This event is free and open to the public. Please feel free to share this information.



Chapter Pancake Breakfast a Success

Despite the lack of cooperation from the weather, the chapter spring pancake breakfast on April 23 was a success. High winds kept the number of aircraft flying in to a minimum, but plenty of people drove in for breakfast, including 40 EAA chapter leaders visiting headquarters for a workshop. Grill operators declared an emergency initially when half the burners wouldn't light. For a few moments there was some anxiety about what would happen if the remaining burners also failed. It is rumored that one volunteer proclaimed "We've never lost pancakes at a chapter fly-in break- Proceeds after expenses for the chap-

fast; we're sure not going to lose any on my watch. Failure is not an option." The first batch or two of pancakes took longer to cook on half power but the problem was eventually solved and full power restored.

Winds kept us from flying Young Eagles, but a half dozen or so aircraft did fly in for breakfast. The unofficial record for longest distance traveled went to an EAA member attending the chapter leadership workshop who came all the way from Nigeria! That will be a tough record to beat...

Longtime Chapter 252 Member, EAA Volunteer, and WWII Veteran Lon Nanke Passes





From Lon's obituary...

Lon O.Nanke parted this world to begin a new life with Jesus on April 24th, 2022 at the age of 95. Beloved husband of the late Elaine G., Lon is survived by his sister-in-law Mary Weirts, children Erich L. (Lori) Nanke, Elfrieda G. (Daniel) Albers, and Lorelei E. (Russell) Kidd. Cherished grandfather of Nicole (Joshua Parker) Nanke, Charise (John) Worthington, Heather Nanke, Jeremy Albers, Cody (Jamie) Kidd, Shane (Leanne) Albers, Steven Nanke, and Cassandra (Daniel Frey) Kidd. Great-grandfather of 18, great-great grandfather of one. Survived also by many nieces and nephews, his EAA Museum and Seaplane Base family, the weekly breakfast crew, and many other loved ones, relatives and friends.

Lon was a truly delightful man with one of the warmest hearts you could ever hope to encounter. He had a smile and a piece of Dubble Bubble chewing gum for you anytime you saw him, and he was always in the mood to tell a story (usually taking place off the coast of the Aleutian Islands or in Petropavlovsk). Lon was a veteran of the United States Navy, serving in both World War II and the Korean Conflict. He had a passion for aviation that ran deep in his bones from his years as a pilot, flight instructor, and

air traffic controller, receiving The Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award from the FAA in December of 2010. He spent many years devoting his time to volunteer work for the Experimental Aircraft Association, in fact, he could point out his car in the parking lot of the aerial photo of the first Fly-In convention in 1953. He was awarded the Henry Kimberly Award for his volunteer efforts with the EAA in 2017. He was a staple at the EAA museum, offering his kindness and knowledge as a docent, a Transportation Coordinator at the Seaplane Base during AirVenture, and of course, the life of the party at the annual September Swing. Though he was hard of hearing, nothing could slow him down from dancing the night away. To call him a social butterfly does not quite do him justice, as he was always on the move with friends old and new. His positive personality shone like a beacon to all and his zest for life was infectious. To know Lon was to love him and be loved in return. He truly was one of a kind and will be dearly missed.

Lon was the subject of the Volunteer Spotlight in the June, 2020 issue of Sport Aviation...

If you've visited the EAA Aviation Museum in the past seven or eight years, there's a good chance you've met docent Lon Nanke, EAA 187526. Lon has been volunteering with EAA in different capacities since about 1980, including as the transportation coordinator at the Seaplane Base during EAA AirVenture Oshkosh and at Pioneer Airport when it's open in the summer months.

For most of the year, Lon is a regular at the museum, welcoming visitors with a friendly smile and directing them where to go.

"When people come in, you greet them and see if they've been here before," Lon said. "Then, you take a map and tell them about the things and everything in here, get them started on a tour. I don't do tours, but get them on the right way to go, tell them what's in here, and so forth. Then, of course, when the summer's here, you tell them about the Pioneer Airport and going over there, with the youngsters getting Young Eagles rides and so forth."

Lon doesn't remember exactly what got him interested in volunteering with EAA, but he's had a passion for aviation since 1945 when he first started flying. He can remember the first EAA fly-in convention at Curtiss-Wright Field in Milwaukee back in 1953. Since he's retired, Lon has made volunteering for EAA a daily routine and can be found in the museum constantly, even when he's not scheduled.

"I've always tried to help wherever I could," he said. "That's why I come in. I'm not always scheduled, but I come in. If they're short, then I work. I enjoy it. I get a little tired sometimes, but I enjoy it. I enjoy the people. They're all great."

Member Profile: Jim Casper

If it seems difficult to remember a Chapter 252 event that Jim Casper hasn't been part of, that's probably because most of us haven't been chapter members since 1975 like he

Jim was born and raised in Oshkosh, so he was probably destined to become involved with EAA. His first flight was here at Oshkosh in 1956. When EAA moved the fly-in convention to Oshkosh in 1970, Jim attended and knew he had found something he had to be a part of. He began using what little vacation time he had from his job to attend convention and began volunteering in 1975 in Oshkosh Flight Operations. If you're wondering how he persuaded his family to let him use his limited vacation time to do this, the answer is that he recruited them as volunteers as well! Jim and Pauline were married in late July of 1969, the year before convention moved here, so their anniversary now always falls during AirVenture.

Jim watched and learned from the icons of the volunteer corps and worked his way up the ranks. In his early days, flightline operations was pretty much a Chapter 252 operation and staffed by chapter members. By the mid-1980s Jim became a co-chairman had his own VW Beetle; he became chairman in 1993 when Will Schaik retired. He's still there serving as a consulting co-chairman to the new chair—his daughter Carol.

The rest of the year Jim is usually as busy with Chapter 252 activities as his schedule permits. He has held many different chapter positions over the

years, including president. One of his more memorable experiences was serving as the lead on the Wittman Big Bonzo restoration project. Work started in October of 1982 and

was to be completed by convention in 1983 just months later. Jim enjoyed working with chapter members who were master craftsman and learned a great deal about aircraft restoration. He also learned about keeping swarms of bugs away from an airplane being painted outdoors a day or two before it was supposed to go on display!

When Pioneer Airport opened across from EAA Headquarters, Jim signed on right away and began volunteering there as well, up to the point of adjusting his work schedule to have mornings off so he could be around the airplanes. As Pioneer Airport grew, EAA realized that the area needed an on-site manager. Longtime chapter member Fred Stadler,

Jim watched and learned from the icons of the volunteer corps and worked his way up the ranks. In his early days, flight-line operations was pretty much a Chapter 252 operation and a volunteer and pilot at Pioneer Airport, urged Jim to apply for the position and of course EAA knew of his experience and qualifications and gave him the job. He's still there to-day.

Jim wouldn't mention it but in 2018 he was the recipient of the Chapter Major Achievement Award from EAA, the Brown Arch Brick Award in 2010, the Chapter 252's Spirit of Elo award in 2008.

If you attend any Chapter 252 gathering or activity, you will almost certainly see Jim there, probably working in some capacity so that others can enjoy the event. Thanks to Jim for his decades of service, and for Pauline and his family for allowing him to spend so much time making our chapter and organization a better place.


