### Chapter Member Ed Jeziorony Flies 1,000th Young Eagle

#### From EAA

Congratulations to Ed Jeziorny, EAA #31825, of Omro, Wisconsin! On August 19, 2023, Ed flew his 1,000th Young Eagle at Chicago Executive Airport in Wheeling, Illinois. With this accomplishment, Ed became the 51st Young Eagles pilot to achieve this goal. Ten-year-old Parker Gouss of Wilmette, Illinois, was the lucky 1,000th Young Eagle to have his first flight in Ed's Piper PA-28.

Growing up in rural Wisconsin, Ed enjoyed watching Sky King and 12 O'clock High and riding his bike to watch planes take off and land at a grass airstrip not too far from his home. At one point in his life, he reached a low. So, he decided to do something that made him feel better about himself and rebuilt his self-confidence. "Learning to fly boosted my confidence and attitude," he said.

Ed is no stranger to the Young Eagles program; he was part of the strategical sessions which formed the program and began flying Young Eagles in 1992, the first year of the program. Ed said that he flies Young Eagles because he wants to share his passion and experiences with others.

When asked how he felt about reaching such a milestone, Ed quickly responded, "It became a bucket list item. Back in 2012, I was involved in

a very serious accident. So, I had to stop flying for a while. Giving these flights is the highlight of my flying avocation. I so enjoy the look on their faces and expressions during and after the flights."

After all these years of flying Young Eagles, does Ed have a favorite memory of flight?

"All my Young Eagles flights are memorable. And a day does not go by that one of those flights pop up in my memory. From the efforts of the Young Eagles pro-

gram I have seen airline pilots, military pilots, officers in the military, controllers, maintenance personnel, airport management, medical personnel all come from taking one of the Young Eagles flights," replied Ed. "The thrill comes when someone comes up to you and hands you their combat wings because you gave them a flight and encouraged them to

get involved and become active in aviation."

When young Parker was asked what he thought about his first flight, he grinned and replied, "It was the best thing in my whole life!"

Ed echoed that thought by saying, "I could not fathom my life without aviation."

### Spirit of Elo Awarded to Joe Norris

Since 2004 our chapter has recognized a member with the "Spirit of ELO Award," a special once in a lifetime award created by the chapter in honor of Munsil Williams.

For many years, Munsil and his late wife Shirley provided a very simple concept of having aviation people gather at what we called "Elo International Airstrip" on Saturday mornings. No chairmen, no committees. Just gather. The coffee is on, the sweet rolls appear with the attendees.

This year's recipient is Joe Norris. Joe has an impressive list of aviation roles and accomplishments. His many ratings and certifications include Single Engine Land (SEL), Single Engine Seaplane (SES), Helicopter, Commercial, Instrument, CFI, A&P with IA.

During his long involvement with EAA he was one of the Founding Members EAA Chapter 706, one of the five original members of the EAA Homebuilt Aircraft Council (HAC), Senior Aviation Specialist in EAA's Aviation Services department, Homebuilders Community Manager, 2012 recipient of EAA's Tony Bingelis Award, and he currently serves as a Technical Counselor and Flight Advisor.

In addition, countless experimental aircraft carry his signature due to his role as Amateur-Built Designated Airworthiness Representative (AB-DAR).

But, beyond all these accomplishments, it's his devotion to sharing his passion for aviation that we recognize Joe Norris with the "Spirit of ELO Award."

Joe asked that we pass along his appreciation:

'When my name was announced as this year's recipient of the Spirit of Elo award, I was without words. I was so shocked that my brain shifted into neutral and all I could think of to say was "thank you". I should have said a lot more. There are many people who have guided me to where I am today, and they should be recognized.

First and foremost, I have to thank my good friend and mentor, Jim Miles, of Hartford, WI. Jim was EAA #158, and my earliest memories are of his Stearman biplane making passes across our cranberry beds on the family farm as he applied fertilizers and other products. Listening to Jim's stories and watching him fly instilled in me a passion for aviation that has never dimmed.

Spending a few days with him, sleeping in our tents under the wings of his Piper PA-12 Super Cruiser and listening to him as he talked with the likes of Paul Poberezny, Curtis Pitts, and Duane Cole only made my passion burn brighter. I joined EAA in 1976, and earned my private pilot certificate in 1978. This put me in contact with other EAA members in the Wisconsin Rapids area. Most notable of these folks was Ted Strub. Ted was the driving force behind the formation of EAA chapter 706, which we founded in 1980. Ted was building a Hatz biplane and it was through him that I met John Hatz, of Gleason, WI. John was my second mentor in my budding aviation aspirations. He taught my wife, Jeri, to fly, taught me to fly on skis, and was also a constant source of information

on the mechanical side of aviation.

John introduced me to the Antique Airplane Association (AAA) and their annual fly-in at Blakesburg, IA. Attending this event put me in contact with even more mentors, most notably Forrest Lovley, of Jordan, MN. Forrest has been another bottomless pit of aviation knowledge and has helped me in so many ways over the years.

Another protege of Jim Miles is my good friend Tom Hegy, also of Hartford, WI. Tom has been a great friend and inspiration for as long as I can remember. I can't even begin to count the times he has helped me with information, parts, contacts, and companionship over the years.

There are so many who have had an impact on my life, both in aviation and in a more general way. Gene Chase, Norm Petersen, Paul and Audrey Poberezny, Tom Poberezny, Charlie Becker, My compatriots on the EAA Homebuilt Aircraft Council, my colleagues at EAA, as well as at Sonex and CubAir Flight, and all my fellow chapter members in EAA chapters 706, 640, and 252. Jim introduced me to EAA by bringing me to The list is long, and there are many other



names that I should be mentioning here. I'm sure you know who you are. To each and every one of you who have made my aviation life richer and more fulfilling, I can only say thank you.

I have saved the best for last. I couldn't have begun to accomplish all that I have without the support, encouragement and love of my wonderful wife, Jeri. She has been my companion and champion for over 40 years. She should be getting an award just for putting up with all my shenanigans! She is my strength and I couldn't have done any of it without her.

In closing, my thoughts turn to a quote by Gen. James H. Doolittle. He was of course speaking of himself when he said this in his biography, but I feel that the quote applies equally to my own life:

'I am luckier than the law of averages should allow. I could never be so lucky again.""

### **Chapter Member Benj Van Handel Earning Ratings**

Chapter member Benj Van Handel has been keeping the FAA's Airmen Certification Branch busy by adding new ratings the last few months.

#### From Benj:

"I passed my CMEL in a Piper Apache. I did this as an accelerated course and spent 4 full days flying the Apache and practicing all the maneuvers and single engine instrument approach. I prepared months in advance to prepare for this rating. I spent many hours learning the aircrafts more complicated systems compared to a Skyhawk as well as all of the new aerodynamics that go into flying multi engine aircraft. I enjoyed flying the Apache and the challenge of this rating. It's a fun and exciting rating, especially all the time spent flying on one engine! It was a unique feeling shutting down one engine and seeing the propeller stopped out on the wing. The Apache flies well enough on one engine and can still squeak out about 75FPM Climb with two people on board and full fuel on a warmer summer day. I ended up having to fly to Cadillac, MI a few days after all of my practice flights were complete to take the checkride when the examiner was free. So I flew over on Saturday morning 8/26/23 in the 172 and took my CMEL check ride where everything went smooth and I



was delighted to hear the examiner say at the end "Congratulations, you passed!"



But the hours and prep were well worth it and I enjoyed all of the new experiences and learning opportunities, our pilot certificates are truly a license to learn.
