
Next Gathering - Saturday, November 12, 2022, 10:30 AM - 2:30 PM


- Title pic To go along with this month's outing to the Vintage Aero Flying Museum, November is Aviation History Month!





MILE HIGH EAA Chapter 43 Minutes September 10, 2022

TONIGHT'S PROGRAM started at 6:03 PM

Vice President Larry Earnshaw introduced Cliff Chetwin who presented "Flying for the National Parks". Bio: Cliff Chetwin has been flying for over 45 years and has over 7000 hours in 37 make/models, mostly flying throughout the Rocky Mountains, Sierra Nevada, and Alaska.

He joined the National Park Service as a ranger in 1976 where his duties included law enforcement, wildland and structural fire, EMS, technical search & rescue, and natural and cultural resource management responsibilities.

He flew for the Department of the Interior as a ranger/pilot for over 20 years. He was the NPS's first professional aviation program manager, directing aviation activity in over 125 national parks throughout the western United States. Prior to joining the NPS he was a police officer in Washington, DC and in San Francisco.

He is a Gold Seal/Master CFI/CFII/MEI, specializing in mountain flying instruction. Cliff is an EAA life member, serves on the EAA Government Host Team and is the Volunteer Chairman of the Federal Pavilion during AirVenture. He is also the Mountain Flying Committee Chair for the New Mexico Pilots Association. He was a safety counselor with Denver FSDO during the '90's and is now a Lead FAAST Team Representative with Albuquerque FSDO. He is a frequent speaker at regional and national aviation events, teaches incident air operations for FEMA, and is a published aviation author.

Cliff holds degrees in Forestry from Syracuse University and from the State University of New York and the Aviation Safety Certificate from the University of Southern California

He currently owns a C-172 Superhawk and is going low and slow between Santa Fe and his ranch in Kremmling.

Cliff introduced himself as a Chapter 1267 member.

We don't think of aviation in the National Parks, but Cliff got away with it for 20 years. The first National Park Service plane was a 1927 Fairchild FC-2W2 (which Cliff got to fly at AirVenture). The plane started as a thunderstorm chaser with NACA along the East Coast and Outer Banks. It regularly appears at the Federal Pavilion at AirVenture.

The NPS flies ~20,000 hours annually, including contract planes and operates under civil and public use. It has 24 full time pilots and around 15 part time, and operates mostly to Part 135. In-house maintenance is mostly located in Alaska. Most flights are "low & slow" VFR but night and IFR flights support administrative and law enforcement. Cliff listed the current fleet, located at 15 National Parks, including drones, though these are currently grounded due to security concerns (Chinese manufactured).

Lots of wildlife management and survey flights. Fun stories include a rattlesnake in a plane at Big Bend. In the Everglades, aircraft are used for feral python hunts. Many flights are at ~25' AGL! Helicopters are used for animal darting; got to take off before the big critters wake up!

The NPS gets 337 paperwork issues with the FAA, about the same as general aviation. NPS Aerial Missions:

- 1. It used to be interesting estimating mass properties (weight and center of mass) for dinosaur fossils, until NASA provided a method to measure properties in situ.
- 2. Vegetative management invasive species, insects and disease, drought and pollutants, with a BIG emphasis on poaching (especially in Big Bend), are flown increasingly by sUAS (small Unmanned Aircraft Systems).
- 3. Cultural Resources mapping existing resources, finding grave robbers (big demand overseas) also utilize sUAS. The first NPS aircraft mapping was in 1923 at Chaco Canyon; it's also been used for mapping underwater resources in the Pacific's Truk Lagoon a sunken WWII Japanese fleet before diving.

- 4. Law Enforcement the National Park Service has more authority than any other Federal Bureau. The NPS manages 28% of the US southern border and 12% of the northern border, which takes resources from other National Parks, Monuments, etc. Cliff noted that park rangers can enforce FARs landing in a National Park is forbidden unless it's on an approved runway; there are lots of "interesting" stories from pilots who've been cited.
- 5. Search and Rescue Yosemite had 250 technical rescues in 2020 including 62 by helicopter. The Service can insert and extract up to 20,320' MSL (Denali). Rappel inserts are common and the NPS developed a 500' cable rappel system with the Navy. Short haul (dope on a rope) are used for rescue, not recoveries, and the NPS is the world's expert in the method, developed in the Grand Tetons. The NPS flew rescue missions for Air Florida Flight 90 (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Air Florida Flight 90) and the Pentagon on 9/11.
- 6. Emergency Medical Services limited civilian medical support.
- 7. Wildland Fire the NPS manages aircraft for fire recovery. Cliff noted that all pilots need to be aware of Fire Traffic Areas, which are similar to Class B. Don't go there!
- 8. Maintenance Support delivery of equipment, feed, even fireworks to Mount Rushmore.
- Administrative transport getting personnel across huge parks with extreme terrain Big Bend, Yellowstone, and especially Alaska - to deal with fires, sabotage, shootings, fuel contamination, maintenance failures, and runway damage.

Paths to an NPS aircraft career:

- Commercial license with an instrument rating for ASEL (Aircraft, Single-Engine Land), 1500 hours as PIC, "low & slow", etc. Very few succeed at this path.
- 2. Background as a 5-year successful Park Ranger, preferably with a law enforcement background.

Cliff noted that there's virtually no turnover except for retirement. He listed the airplane he's gotten to fly (too many for the Secretary to keep up with!) including a Grumman Goose G-21.

Questions:

More info about dope on a rope? If something goes wrong



mechanically, the dude is toast. Experiments were done with a reserve chute on telephone poles; all were failures. Scott Serani asked about crew size, it varies according to the mission. Thermal imaging is used for snake surveys/detection. Michael Savino asked about touring national parks by plane - it's allowable in parks with public airfields. Cliff said he wants to take off at Leadville (9,934') and land in Furnace Creek, Death Valley (190' below sea level) in one day. Someone asked about the NPS recovering the cost of rescues; it's only mandated in Denali, by bond. Stan asked about overflying parks. Must meet 9136d - noise management over sensitive areas, including parks and urban areas. ~2000 AGL minimum. There are more noise complaints everywhere, including BJC. At the Grand Canyon, pilots must be on one of 4 corridors, unless very high. The FAA has made these very difficult to navigate. There's increasing pressure by the NPS against general aviation, especially the air tour industry. We need to educate elected officials to prevent barring access by air.

Bill - keep your eyes outside the plane! John Reading was in the air near the 172/Sonex incident - eyes out! If something looks off, move away!

Cliff Goldstein noted that it was overcast last Sunday with low traffic and the flying was tremendous! Larry Earnshaw flew up to Caspar the same day as the 172/Sonex incident and was in the incident area about an hour before it happened. Caspar was unusually NOT windy! ATC advised heavy rain east and west of his route, but it had mostly cleared by the time they got there.
