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It's POH and Manual Season

"Do you still know all your V speeds from memory like you did last fall? When was the last time you looked at your engine failure checklist?"

Most of us have done little or no flying the last several months and, let's face it, we're rusty. There are still unflyable days ahead, so why not take one of them to study your airplane's Pilot Operating Handbook (POH) and manuals for your avionics and phone/tablet apps? Odds are that there are numbers and procedures in your POH that you need to review. Do you still know all your V speeds from memory like you did last fall? When was the last time you looked at your engine failure checklist? Can you recite it from memory now? Do you remember the details of operating your autopilot?

Then there are our navigator systems. How much do you remember other than "DIRECT TO"? When you don't use a system frequently, it's easy to get lost in a maze of button pushing and knob twisting and not having much or any idea of where you are. This is never a good thing, but if it happens at a busy time such as when you're trying to load or activate an instrument approach in the soup, it can be a really bad thing.

Last but not least most of us have one of the popular aviation apps on our iPads or phones now. Companies such as ForeFlight and Garmin are constantly trying to add new and more sophisticates features to stay ahead of their competitors. During flying season you probably saw the alerts for each upgrade one at a time. In the off season, however, alerts to new features or revisions to the app were probably annoying pop-ups that you clicked "OK" on without reading about. Now you are several updates behind in your understanding... do you really want to fly being that far behind with a critical component of your aircraft? Take part of a rainy afternoon and go back and read about all the updates at a minimum, or better vet try them out in your favorite comfortable chair instead of in flight.

EAA Youth Protection Policy Reminder/ Renewal

Like other organizations that have activities involving youths under 18, EAA implemented a Youth Protection Policy several years ago. This policy applies to all chapter Young Eagle events and involves online training and a background check. The background check is performed by EAA and there is no cost to the member. From the EAA policy summary:

"All YE pilots, YE coordinators, and YE field representatives are required to complete the online training and background check. This takes about 15 minutes. The training and background check need to be renewed after three years. There are no exceptions for this group. Rally ground crew are encouraged to complete the training and background check."

Please note the three year renewal requirement! If it has been three years since you completed the online training and background check, you will need to do so again before participating in any of our upcoming events.


Levi Eastlick, Chief Pilot with the WI DOT Bureau of Aeronautics, was our guest speaker for our March chapter gathering. There are currently 123 public use airports in Wisconsin and 540 permits of all types in total. There are 5,494 registered aircraft, 9,584 pilots, and 7,991 other FAA certificate holders (A&P, etc.) registered in the state. The Bureau has responsibility of making sure that airports in the state are kept in good order. While many airport projects such as runway and taxiway maintenance and improvement are 90% federally funded, items such as snow removal equipment are state funded.

The Bureau publishes a variety of items such as the

state aeronautical chart, which will be undergoing an extensive overhaul for the 2020 edition. With the ever-progressing transfer from hard copy to electronic media, the bureau makes all of its publications available in electronic format now, including the ubiquitous and highly useful Airport Directory. Other useful documents available via their web site include the Points of Interest Near Airports, Seaplane Information in Wisconsin, Protecting Your Airport, as well as all manner of technical and legal information and handbooks. And, of course, everything you need to know for the popular Fly Wisconsin Airport Passport Program is also available online.

Levi stressed the need for communication. If anyone finds an error in any of the directories, charts, or anywhere else in their documentation, please contact them and let them know... they cannot correct errors that they have not been informed about. One of their biggest challenges is in protecting small, private strips from obstacles. If a strip is not registered with them, they cannot limit approval of a Tall Structures Permit that could interfere with operations.

The Wittman Chronicles: Coming Home After Racing Victory in Miami, January, 1932

Steve Wittman won the All-American Air Derby in Miami in January of 1932, and his home town of Oshkosh was electrified. Weather delayed his return in *Chief Oshkosh* for several days. He eventually got to Joliet, Illinois, and finally a clear day dawned in Oshkosh.

The phone at the airport began ringing early the next morning. "When will Wittman be coming home?" was the question of the day. Airport personnel could only communicate that Steve would be home as soon as the weather cleared. At 11:40, the phone rang again. This time it was the airport personnel at Fond du Lac—Chief Oshkosh had just been sighted over the city and was shooting north at high speed. A pilot had been standing by to greet him aloft, but before he could get in the air Wittman arrived overhead "like

a streak of greased lightning through a clear blue sky."

Steve darted over the city in triumph as whistles and bells below heralded his homecoming. People thronged to the airport to greet their new hero. An estimated 600 were on hand when Steve taxied in, and police had mixed results in their attempts to contain them. Airport officer Richard Lutz greeted the Wittman when Chief Oshkosh stopped, but asked him to go back up and show the plane to the people arriving at the airport. Steve obliged and before long the Chief was tearing up the sky once again.

When he finally landed, Steve exited his creation and, displaying a tan he acquired while in Florida, shyly acknowledged the applause while being escorted to a platform where he was met by Oshkosh Mayor T.G. Brown. "In behalf of the citizens of Oshkosh, I want to congratulate you, Mr. Wittman. Your achievement has been a distinct honor, not only to yourself and your plane, but also for the city of Oshkosh. We want the fame of Oshkosh spread far and wide throughout the land, and I think you and your plane have done that remarkably well."

Wittman, ever shy and modest, simply smiled and said "Thank you." He then huddled with family members ranging from his mother to a bewildered two year old niece. Those within earshot were astounded to hear him talk to airport personnel "just as casually as if he had returned from a practice flight of only a few miles" instead of flying halfway across the country after winning an air race. "How's everything?" he asked the airport staff.

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Upcoming Wittman Airport Taxiway A Construction Project

NOTICE TO ALL TEN-ANTS & USERS OF WITT-MAN REGIONAL AIRPORT

TAXIWAY ALPHA (TWY-A) RECONSTRUCTION

PROJECT NO: AIP 3-55-0061-36

Please be advised, work on Phase 1 of the Taxiway Alpha reconstruction project is scheduled to begin on March 30th, 2020. The scope of work for this project includes the full reconstruction of TWY-A. This work is to include but not limited to all removals, grading, hauling, pavement, electrical work, drainage work, joint sealing, landscaping, and all incidental items to complete the work and re-open the taxiway.

This project is to be completed in 3 phases as denoted in the attachment named Exhibit A. Be aware of the following timelines, taxiway & runway closures.

PHASE 1:

Begins March 30, 2020 -Ends July 3, 2020

TWY-A closed from A6-A4 with access from TWY-D maintained on the "By-Pass Taxiway".

RWY 18/36 will be closed from "7AM-5PM" for a total of two days with sufficient prior notice given to all tenants.

PHASE 2:

Begins August 3, 2020 – Ends November 13, 2020

TWY-A closed between TWY A4 and A2.

RWY 18/36 will be closed for a total of 7 work days, but must remain open on weekends.

PHASE 3:

Begins March 29, 2021 – Ends June 11, 2021

TWY-A closed between Al and A2.

At the close of each phase all work must be completed and that impacted taxiway section re-opened for operational use.



50 Years Ago: EAA Oshkosh Convention Site Construction Efforts Begin

(Editor's note: This is from the April 1970 edition of Sport Aviation. President Paul Poberezny describes efforts to build the first components of the convention site we all know so well.)

Enthusiasm for this year's annual OSHKOSH International EAA Fly-In Convention is very encouraging. The cooperation shown those of us here at Headquarters, that have the responsibility of insuring a success, has in many ways made our task a bit easier. The appeal to chapters for assistance in locating equipment needed for the campsite (street lights, wire, switch boxes, etc.) has begun to show results. Even our request that each chapter sponsor the cost of an eight to ten foot poplar tree for the campground has brought forth good results with some chapters forwarding funds for as many as ten trees. Val Brugger and I have completed the drawings of the various areas we will utilize. The general display area, the homebuilt, antique and warbird parking area and the campsite area are all included. We even went so far as laying out and naming the streets in the campsite. The fly-by patterns have been agreed upon with FAA and as soon as the frost is out of the ground we hope that the long hours of planning, the 10,000 miles of travel to and from and around Oshkosh area will enable us to begin the physical effort needed to insure efficiency and success for the next fifteen years.

A 36 x 96 foot metal building, that will serve as a warehouse throughout the year will be constructed. During convention time it will serve as Headquarters for EAA, the Finance Division as well as the EAA Sales Area.

A water well, pumps and water system to the food tents and campsite will be needed.

Black topped surface for the tents is required. Complete electrical power for all areas, including lighting for the campsite and general display area must be installed. There will be the trees to be planted. Many acres of land that were under cultivation last year will need seeding. I guess our greatest need is for plain old labor.

Weekend work parties at the site will begin in April and held every weekend until convention time. Already many members have volunteered to fly and drive to Wittman Field, to assemble and paint picnic tables (we bought fifty new ones at a good price, and could use more), to help with grading, fencing and to install and erect street signs.

Members and chapters are looking for light fixtures, telephone poles and wire. Chapter 241 of Sycamore, Illinois has volunteered to furnish the material and construct a 40×60 foot pavilion that will serve as outside storage for much of our material, and then during convention time be converted to the campers country store.

We will need help and advice in building showers, an outdoor theatre screen and

assistance in installing underground telephone and electrical wire to key spots. We've got to build a city, and with your help, we will. Probably the biggest challenge of all is to accomplish this with the very little capital that is available.

Oshkosh will install the hard surface areas, do considerable grading, and have made arrangements for seeding the areas. They will install some \$3500 worth of permanent fencing as well as two miles of snow fencing. Services and materials in the amount of \$25,250 will be given this year. EAA's planned pre-convention expenditures are estimated to amount to nearly \$30,000. This does not include many items that members and chapters are donating. If any of the members want a list of items needed to improve the site, drop a note to Headquarters, to the attention of Val Brugger, our Convention Coordinator.

We have received a number of requests to furnish as many details as possible relative to this year's convention. Our members desire information such as airport diagrams, traffic patterns, campsite information, typical daily schedules, forums, points of interest n the area, costs and so forth. We will provide this information by having a four page tearout insert in the June issue of Sport Aviation.
