If you have completed your airplane project and are preparing to make the first flight, and subsequent test flights, you really need to get the new EAA Flight Test Manual. 

The April meeting of the Falcons was an in person meeting at the CAU hangar. President Don Croyle brought the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. There were 38 members/guests present.

Don reminded everyone that there are only 87 days to Oshkosh 2023. He then announced that we need someone to take on the role of managing our social media (eg, Face Book). He also reminded us that the next YE event is on June 3rd for Dianna's summer camp. Pilots and ground crew are needed.

Don asked for a motion to approve the March meeting minutes as published in the April Newsletter. The motion was made and approved.

Don asked any new members or visitors to introduce themselves.

Tywaun W.- Saw our add on Craigs List and came to check us out. He works in the construction industry and is interested in aviation.

Mons and Mark E.- these brothers have 3 build projects going at the same time (Kitfox IV, Avid flyer and Avid Magnum) and may be getting a fourth one. They are joining Ch 228 to tap into the builder knowledge base.

Howard S. - used to be a member and is coming back to rejoin us. He built and early model of the RV-6 and a Kit Fox.

Candice T. brought her two kids tonight. They are both home schooled and she wants them to learn more about the field of aviation. She is also a member of the Chandler chapter of EAA.

Dee Anne from Falcon Field admin gave us an update on the current projects. The airport has issued an intent to lease notice for a plot near the water tower and near the Steak and Stone restaurant. The Mesa city counsel will meet on Apr 27th to hear proposed rate increases for FFZ. Stephanie is a new admin support person. Mesa is interested in hearing from electric vehicle owners so they can plan for support. The Explorer Post is having their annual dinner/fund raiser on April 29th.

Don handed out the Chapter Leaders awards for 2022 and thanked all for their service.

Dave Bankhead, our Treasurer, reported that the chapter has a balance of \$9,438.20. Dave reminded us that we had to refund the EAA \$2,000 Ray Scholarship money and that is why the balance has decreased.

Don did not have any updates on builders. One thing to note was that Joe Goetz made his first flight of his RV-14. He reports that all went well.

The next dinner social will be on Saturday, May 13th. Thursday coffee has moved to the Admin lobby (thanks Dee Ann) but we may be returning to the Cunningham hanger.

Don summarized the pilot deviations and accident data from Jim Timm. There were 13 pilot deviations and 9 Brashers issued. Most of the deviations involved moving onto a runway without a clearance. There were 14 accidents/incidents last month but no injuries. See the APA Newsletter for more details.

Andy Elliot's safety briefing was on Hot Weather Ops.

With the temperatures climbing, Andy has a few tips for us.

Remember to check density altitude and consider the real temperatures your aircraft is experiencing is at the runway, which can be 20 degrees or more above the air temperature. Even at Falcon, DA could exceed 5000 ft.

You're POH gives TO distances for a brand new engine with a skilled pilot at the controls. You need to increase (2X?) the published numbers as your plane ages. Also, lean for TO to get the best possible performance. Climb at a higher than normal airspeed and watch the CHT's. Level off if necessary to control temps.

Be prepared for hot starts if you stop over for an hour or less. Soak back peaks at about the one hour mark.

Wear light color clothing, sun screen and wide brim hat to keep comfortable. Don't forget to carry enough water. A wet neck scarf can help you stay a lot cooler.

If possible, do your preflight in the shade.

Be prepared for an emergency. Use flight plans or flight following. Let someone know where you are going and when you expect to get there. Carry a PLB or Spot tracker. If you make an off airport landing, stay with your airplane unless you are certain you can walk to get help. Searches are looking for your airplane, not you. Text messages are often more reliable than voice calls and help conserve battery life.

Thank you Andy for tonight's presentation.

Tonights guest speaker was JK Wight from the CAF. JK's presentation was about the first heavy bomber to complete 25 missions in Europe during WWII.

Everyone knows about the Memphis Belle, which got honored for this milestone, but JK told us about another bomber that actually did this first and the story behind why they did not get the recognition.

When the war started, there was no limit to the number of missions flown. It wasn't until April 1943 that General Hap Arnold visited the 93rd Bomb Group and announced the 25 mission limit. The first heavy bomber to complete 25 missions was a B-24D Liberator named Hot Stuff. By May of 1943, Hot Stuff had already completed 29 missions. At that time, General Frank Andrews was on an inspection tour of the 93rd bomb group in Bovington, England, when he was summoned to

return to Washington with Hot Stuff so they could celebrate the 25 missions and kick off a war bonds drive. Since he was an active pilot, the general flew in the right seat. Several of the regular crew members had to take a different plane home as the general's staff needed to go with him.

The normal procedure was to fly north to Scotland where they would land, get a weather briefing and refuel before heading to Iceland. The General asked the pilot if they had enough fuel to make it without stopping and he said yes. So they called on the radio for a weather briefing and were told the weather was fine. Actually, the weather briefing was not for Iceland. So they decided to continue on to Iceland.

When they reached Iceland, they found themselves in a bad snow storm with low visibility. They tried to reach the airport on the radio but could not get a response, so they flew to their alternate field. The weather there was worse, so they headed back to the first airfield, ran out of fuel and crashed. Only the tail gunner survived. And that is why the award went to the Memphis Belle.

Interestingly, General Andrews was being called home because he was to be named Supreme Allied Commander in Europe. General Dwight D. Eisenhower was named instead.

Thank you JK for telling us about this historical event.

The next meeting will be on May 23, 2023. Don closed with a reminder to keep current by learning. The meeting adjourned at 9:05 PM.
