Joe Chaptman, our 2020 Scholar, has completed his required flight hours, and I am told is becoming a skilled pilot. He is preparing for the oral knowledge part of his private pilot check ride. He needs to be finished by May, so the pressure is on! Please stop to talk with him and encourage him in this phase of his training.

Joe tells me he is the new Cadet Commander of his Civil Air Patrol, and he is applying for the Air Force Academy, so he has lots of irons in the fire, and demands on his time. Good luck, Joe! Congratulations on all you have accomplished so far!



Ray Scholar Update:

Learning to fly is one of the most fun and yet challenging things that I have done, and I think that same can be said for many pilots, young and old. The challenge is one of the things that I enjoy most about it. Sometimes it feels like there is so much going on and it becomes dynamic and fast paced, but handling and being successful in these situations is

one of the greatest feelings ever.

These are feelings I have begun to encounter more and more as I get closer to reaching my goal of being a pilot. For me, I think that the challenge lies mostly in being able to manage the many aspects of my life while entering the home stretch of the checkride.

I have found recently that in order to pass the checkride sooner rather than later I will have to rearrange my schedule to make it a top priority, which I am happily doing as I would much rather spend my time studying for flying rather than standardized testing. I know some might be open to debate which is more important, but for me right now - checkride prep is coming first.

My actual flying is going well and Mike has told me that I am very close to being checkride ready. I often

The knowledge portion will be the true test of my stuff, and any advice about studying for it would be greatly appreciated. I am studying using Sporty's Pilot shop video training, which has very good checkride prep that is helpful and has videos for each of the topics. I've also been using YouTube and finding a various videos that are helpful as I learn about regulations and procedures. Some even offer helpful tips and tricks for flying, which are fun to find too.

Winter flying is something that is also very new to me. It is kinda crazy seeing the snow banks around the T-hangers being taller than the plane, and it was certainly new for me to hear just the other day "compacted snow, braking action medium to poor." Things like that certainly make me pay more attention as I'm taxiing.

One of the greatest challenges with winter flying is the weather, which is something that we are all familiar with and that we unfortunately cannot do a lot about, but I look forward to using the extra time to hit the books hard and pass this checkride.

If any of you have any advice I am certainly open to hear it, as I will take all the help I can get and a look forward to flying into 2021 with you all!
