2024 tickets on sale as EAA celebrates Royal Canadian Air Force's 100th birthday



The Canadian Forces Snowbirds, one of the most popular military aerial demonstration teams in the world, announced that EAA AirVenture Oshkosh is part of their 2024 schedule, returning to Oshkosh for the first time since 2016.

AirVenture 2024 is scheduled to take place July 22-28 at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Advance admissions are now available for the weeklong event, along with camping credentials and added amenities such as the Aviators Club.

"The Snowbirds are one of the world's finest mili-

tary aerobatic flight teams, so their presence at Oshkosh in 2024 is a wonderful addition to AirVenture week as we commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Royal Canadian Air Force," said Rick Larsen, EAA's vice president of communities and member programs, who coordinates AirVenture features and attractions. "Along with their elegant precision aerobatics that define their aerial performances, we discovered in 2016 that the team members were enthusiastic and fully engaged in the aviation culture at Oshkosh, and truly enjoyed being with the tens of thousands of fellow aviators on the grounds."

The Snowbirds typically fly their Canadair CT-114 Tutor jets in approximately 60 air shows each year. The nine aircraft used in the performances are flown by experienced team members from the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Safety Tip Night Flying Ryan Limesand

With more hours of darkness this time of year it's a good time to enjoy the calm air and crisp views night flying can afford us. I'm sure most of us struggle to keep night currency and may not be proficient with night flying.

If you've decided not to let old man winter keep you grounded let's review a few of the rules, and pitfalls that flying at night may present.

Night currency rules require three takeoffs and landings in the preceding 90 days in the same class of airplane. The landings must be to a full stop and occur from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise. Has it been a while since you've flown at night? Don't be afraid to reach out to your favorite CFI and have them help you refresh these rusty skills.

While preparing for night operations remember our eyes may need 30 minutes to adapt to low light conditions, so once night vision is established be protective of it. While looking for traffic, an off-center scan technique is used because of the night-blind spot, which affects the central 5-10 degrees of the vision field.

Remember the 30-minute fuel reserve you always keep during the day? You need to raise it to a 45-minute reserve at night. When operating an aircraft at night remember to turn on your position lights. Speaking of lights, are you sure your interior lights are working? It's a good idea to have at least one working flashlight within reach or wear a headlamp. While in-flight some suggest leaving your landing light on within 10 miles of an airport, but be alert for smoke, haze, or fog as this can reflect the light back into the pilots' eyes.

Having a departure plan is much more important at night because it's more difficult to see and avoid obstacles. Check to see if there are obstacle departure procedures for your runway and check the instrument procedures for minimum safe altitudes along your route. VFR flight following is always a good option, but remember it is only available if ATC workload allows.

The most important thing to remember is that there are a variety of illusions you may experience at night. Anytime identification of the horizon becomes difficult, such as a moonless night, you may become susceptible to spatial disorientation. Be prepared to rely on your flight instruments and practice your instrument scan. For more information about night illusions review Chapter 11 in the *Airplane Flying Handbook*.

Identify the airport you intend to land at as early as possible and set up for a normal traffic pattern. You identified how to activate the pilot-controlled lighting as part of your preflight briefing and have ensured the lights won't shut off while landing. Altitude and speed are harder to gauge at night, rely on the PAPI or VASI as well as your flight instruments during final approach. Pilots have a tendency to round out too high. Continue a constant approach decent until the landing lights reflect off the runway and tire marks can be clearly seen. After landing, taxi at a slow pace to allow adequate time for turns, and to identify anything else that could ruin a good night of flying.

One nice thing about the winter is all this can be accomplished, and you'll still be home for the late local news.
