Road Trips in the Works - Chuck Kubin

One of the coolest aspects of doing the coolest thing you can do, flying, is going to cool places and doing cool stuff.

Just call me Captain Roadtrip. If flying in is an option, I'll check into it and provide details. Here's some ideas I'm working on:

*Visit to Wings Over the Rockies — I have an "in" as a docent, so I'll try to get us a more detailed and longer tour that usual, plus a "behind the curtain" look at the restorations area. Hoping for some discussion about acquisitions and the actual work to meet museum vs. airworthy standards. Recent highlights: the second stage of a ULA rocket, the "Baby BOOM" 2/3 mockup of the next-generation supersonic transport, and a 1926 Eaglerock. A long shot, but since Harrison Ford is a huge backer, maybe we could do a Facebook interview with him from the museum theater. And Lowry Beer Garden and an ice cream stand in a rocket is right next door.

*Visit BOOM — One of about 158 aerospace companies associated with KAPA, this is the company developing aircraft capable of traveling over land without blowing out your picture windows as we will hear a thump instead of a sonic BOOM. Planes are built in Alabama, so we'll be talking to developers about concepts and production.

*Visit the towers at KAPA and/or KBJC — Over years I did both, and back then they toured small handfuls of visitors or a still relatively small group divided into shifts.

*Flight for Life — All the details are pending what we can get, but the concept is to see the birds up close and talk to the pilots, planners and responders.

*National Museum of WWII Aviation/Westpac Restoration — Smallish, intimate museum has 28 FLYING aircraft on display and 10 more in restoration, including B-25 "In the Mood," the only flying P-47, Dauntless dive bomber, one of six remaining F7-F Tigercats, P-38... Westpac, right next door, gets you right into the thick of the work. Located on the northern tip of KCOS.

*Pueblo Weisbrod Aircraft Museum — WOW! Where to start! Nationally famous, dedicated to the B-24, but it doesn't have a B-24 (12 B-17s and -24s are rumored to be buried near Pueblo). It does have a small museum, two huge hangars and a big outdoors display with the B-29 "Peaches," a B-47, B-17, A-26, C-45, MiG 15 and -17, F-80, T-33, F-80, F-104, F-86, and even the Sikorsky Seabat 'copter that fished Alan Shepherd and Friendship 7 out of the drink in 1961. Located on KPUB.

*Denver Air Route Traffic Control Center (ZDV), Longmont. See what it takes to coordinate a region's worth of air traffic.

*Oshkosh, Neb.— sweet roll/donut humanitarian rescue mission. Repeating a favorite.

*Space Command satellite operations — My aviation merit badge wingman was recently promoted from satellite driver to satellite driver supervisor at a Space Command detachment at Peterson AFB. He briefly mentioned a control room visit once, so I'll look into it. No, you don't get to see the classified stuff...even if you could tell what it is.

*USAF Academy — Visitor center is free and the famous chapel (NOT built from spare airplane parts, as rumored) is open daily. The trip can continue into CS to get either the best barbecue or German food in Colorado. Or maybe one of three distilleries or several breweries.

*Back to FlyteCo — In the wake of our 5-star rated banquet, several members are interested in going back as a group for some social time.

So that should keep us busy for awhile. Hit me at dreamwoodck@yahoo.com with your ideas, and if you want to register high interest in any of what's here. I'll turn up the heat on what seems the most popular and from here I'll get with Larry and Jim and target some dates.



Tri County Aviators LLC is in the process of building an RV-14A. We are the 3rd owners of this kit. The kit arrived with quick build wings completely open, the fuselage 40% complete, and with all flying surfaces complete.

We are a team of experienced builders, this being the 6th aircraft to pass through our hands. This is also the 3rd RV-14A that we've worked on. As builders, we have meticulously gone through every rivet on the aircraft to ensure the quality of the work from predecessors. MILE HIGH EAA Chapter 43 Minutes

August 12, 2023

President Jim Wood opened the meeting at 5:59 PM.

Speakers and programs, Larry Earnshaw Coordinator:

Tonight August 12 – Chuck Stout, Wings Over the Rockies, "The 20 Greatest Moments in Flight (that you never heard of)"

September 9 – Annual Pizza Party and OSH Debrief

Intro - In the next 5 minutes, tell the folks at your table something aviation or chapter related that you've done.

TONIGHT'S PROGRAM - Chuck Stout

Larry Earnshaw introduced Chuck, who's the Curator of Wings Over the Rockies.

He asked how many of us are interested in aviation history, to a large show of hands.

Moment #1 - He then asked what was the first flight. Chuck Kubin answered the 1783 Montgolfier balloon, but that wasn't the first balloon to fly - a sheep, duck, and rooster were launched in a balloon made of wallpaper with buttoned seams. The passengers were chosen by the scientific method - the rooster for low altitude, the duck for high altitude, and the sheep was considered to be similar to humans. For the first human flight, Jacques Etienne Montgolfier was the brains and his brother was the front man. The first passengers were a military officer and someone familiar with balloon operations.

Moment #2 - The first long distance balloons were designed by Pilatre de Rosier, Marquis d'Arlandes and referred to as Pilatre balloons.

Moment #3 - The first heavier-than-air flight was a governable parachute, designed by the English Lord George Cayley and flown by one of his servant's 12-year-old son. Cayley also designed the first wire wheel and the lift/weight/thrust/drag diagram still used in flight ground schools.

Moment #4 - First Powered Craft - a dirigible in the 1870s, designed by Henri Giffard.

Moment #5 - First Flight in a Powered Airplane - in France, designed by Felix du Temple in 1874. A steam powered monoplane piloted by a young naval officer. 1884 - Russian Alexander Moizhaisky designed, piloted by a young naval officer. 1890 - Clement Aber designed a bat-like, steam-powered craft with skis that launched from a frozen lake. The flight was classified by France until the Wrights visited. 1901 - Gustav Whitehead - the flight was not documented well and the second plane built to the plans didn't fly. 1903 - the Wright brothers on 12/14; the official flight where the plane took off under its own power and photos were taken was on 12/17.

Moment #6 - The first aerobatic loop - Glenn Curtis? No, and also not Max Emmelman. Adolphe Pegoud in a Bleriot in France on 9/21/13? Nope, Russian Peter Nesterov was first on 9/9/13; he and Pegoud became friends and instructors.

Moment #7 - First multiengine airplane. A Russian pilot had his single engine die due to a mosquito in the fuel jet hole! To avoid a repeat of the experience, he came up with a 4-engine (100hp total) design and then immigrated to the US. That pilot's name was Igor Sikorsky!

Moment #8 - First Flying Ace. Roland Garros? He came up with a gun that could shoot through the prop utilizing deflectors. After crashing behind enemy lines in Germany, he tried and failed to destroy the gun and prop, and Anthony Fokker developed the interrupter gear mechanism flown by Max Immelmann - but the first Ace was Adolphe Pegoud! The first American Ace was...Raoul Lufberg? Eddie Rickenbacher? No, it was a Coloradan from Sterling. Frederick Libby joined WWI as a Canadian truck driver, then saw an ad for flight observers. Pilots flew the plane, observers took pictures and protected the plane with two machine guns, one facing forward and the other backward. He shot down 10 enemy planes in his first month, the first on his first flight!

Moment #9 - First commercial flight was the Zeppelin LZ-7, June 19-28, 1910. 8mph cruise, and the first of many passenger flights on the aircraft.

Moment #10 - First commercial airplane - the Tampa/St. Petersburg Airboat Line - 20 minutes vs. <u>hours</u> on land. The plane was a Benoit and tickets cost \$5, starting January 1, 1914. The very first ticket was auctioned for \$500!

Moment #11 - The first female combat pilot - Russian Marina Raskova in 1942 (dude, you just got shot down by a GIRL!) Also of note, Marie Marvingt, a world class athlete in darn near everything, the first woman to get a driver's license, and the first female surgical nurse. In WWI she dressed as a man to fight for France and was found

out and kicked out twice. Then she used her own airplane to bomb a German airfield. She was the first medevac pilot and flew the first air ambulance.

Moment #12 - First Atlantic crossing - 3 NC (US Navy/Curtiss) flying boats made the attempt. The Navy stationed vessels every 50 miles to service the planes and feed the pilots. NC-4 made it all the way.

Moment #13 - First non-stop Atlantic crossing - a Vickers Vimy bomber 6/14-15/1919, flown by Brits Arthur Brown and James Alcock. They dealt with weather and icing, but made it to Ireland, landing in a peat bog. Charles Lindberg made the first solo Atlantic crossing from New York to Paris in 1927.

Moment #14 - First retractable landing gear, a racing airplane on display at the Henry Ford Museum.

Moment #15 - First autogyro in 1923 Spain, by Juan de la Cierva.

Moment #16 - First flight across the Pacific - in a Fokker triplane "Southern Cross" flown by 2 Americans and 2 Australians (teams switched).

Moment #17 - First blind (hooded) flight - Jimmy Doolittle. A member of the Guggenheim family funded aeronautical technology, including instruments. The flight occurred on 9/24/1929 and lasted about 15 minutes.

Moment #18 - 1936 Bendix Race - very prestigious! New York to Los Angeles, 2450 miles. The winning time was 14 hours, 55 minutes by a Beech C-17 staggerwing flown by Louise Thaden and Blanche Noyes - at 60% power! Second place was Laura Ingalls (a Nazi sympathizer) in a Lockheed Orion. Fifth place was Amelia Earhart and Helen Richey. Richey was hired to fly with Earhart, but not to pilot.

Moment #19 - First jet airplane - young Bill Whittle in England. German Hans von Ohain developed a jet engine at the same time and the Germans had Heinkel build a plane around the engine.

Moment #20 - First turboprop. Tupolev, C-130? Convair R3Y Tradewind? Vickers Viscount? Nope, the Gloster Trent Meteor, British.

Moment #21 - Breaking the sound barrier. Chuck Yeager or George Welch? Welch was the first plane in the air at Pearl Harbor, but couldn't duplicate. First non-military was a Canadaire Saber MK III on 5/18/53 by Jackie Cochran.




