FLIGHT TEST MANUAL

If you have completed your airplane project and are preparing to make the first flight, and subsequent test flights, you really need to get the new EAA Flight Test Manual. The EAA is <u>accepting orders</u>; the member price is \$17.95 and \$22.95 for nonmembers. Order now and the shipping is free. The new revised EAA Flight Test Manual is a comprehensive program for test flying your new experimental airplane. Unique to the EAA's system are test cards that take you through each test flight point-by-point and allow for easy data collection.

Builders who use the EAA Flight Test Manual will complete the program with a thoroughly tested aircraft, a full understanding of their craft's performance, characteristics, and limitations, and have enough date to easily build a comprehensive operating handbook for the airplane.

On the second Saturday of the month, consider going to Ritchies restaurant on Ryan Field (RYN). They serve breakfast after 6 am every day of the week.





> EAA Chapter 228 Falcons Membership Meeting Minutes Summary February 27, 2024

The February meeting of the Falcons was an in person meeting at the CAU hangar. President Don Croyle brought the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. There were 36 members/guests present.

Don announced that Ch 1445 (Chandler) is planing a tour of the gunnery range near Yuma (March 14th) and have a few openings. Luke Open House is on March 23-24. Corey B. will be volunteering at the event. Expect a long wait to get in as security measures are tight. If you are retired military you will not be able to drive in as usual during the event. Mike C. announced that Ch 228 is planning a tour of the SWA maintenance hangar on April 23rd. We will meet at the CAU hangar at 6:00 PM Don asked for a motion to approve the January 2024 meeting minutes as published in the February 2024 Newsletter. The motion was made and approved.

Don asked any new members or visitors to introduce themselves.

Chuck K. - is a winter visitor from Colorado Springs and is working with others to restart his local EAA chapter. Chuck has joined Ch 228.

Dave M- also winter visitor from Ch 675.

Next Don introduced Jessica from Falcon Field admin to give us an update on Falcon news. Storm recovery is making good progress with 62% percent of the damaged hangars repaired. Repair of the WWII hangars should be done in early April and the rest of the hangars by the end of April.

Jessica asked all airport tenants to make sure they have their current email address on file with the airport so they get the latest news. The airport is conducting a cane bolt survey and want to get feedback on this device to prevent future storm damage. Hangar rents would increase about 1.5% if they go this route. There were a number of suggestions from members on alternative solutions and Jessica encouraged everyone to talk to the airport about their ideas.

Look for a new map of the airport with designated run up areas. Please do run ups in the designated areas only.

The midfield cross over work has started. Check the NOTAMS for restrictions and closures. The FAA is planing a new control tower (7-10 years out) and expect to see survey crews in the coming weeks.

Don't forget the ask the airport Zoom meetings on the 3rd Wednesday at 10:30 AM.

For 2023, Falcon Field ranked the busiest GA airport in Arizona and in the US.

The next CAP blood drive is on March 14 from 8 AM to 2 PM.

Our Treasurer Dave B. reports that the chapter has \$9886.93. We also have \$1130 in YE credits. Dave announced that the Board has asked Joe Goetz to become a Director of Ch 228 replacing Scott Trisilla who has not been able to actively participate in the chapter management and has not maintained his membership in the EAA. Dave asked for a motion to add Joe Goetz to the management team. The motion was made and approved. Don had a short update on Gabby and Eric's RV-10. They are continuing to work on the center fuselage section.

Dinner socials at Vito's on the second Saturday (4 PM) have resumed (attendance has been low so dinners have been suspended. Contact Gary Hertzler if you are interested in resuming). The Thursday coffee has moved to the Admin lobby (7:30 to 8:30 AM).

Don had no data on accidents and incidents.

Don gave a YE update for Mike Ellis who was not present tonight. There have not been any individual flights mostly due to pilot shortages. We are focusing on group events only with the next one to be in mid May.

Tonight's safety brief by Andy Elliott was on Expectation Bias. Before getting into this topic, Andy gave some accident statistics from aviationsafety.net. In 2024, so far there have been 200 events in the US with 50 fatalities. The majority of these events are due to pilot error and we are seeing more and more accidents associated with social media. Andy gave an example of a group that documents aircraft refurbishment projects on social media. One of their projects was a twin Cougar that they completed and documented the first flight. They rushed the run-up check and tried to take off with a completely clogged gascolator. The aircraft crashed.

What is expectation bias? It is a human condition we all have experienced where our brains expect to execute an action and don't acknowledge contrary instructions or commands. An example of this is a commercial flight at an airport that has one hold short location for runway 1L and 8L. The normal departure for this particular flight would be on 1L. The tower clears the flight to take off (TO) on 8L and the copilot reads back cleared to TO on 8L. The pilot, however, goes to 1L and proceeds to TO. The plane crashes and all are killed. Andy gave other examples of expectation bias including one he experienced himself. Be prepared that this could happen to you. Be alert and make sure you clearly hear what was said, not what you expected to hear.

In stead of a regular guest speaker, Mike C. gave a short presentation for Gordon C. who was unable to be here tonight. The subject was Gordon's installation of the Anti Splat Crankcase Vacuum system on his RV-6. The system consist of three items: a bias cut pipe that extends into the engine exhaust pipe, a check valve and a safety relief valve. Using photos and schematics, Mike explained that exhaust flow over the bias cut pipe along with the pumping action of the pistons creates a 5-7 inch of water vacuum in the crankcase. This helps to eliminate case leakages and reduces oil consumption. Any oil that escapes through the breather line is burned in the exhaust pipe leaving little or no oil on the belly. The safety relief valve protects against check valve failure or excessive restriction in the discharge pipe due to coking. The only recommended maintenance is to inspect the bias cut pipe for coking and cleaning it out with each oil change or 50 hours of operation. Gordon reports that he has seen significant reduction in oil usage and a cleaner engine.

The next meeting will be on March 26, 2024. The meeting adjourned at 8:45 PM.
