Ray Scholar Report by Jack Newhouse



Happy New Year! I joined the EAA because pilots are awesome. I wanted to meet other people just like me, who know planes and I love a good flight story. As many of you have heard, I am Chapter 327's most recent Ray Aviation Scholar and I'm well on my way to learning how to fly.

I don't know, maybe I'm weird, but do you catch yourself looking up every time an airplane flies overhead? At home, when doing fieldwork, or moving cattle, I always have to stop and watch small GA aircraft descend towards my local airport, KPDC. Other times, listening to the larger jets rumble higher overhead, I always open my flight tracker to figure out what the aircraft is. Little things like this have ensured that flying has always been a part of my life, even if I'm not in an airplane.

I live on a small beef cow/calf operation that is placed in between the extended finals of our airport's runways 32 and 29. This has guaranteed

at least a couple of Cessnas or other aircraft like the local manufacturer's corporate jets buzzing close to my house as they take off and land throughout the day. It wasn't until recently that I started trying to get behind the controls of an aircraft. Around two years ago, I was recommended to the Civil Air Patrol as a means of achieving this goal. Shortly thereafter, I was told about the EAA, where I have found several opportunities in both organizations to get closer to my goals.

During an EAA Young Eagles flight, I was able to hold the controls for a short period of time. It was then that the pilot told me I should start looking into flight schools and other means of learning how to fly. Since this past summer, I have been flying with Morey Airplane Company at least weekly. In the meantime, I have passed my FAA Private Pilot's Written test and gotten a first class medical.

One of the most exciting moments of my life was when I finally turned sixteen and my CFI and I flew up to the Baraboo/Wisconsin Dells Airport. We flew a couple patterns, and while taxiing, my CFI told me to stop and then he hopped out and told me to go up on my own. I continued, with my right seat finally empty running back over everything that I knew. As the old 152's engine stubbornly throttled up, I climbed into the sky on my own. Since then, I have also achieved my cross-country solo and I'm making regular flights by myself around Southern Wisconsin, Eastern Iowa, and Northern Illinois.

Looking forward, I hope to be able to share my love of aviation with others through getting my CFI, CFII, and MEI ratings. Last month, I went down to Daytona Beach, Florida to tour Embry Riddle Aeronautical University. I can really see myself going there and coming back to the Midwest to teach and continue this path of aviation that Chapter 327 has helped me begin.

One of my favorite things about an organization like the EAA is the ability to sit down and speak with people that are more knowledgeable than me. I find it so beneficial to listen to pilot's stories and learn from their experiences. I am just starting out and I hope to make aviation a big part of the rest of my life. If you see me at a chapter meeting and have a spare moment, I would love to listen. In addition, if you ever need any help, I don't mind rolling my sleeves up and getting my hands dirty.
