Contract Control Towers Get Reprieve Until June 15th The FAA on April 5 postponed the closures until June 15. Ray LaHood Transportation Secretary said the delay was mostly so lawyers could review the decisions and give local governments a chance to find the money to keep them open. FAA Administrator Michael Huerta told the Senate transportation committee that about 50 communities have offered to pay to keep their towers operating. The agency also plans to eliminate midnight shifts at 60 towers starting this summer. But LaHood said "safety will not be compromised."

President's Rant-April 2013

elcome to the April Flypaper! In any normal year, April marks the end of winter and the beginning of spring, or in our terms, the end of building season and the beginning of flying season. But, this is no normal year. Winter just refuses to release it's grip on the midwest, and while this winter started off mildly, it is making up for lost time in a hurry!

It is no coincidence that the first big flyin of the year is Sun & Fun in Lakeland, Florida. Promoted as "spring break for pilots," the event is a good chance for the aviation-minded to get away from winter
blahs and midwest weather for a week. My first and only trip to this event was back
in 2005, and I can personally attest to how nice the weather is in central Florida in
mid-April. Many of our chapter members have made this event a regular pilgrimage,
and I can understand why.

As most of you know, I spent a good chunk of the last two years grounded with medical issues. During this long, dark time, I had my eyes fixed on a goal- to get my medical back in time to make a return trip to SnF in 2013. Well, I got the medical back in November, and around the same time, started making plans to attend SnF. I spent a good amount of time over the last couple of months using flight planning software to play around with the route, fuel stops, etc. and figuring out the best way to complete the 940NM trip. Given the prevailing winds, it worked out to (on average) a five hour flight down and a six hour flight back. Oddly enough, that meant two fuel stops down and one stop coming back. Huh!?! For anyone who has flown into a major fly-in, this makes sense. The last thing that any sane person wants to do is to arrive at Lake Parker (the Ripon of the SnF arrival) at the end of a long, three hour flight leg. Flying into Oshkosh or SnF, one can easily find oneself spending an hour plus in a holding pattern, not to mention 30 minutes or so of taxi time once on the ground. So, I highly recommend that when flying into a major show, plan to land somewhere about 30 minutes flying time out from the destination. Gas up, water in/ water out, study the NOTAM one last time, and give yourself every chance for success when you hit the IAF.

And so I planned accordingly, with a fuel stop at X60, Williston, FL, about 90NM north of Lakeland. I had my vacation days all scheduled, had my tent and beer cooler all loaded into the airplane and was all

"WHAT ARE YOU, NUTS?" ready to go on Monday April the 8th. Of course, the other piece of advice I give to people when traveling VFR is to leave a day or so on either end of the trip to allow some flexibility for weather. So, when Monday came and went with no break in the IFR weather, I did not despair. I simply drove home and planned to head to the airport in the morning, again to wait for a break in the weather to VFR so I could launch the next day. Well, Monday morphed into Tuesday, and when I got up and checked the weather, it became obvious very quickly that the weather was not likely to improve any time in the next lunar cycle. It was around this time that the thought of driving to SnF started to cross my mind.

DRIVE TO SNF? WHAT ARE YOU, NUTS? THAT'S LIKE 1,280 MILES! This might be what you are thinking, and pretty much what my lovely bride said when I mentioned the idea. I convinced her by explaining it like this: I have the next seven days already scheduled as vacation days, and one of two things is going to happen. 1) I will drive to SnF, have a good time and be gone for the next week, or 2) I will spend the next seven days hanging around the house and moping and complaining about not going to SnF. She considered these two possibilities for about a nanosecond before wishing me a fun time on my trip. Yippee, I'm going to SnF!

Fast forward 20 hours of driving later: I've arrived at SnF. Found a great camping spot and set up the tent. Spent the next three days enjoying the show. Over those three days it rained exactly once, for about 30 minutes, which gave me a good chance to catch a 30 minute nap in the tent before dinner. I had a great time there, worth every minute of the 40 hours that I spent on the road. I took a few pictures of the show, which should appear elsewhere in this edition of the Flypaper. The bottom line is this- I highly recommend this trip to anyone looking for a long but manageable cross country trip, and a good way to escape the midwest weather in early spring.

Until next month, keep your airspeed up and the SPF30 sunscreen handy.
