loss of control incidents and accidents in general aviation.

The major factors in loss of control appear to be that pilots don't know their airplanes, performance data, and fail to use checklists. Pilots need to focus on "awareness". Jose reiterated that the most

important part of flying is to "Fly The Airplane."

External pressures and distractions often play a role in loss of control. Don't let external pressures dictate your next actions. As PIC you dictate safe actions and maintain safe attitudes. The "resignation" attitude (What's the use, Remember, "You can make a difference") is a frequent *bad attitude* found to contribute to accidents.

# Mr. Figueroa presented 3 videos.

- The first video showed examples of problem related to interruptions. It's a good idea to turn off
  your phone when doing aircraft critical tasks such as maintenance and when performing
  checklists, If any type of interruptions occur in the process of checklists, <u>reset and repeat the
  checklist from the beginning</u> to insure that all items are completed.
- The second video dealt with external pressures. A good example of given while a pilot requiring supervision during maintenance lost that supervision as the maintenance supervisor felt that it was acceptable to allow the pilot to independently complete maintenance. Noncompliant supervision can lead to accidents.
- The third video dealt with the consistent use of checklists. It is your responsibility to use checklists no matter how many hours you have accumulated over the course of your life. Another example was shown of failure to follow up on possible problems found while performing a pre-flight checklist. The pilot did not follow-up on what was perceived to be a minor oil leak and subsequently turned into a major issue.

Keep yourself current by practicing basic maneuvers, use flight simulators, and utilize a safety pilot to assist while you practice maneuvers, hood work, or approaches. Consider "currency training". This is a concept used by passenger air carriers but would be good for all pilots. Fly with an instructor occasionally to beef up your skills, even consider an annual instead of biannual review.

Jose concluded his presentation at 10:15 after showing a number of statistics regarding our county, region and state. An interesting statistic is that the most accidents in our state occur during the month of March. One statistic was very profound. Pilots that participate in the FAA Safety Seminars and the Wings Programs have less incidents and accidents than those who do not participate.
