Maintenance Corner

Need a third hand?

Have you ever needed an extra set of hands when you're knee-deep in building your airplane project? We're digging into the archives and pulling out some old tips and tricks our chapter members have shared with us over the years. This month, we're providing you with a third hand, so to speak, for holding small parts so you can work with them.

Taking 3-6 strands of copper wire, strip 3" of insulation from the small clamp end and 1/2" from the large clamp end. Twist wire tightly and insert it in a large electrical terminal end. Squeeze the terminals in a vise (hand squeezing won't apply enough pressure). Secure wire to the front of the large clamp end and the rear of the small clamp end with screws. Place the large clamp end in any convenient place, bend the wire to move the small clamp end to hold a tab for welding or a part for gluing.

I'm working on getting our new website updated so if you have any questions or input, please let me know. I'll be adding to the website steadily so keep checking back for new content!



Memphis Aviation History

It's fun talking about the history of aviation in our area and every once in a while, I'll run across a cool little article. I shared one below. Those of us who remember Mr. Quenichet will enjoy this one. Taken from The Germantown Star, Sept. 18, 1969.



The idea that flying your own plane is practical only for the wealthy was questioned Thursday morning at a meeting of the Germantown Kiwanis Club at Germantown Methodist Church.

Bringing the Kiwanians up to date on the progress o f private aviation was J i m Quenichet, a flight instructor in private aircraft a t Memphis Municipal Airport.

Mr. Quenichet presented a 30 - minute film on the theme, "Enjoy life by flying."

The film sought to show that the thrills of piloting a plane also were available t o people with relatively small incomes.

Mr. Quenichet was introduced by Bruce Law, program chairman forSeptember.

Walter Little of the Downtown Memphis Kiwanis club was a special guest.

At a meeting of the incoming board of directors, James England of 1601 Brookside was elected secretary of the club for a one year term. He will begin his duties on October 1.

President Glenn Millar presided at the meeting of the club.
