EAA Chapter 228 Falcons
Membership Meeting Minutes Summary

January 24, 2017

The January meeting of the Falcons was held at the CAF hangar at Falcon field, Mesa, AZ.

President Steve Martin brought the meeting to order at 7:04 PM.

There were 32 members and guests in attendance.

Steve asked for guests/new members to introduce themselves.

- Ron Patterson built and is flying an RV-4 based at Pegasus
- Karen and Al Jeske are visiting from east central Ohio. Al is a member of an Ohio EAA Chapter
- Douglas Howell is interested in helping anyone building
- Tom Carr is just visiting

Welcome to all our guest/new member!

A motion to accept the November 2016 meeting minutes as published in the Newsletter was made. The motion was accepted and the meeting minutes passed.

The treasurer reported that the balance at the end of December 2016 was \$3,070.42 Motion to accept treasurer's report and the motion passed.

President Martin asked builders present tonight to give an update on their project. Trent H. stated that Gary C. was almost done and was in Oregon getting transition training for the RV-6A. Trent's Prescott Pusher is close to making a first engine start. Bob Smith said his Sonex is starting to look like an airplane. Pete W. is finishing up his RV-12 tail and is ready to get the next kit. There is a

backlog on wing and fuselage kits at this time. Jack Greene is working on instruments for his AirCam. He is about 75% done. The engines will be ordered next.

Jim Timm started off by stating that there have been no significant airspace issues other than poor flying conditions in January with low clouds and icing conditions. The big event was Aviation Day at the Capitol on January 17. This annual event is sponsored by the Arizona Airport Association. The purpose is to inform our legislators of the significant impact of general aviation on the Arizona economy. Hopefully the legislators will stop taking money from the aviation fund for social/welfare programs and use it to grow aviation.

The APA put together a large display of aircraft/ helicopters and UAV's for the event. Our own Bob Robb brought his Kitfox ultralite to the exhibit which was featured in the evening news. Thanks to the APA and Bob for supporting this informative event.

From an accident stand point, 2016 was a good year. We ended the year with only two non injury accidents and one minor incident in December. However, 2017 is off to a terrible start with four accidents and 6 fatalities. One was weather related near Payson claiming a family of four in a turbo 210 and the other a loss of control during takeoff in Tucson with 2 fatalities. Please be careful out there and know your personal limits with respect to weather.

Andy Elliott was out of town tonight but he provided a brief safety video on low altitude maneuvers. A large majority of accidents occur at low altitude, usually in the landing and takeoff phase of flight. It is important to be aware that airplanes stall at a critical angle of attack, but few pilots understand this. Angle of attack is the difference between pitch angle (attitude) and the fight path angle. Practicing go-arounds and slow flight at a safe altitude (at least 2500 ft AGL), will help you be a better pilot and avoid a fatal mistake at low altitude.

Gary Hertzler gave the main program tonight with a demonstration of what to do when you have a low compression test. AC 43.13-1B considers a reading of 60/80 a "weak" cylinder and refers the mechanic

to the manufacturer's guidelines for further evaluation. Both Continental and Lycoming have different recommendations for corrective action or even a threshold for taking any action. Lycoming says that if the reading is below 60/80, remove/ repair the cylinder. Continental, on the other hand, has a different philosophy as outlined in SB03-3. They provide trouble shooting guidelines to determine where the leakage is coming from and recommend using a borescope to examine exhaust and intake valves. Borescopes can be pricey, but low cost equipment is becoming available. Gary uses one sold by Oasis Scientific and cost about \$200. Mike Busch of the Savvy Aviator has written in Sport Aviation about using a borescope and how to diagnose good from failed exhaust valves. Gary demonstrated how to use the borescope and showed images both normal and failed valves. A failed valve will have a non uniform coloration where as a normal (good) valve will have a uniform reddish appearance. Another tip that the Savvy Aviator gives is a low frequency oscillation of about 30 deg on the EGT may indicate that a valve is starting to fail.

Thanks Gary for the demonstration.

Due to technical difficulties, the EAA video was not shown.

The meeting adjourned at 8::15 PM.
