EXHAUST - FROM THE CARB HEAT ARCHIVES

30 YEARS AGO - FEBRUARY 1981

The February, 1981 meeting began with a presentation on "Micro-light" aircraft by Bernard Arsenault, the owner of Micro Aviation and operator of Limbour Airport near Gatineau. He pointed out that one could enjoy the freedom of flight without the expense of licensing and registration. Simply find a few hundred feet of clear land and you have an airfield. M.

Arsenault flew a Mitchell Wing (B-10) for several years and found it to have very good flight characteristics. Winter flying is great when skis are mounted and pontoons a possibility for the warmer months he said. Flying instruction was available for under \$20.00 per hour. Microaviation was at 9A Chemin des Earbles, Limbour, Quebec. Construction of the Chapter 245

hangar/lounge was reported on in Carb Heat 30 years ago too. Some 35 people put up \$100.00 each a year and a half prior for a rather unknown quantity at that time and an appeal was made for the remaining chapter members to join in and contribute to complete the project now well underway.

20 YEARS AGO - FEBRUARY 1991

Friday, February 15th, 1991 was the last Friday meeting of EAA Chapter 245. Meeting nights were officially moved to Thursday – at the McNabb Community Centre for March and April, to Carp Airport next

and the November meeting would be the first time at The National Aviation Museum. In Carb Heat in February 1991, R. Walker of the EAA Canadian Council warned that there were a few EAA Chapters in Canada

that would have to be part of the new GST and that they should contact GST officials right away. Concern was also expressed about the effect of pollution emission standards which were ready for promulgation at that time. Would there be an exemption for aircraft? What about noise pollution? Could we

convince the legislators that we have more right to fill the air with the toxic emissions than

others such as snowmobilers, boaters, etc?

2nd January
