

# Did your Pilot Protection Training and Background Check Expire?

Did your Pilot Protection Training and Background Check Expire?

Do you want to sign up for the first time so you can volunteer for Young Eagle and other youth events?

You can check to see when your Pilot Protection Training and Background Check expire by going to your account page on <a href="mailto:eaa.org">eaa.org</a>. Mine expired and it only took me about 15 minutes to renew and submit my information for a new background check.

Follow these steps to renew or to complete Pilot Protection Training for the first time. It's free, it's quick, it's easy, and it allows you to participate in our youth events.

(This process is only required if you want to volunteer to Fly Young Eagles either on your own or as part of a rally, or to work as a youth volunteer at a Young Eagle Rally, our Teen Build Project, or other youth events.)

Go to <u>eaa.org</u> and sign in to your account.

Click on the "My Account" icon to go to your account profile page.

At the bottom of the gray box it says "Training Information," click on the blue "Go to Training."

# Training Information Go to Training

The next screen will show you what courses you have completed. If you have completed Youth Protection Training, the date of completion and the date of expiration will be shown. Click on "Go to Course." Allow 7 - 10 business days for processing.

On December 17, 2021, I officially became a pilot. That afternoon, I passed my private pilot checkride and received my certificate. The weather was cold and cloudy, with a density altitude around -1,700 feet. Fortunately, the winds were light. A far cry from the previous couple days of high winds and unseasonably high temperatures that melted almost all of the recent snowfall.

Fittingly, it was also the 118<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Wright brothers' first successful flight of a powered airplane. I had rescheduled my checkride from earlier in the month. As I waited for a new date. I wondered if my checkride would coincide with that great anniversary. It seems the stars aligned. I have a personal reason to celebrate December 17 from now on.

I'll be honest: I was nervous going into the checkride. Although I was fully confident in my abilities as a pilot, I couldn't help but feel a sense of trepidation beforehand. A misplaced worry The most important factor that helped that I might not succeed. But I focused on the positive side: the potential for success, and how happy the people in my life would be. Ultimately, my worries were unnecessary. The checkride went smoothly. My designated pilot examiner was friendly and thorough. Both the oral test and practical test went by without too much difficulty. I wasn't perfect, but I felt that my knowledge and flying skills were

more than adequate.

Although a part of me was unsure if I had passed or failed the checkride when the flying portion was over, my DPE told me during our debriefing that, overall, my knowledge and flight performance were well within the certification standards. When he told me that I had earned my pilot certificate, a big smile erupted across my face. By earning my pilot certificate, I finally achieved my near-lifelong dream of learning to fly. That dream was ignited when I attended my first AirVenture at age four and fell in love with aviation. It was further fueled when I had an "unofficial" Young Eagles flight in a Cessna 172 at age 11. Like many would-be pilots, my dream was sidetracked for a while in the face of work. education, family, and other commitments. However, an opportunity to learn to fly emerged for me just over two years ago. Now, with more than 64 hours of flight time, and despite the challenges along the way, I have achieved my dream.

me succeed at becoming a pilot was the generous and enthusiastic support I received from the people in my life. There were many individuals who helped me transform my dream into reality. The flight instructors who taught me in the air and on the ground, and who took the time to help me learn. My friends and coworkers at EAA, and my fellow chapter members at EAA Chapter 252 and Warbirds

Squadron 32, who all provided advice and encouragement. And, of course, my family and the rest of my friends outside of EAA, who had watched me grow up with a love for aviation and were excited to see me finally pursue my passion. To everyone who helped me along the way, I say: Thank you! To all current or future student pilots, I encourage you to surround yourself with people who will support your efforts to learn to fly. There may be a local flying club or EAA chapter in your area whose members can help vou succeed. It's a thrill to meet fellow pilots and aviation enthusiasts, to learn from their experiences and become a part of their community.

I'm excited to see where my aviation journey will take me. I'm already thinking of future ratings and endorsements to pursue, and additional types of aircraft to fly. I'm looking forward to cross-country flying; one of my goals is to fly to every public airport in the state of Wisconsin — all 125 of them! But most importantly, I want to share the gift of flight with more people. Aviation provides fun and unique experiences that cannot be replicated anywhere else, and more people should have the opportunity to take flight and view the world from a new perspective. Perhaps I will inspire someone to learn to fly, just like the pilots who inspired me to learn to fly. Then the torch will be carried forward, the torch that Orville and Wilbur Wright ignited on a cold and windy day back in 1903.in the coming year!

Buster is progressing slowly but it is progressing. Charlie has been welding tabs on the fuselage and finishing up on clusters that were just tacked. Still have a few hours left to finish. Engine and gear have to come off in order to do the welding so we can rotate the fuselage.

Jim Casper has been busy updating the engine mount fixture so we can remake the mount. The first one was a little

short (no original drawings) and our estimate was off. Frustrating, but we just couldn't modify the mount to make it work.

We were able to modify the mount we did build so I could at least install the engine and continue building the fuselage, engine, and nose bowl cowls.

Once the current welding is done, we will install the wings so we can fit and finish the flying/landing wire fittings and canopy lock fittings. Then it's sandblasting and primer/paint time for the fuselage. We can then start reassembling by installing stringers, cables, controls and gear for the final fit and alignment.

There is still a lot to do. This is not the only projects
Charlie, Jim and I are working on so thus the lengthy build time. The timeline is very fluid, but we are hoping by fall/winter the covering process can begin.

## **Chapter Member Bob Baier Passes**

February 26, 1933 ~ January 8, 2022 (age 88)

Robert "Bob" R. Baier, 88, entered Eternal Life on January 8, 2022, at Beaver Dam Assisted Living.

Bob was born on February 26, 1933, in Mayville to the late Erwin and Georgian (Miritz) Baier. In 1934 they moved to rural Brownsville where Bob remained until this last summer when he entered assisted living. He graduated from Lomira High School in 1951 and entered the US Army. Bob learned to fly at age 17 and possessed a valid pilots license until his death. On July 9, 1955, Bob married Carol Pomplin, at St. Mary's in Fond du Lac. He was most well-known for the small plane he built, his "Baby Ace" and was "hailed as the flying farmer" in his younger years. He attended the first EAA meeting in 1953 and joined the EAA when he returned home from the Army in 1954. Bob remained active in the EAA serving as chapter president for the EAA chapter in Waupun in the 1970s. He was a member of the EAA

# Can You Identify This Mystery Plane (Assuming That's What it is)...?

As many of you know, I worked on producing large digital online collections in my former life as Digital Projects Librarian at Illinois State University. And as many of you know I'm continuing that work as a volunteer for the Vintage Aircraft Association working with about 15,000 slides taken by EAA's Jack Cox during his tenure from 1969-1999. About 99+% of the aircraft he photographed are identifiable and have histories that can be tracked down and documented, but there are a few genuine puzzlers. This is one of them.

The two photos are the only ones Jack Cox took of this mysterious "aircraft" at convention here at Oshkosh in 1977. There is nothing about the design in any of the Sport Aviation convention coverage that year, nor anywhere else that I have been able to find. No one I've communicated with who was at convention that year remembers seeing it or ever hearing about it.

Enlarging the photos one can see (but not read unfortunately) that what appear to

be information sheets are taped to it, along with an orthographic drawing of it, possibly a cutaway.

The design is unusual to say the least, and many who have looked at it, including myself, have questioned its airworthy potential. Most have concluded that this was its first and last appearance, and that it didn't get much further than this stage before disappearing (it would not be a terri-





bly unusual event in the experimental aircraft world if that's the case, particularly for that era).
