Things are moving along in our preparations for our Teen Build Project. We have had many volunteers come forward (there's still room for more, if you'd like to join) and had a successful informational session for prospective participants.

Our target age group is 13 - 17. No building experience necessary, just a willingness to commit to regular participation in the project, work hard, ask questions, and build relationships.

We don't have a start date set yet, but we're

looking at sometime in April. We plan to have work sessions on Wednesday evenings from 6 - 9 pm and two Saturdays a month from 9:00 am to noon. As the project progresses we will add sessions from time to time, but we'll be able to work with participants to set those session times. We are hoping to complete the project in about two years.

I am also extremely excited to announce that our chapter has been chosen to receive a 2022 Ray Scholarship. We are looking for applicants between the ages of 16 - 19. Click the link <u>HERE</u> for scholarship eligibility requirements. The scholarship funds up to \$10,000 toward the cost of a private pilot certificate. Applicants should possess or be able to acquire a student pilot certificate (link <u>HERE</u>) and a third class medical (search for an FAA medical examiner using the link <u>HERE</u>).

Applicants should complete the Google form application <u>HERE</u>. Finalists will be interviewed by the chapter scholarship committee. The applicant selected by the committee will then complete an application for EAA for the Ray Scholar program. That application includes an essay, a recommendation, the student pilot certificate, and the third class medical.



# Member Plane Profile: Gary Geisler's SportCruiser

Almost two decades after the creation of the Sport Pilot license, many of the best aircraft for that rating continue to come from overseas where they were designed for similar European categories. One of the most popular models hails from the Czech Republic company Cruiser Aircraft, whose SportCruiser continues to roll out of the factory.

In 2009, chapter member Gary Geisler was shop-

ping for a light sport airplane after encountering issues with the FAA medical certification process, as many of us eventually do. The Remos he was renting here at Oshkosh at the time was nice but ran \$100 an hour. After learning that Piper Aircraft planned to bring the SportCruiser under their banner and that the product had their endorsement, "That was good enough for me!" he said. The airplane was purchased at AirVenture 2009. Then Gary went looking for partners to share in the cost of ownership. Originally planning to have a four-member group, after talking with his first two partners he decided to limit the group to three, with himself having half ownership. "I was fortunate to find 2 great partners, Jim Syverud and Mike Bennett, that have proven to be very conscientious pilots, too!"

In 2016, with a new SportCruiser dealer in Burlington (BUU) the partnership got an opportunity to upgrade to a new model. That also

solved a chronic electrical problem that just couldn't be solved. Piper's Association with the airplane lasted only about a year, so this one, like his first, is officially a SportCruiser model, albeit with various systems upgrades (and a trouble-free electrical system). And, it came standard with a BRS parachute. "Passengers really appreciate the extra level of safety."

The SportCruiser is Rotax 912powered, features all-metal construction, cruises at about 105 mph, and has a maximum gross weight of the light sport standard 1,320 pounds. Unlike many of its contemporaries, the cockpit is downright roomy and comfortable (this author's previous flight school where he instructed had once on leaseback and was the only trainer he ever never felt like a sardine in).

Some might think that light sport category aircraft make poor long distance traveling machines. Gary's experiences have proven otherwise. He is the first to admit that he doesn't reach his destination fast, but he rides in comfort in the roomy and comfortable cockpit and the airplane's autopilot makes flights less tiring than flying them manually.

Flight duration in any airplane is often a matter of personal physiological limitations rather than fuel endurance, with three hours being a comfortable limit, and the SportCruiser can easily exceed that specification.

Gary's travels in the airplane have taken him from Oshkosh to Baltimore, Maryland; Fredricksburg, Texas' famous Hangar Hotel; and to Steamboat Springs, Colorado over parts of the Rockies. With baggage weight and space being at a premium, Gary sometimes makes use of commercial shipping to send larger and heavier trip items to his destination ahead of

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time or makes efforts to travel light.

Gary also uses the SportCruiser for fun local flights and participates in the Wisconsin airport passport program and is looking forward to trying airplane camping this summer. Gary frequently brings his airplane to chapter events such as Young Eagle rallies and is happy to show it to chapter members. If you're curious about this sleek LSA, he will be happy to show it to you.

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
