EAA Chapter 228 Falcons Membership Meeting Minutes Summary

September 22, 2020

The September meeting of the Falcons was a webinar using the WebEx platform.

President Trent Heidtke brought the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. There were 27 members and guests signed on.

Trent opened the meeting with an update on the new hangar construction. Construction is moving along and the first hangar roof is in place. The steel framework for a second hangar has been erected.

The Falcon Field Administration is limited to telephone support only due to the Corona virus. Other airport businesses are open but may have limited hours. Please try to support them in these difficult times.

The airport has been notified by letter from the FAA regarding vehicle and pedestrian deviations. Please inform your guests of the rules, especially not to drive/walk on a taxiway. New access badges with these rules will be forthcoming.

Flight training for chapter member and Ray Scholar recipient Scott Trisilla is still on hold while Oklahoma is reviewing his 3rd class medical application. Hang in there Scott.

As a reminder, October is nomination month. All positions are open and you are encouraged to apply next month. This is a great opportunity to serve your chapter and bring in fresh ideas. Please help if you can.

As a prelude to tonights topic of airport markings, Trent posed the question: how many parallel threshold stripes are there for a 75 ' wide runway? The answer is the following table:

Runway width	No. of Stripes
60'	4
75'	6

100'	8
150'	12
200'	16

A shout out this month goes to all the members who continue to support this chapter by signing on to this webinar. We hope that we can resume regular meetings soon.

The Treasurer reports that the balance is still about \$5000.

Trent was recently informed that the tower controller union is planning a fund raiser (Tee shirt sales) and want to share the profits with EAA Ch 228. We hope to have more information by next month and perhaps help the controllers by buying some shirts.

Next Trent gave an update on members build projects.

Glen D. Dyke Delta- the Covid-19 has hurt the aviation maintenance business that employs Glen so he has delayed starting his project. He hopes to start in the next 2-3 months. In the meantime, he shared a proposed paint scheme for his project.

Don H. Onex-has not done much in the past month due to the high temps.

Keith P. Velocity-is taking the summer off while in Canada.

Pete W. RV-12- had his first flight on 8/25/20. Congratulations to Pete! He has about 6 flight test hours of the required 40 hours and reports that the plane flies as Vans said it would.

Lewis M. RV-8- finished all of the firewall forward. He has cut the canopy and is ready to glass in the windscreen. He plans to put the wings on by October 1st. After that he will do the seats and some additional instrument work.

Alex and Kim RV-7- have mounted and drilled the engine mount. Landing gear has been installed. This is conventional gear airplane.

Aaron W. RV-10- still in Flagstaff to get away from the heat. Has been contemplating the engine options (Lycoming thunderbolt?) and will be ordering soon. Lead times are 4 to 6 months.

The social dinners at Vito's on the second Saturday are on hold. Restaurants at most fly in destinations are open with indoor seating available. Thursday coffee (8:00 AM) is unofficially resuming. Stop by the warbirds hangar if you can.

Trent gave the airspace and accident news. As previously noted the City of Marana has been approved for a contract control tower. They are targeting 2024.

Always check NOTAMS before you leave. Watch out for fire related TFRs and VIP TFR's due the upcoming elections.

There were two accidents/incidents to report. The first was a C-206 (turbo) at the Grand Canyon airport. After takeoff the engine began to run rough. The pilot tried to return but the airplane had to make an off airport landing with substantial damage, but no injuries. Lesson learned is to do a thorough preflight. Did the engine roughness begin before or after take off?

The second incident involved a C-208 Caravan DBA as Grand Canyon Airlines. No details at this time.

The next YE event will be October 10th at Pegasus Airpark. There will be 15-20 young women participating. If you can help out with the flying contact Bill Worger (billworger@cox.net).

Tonight's Safety Briefing and main program provided by Andy Elliott was Runway Safety.

Runway safety has become a major concern for the FAA and is to be included in all pilot flight reviews. There are 3 important elements:

- 1. Maintain situational awareness
- 2. Observe and comply with surface markings
- 3. Observe and comply with controller instructions

Situational awareness begins with a thorough review of the airport diagram. Pay attention to taxiways and hotspots. Use georeferenced diagrams on your tablet (Foreflight, iFly GPS, Garmin Pilot, etc.). If necessary, ask for progressive taxi.

The FAA has a lot of resources to help you. They recently introduced a series of videos called "from the flightdeck". You can find these on the FAA.gov site. In the Phoenix area, they have videos covering DVT, FFZ and IWA. Andy showed the FFZ video and it was a great tool to familiarize yourself with the airport.

Andy also showed a video/audio of a runway incursion at JFK. The rapid fire communications at a large commercial airport can be daunting. In this case, the pilot failed to read back a hold short instruction and violated the runway.

Always read back all instructions from ATC.

Andy also showed a slide with common airport taxiway markings. Key is that movement onto a runway will always require crossing a pair of two dashed and two solid yellow lines. NEVER cross these unless authorized by the tower controllers. Acknowledge you're instruction with a read back before proceeding.

An airport movement area is depicted by solid and dashed yellow line. You need to be directed by the controller to cross these lines. Again, read back your instructions.

Remember that on initial contact with the controller use your full call sign. Shorten to the last 3 numbers/letters for subsequent contact. If you are directed to a different controller, your first call up should be your full call sign.

To complete tonight's program on Runway markings, Trent showed two different approach

end markings. The first was two arrows which signifies a displaced threshold. The second was three V shaped arrows. This depicts a blast pad / over run area.

For extra training, Trent recommends the AOPA Runway Safety course which is available to members.

The next meeting will be October 27th and hopefully a face to face. Trent closed with a reminder to keep current by learning.

The meeting adjourned at 8:17 PM.


